## Timmins News in Brief

Born—In Timmins, on Wednesday, June 19th., to Mr. and Mrs. James K. Moore,—a daughter.

Mr. John Power returned home last week for a few days' furlough from his military duties.

Mrs. Aler, of Timmins, died in the Haileybury Hospital on Monday afternoon of last week. She was taken from here last month and underwent an operation at the hospital, from the effects of which she did not recover.

The Special Sale at Bucovetsky Bros., now in progress, is meeting with much success and big crowds of buyers. The opening days last week brought out crowds that filled the store, despite the particularly bad weather.

Mr. M. Boivin took his little girl down to Haileybury hospital last week for treatment. The child has been seriously ill for some weeks, and all will hope that the treatment at Haileybury will prove effective and that recovery will follow speedily and fully.

During the registration last week Dominion Police Claudery arrested half a dozen men for not carrying their military papers. Coming before Justice of the Peace Montgomery they made explanations and excuses that were satisfactory enough to allow of their dismissal with a warning.

Judge Hartman has given decision in the appeal cases against the assessment of the tenants of residences built on Canadian Government Railway lands at Cochrane. His conclusion is that the tenants of the Government lands in Cochrane are occupying same in their official capacity and can not be assessed.

Mr. L. Halperin returned last Wednesday from a visit to Toronto where he completed a special optical course, and is now one of the most highly qualified opticians in the North Land. Mr. Halperin has under order the most modern type of equipment and expects to have his optical department open to the public in a few days.

Chief Wilson had Noel Marin, an Austrian, before Justice of the Peace Montgomery last week for not registering as an alien enemy. The Austrian had more respect for the easy laws of his land when he found that it cost him \$100 and costs to disregard the simple regulations and requirements regarding alien enemies.

A number of bush fires were visible last week from town, but though some of them were threatening in appearance, none of them were near town, nor was the town even in the "line of march," should they get running wild. Moreover, these days there is always the comfort that the fire rangers are on the job all the time, with the men and equipment necessary to fight and control bush fires.

The pupils of the Separate School, Timmins, are giving a Concert in the Old Empire Theatre tomorrow (Thursday) evening, commencing at 8 p.m. There is an excellent array of talent among the pupils of this school and the program will undoubtedly be an interesting and enjoyable one. The attendance was large, despite the unpleasant weather, and all present had a most enjoyable evening. In the euchre, Mrs. H. Mulherson won lady's first prize, and Mrs. Leng, of Schumacher, received the Consolation award. Mr. Bert Cook won first for gentlemen, while the Consolation went to Dr. Brown. Appel's orchestra furnished good music, the dancing was much enjoyed, the refreshments ditto, and a comfortable amount was netted for the enlisted brethren (Oddfellows).

Mr. Morley, of Moneta, returned last week from Toronto where he has spent some months in the hospital. Chief A. Borland went down on Wednesday's National to Cobalt to attend the noted annual ball of the Cobalt Firemen. He returned on Friday and reports the event as an enjoyable success as usual.

In an article on the recent murder in the North Land the Toronto World makes frequent references to the place it calls "Thomastown." This repeated reference to "Thomastown" is no doubt an implied rebuke to the vulgar familiarity of the North Land that persists in calling the place "Tomstown."

At the close of a most pleasant social evening Mrs. Ellis served lunch and the meeting adjourned to meet on Monday, July 8th, at the home of Mrs. Ellis. An alarm of fire was turned in on Wednesday afternoon last, when some smoke was noticed rising from the side of the ice house at the rear of Bucovetsky Bros.' store. From appearances and circumstances, it is thought that some children were responsible for the little blaze. # PUBLIC NOTICE

## Military Service Act, 1917.

Men 19 and 20 Years of Age.  
Harvest Leave.

Leave of Absence on Ground of Extreme Hardship.  
Procedure to obtain Leave of Absence.

### Men Nineteen and Twenty Years of Age.

It has come to the attention of the Government that there is a widespread impression that young men of nineteen years, and those who became twenty since October 13, 1917, as well as those who may become nineteen from time to time and who have been or will be called upon to register under the Military Service Act, are to be immediately called to the colours.

This impression is quite incorrect. No date has yet been fixed for calling upon such men to so report for duty, nor has the question been brought before the Cabinet for decision. In view of the need of labour on the farm, it is most unlikely that consideration will be given to the matter until after the harvest is over, although of course the Government's action must be determined primarily by the military situation.

There is no further obligation incumbent upon young men of the ages above mentioned who have registered or who do so hereafter, until they receive notice from the Registrars.

### Harvest Leave.

Some enquiries have been received as to the possibility of granting harvest leave to such troops as may be in the country at that time. No definite assurance can be given on this point as advantage must be taken of ships as they become available. On the other hand, harvest leave will be given if at all possible.

### Leave of Absence on Grounds of Extreme Hardship.

It is desired that the Regulations respecting leave of absence in cases of hardship should be widely known and fully understood. Such leave will be granted in two cases:— (a) where extreme hardship arises by reason of the fact that the man concerned is either the only son capable of earning a livelihood, of a father killed or disabled on service or presently in service overseas, or in training for such service, or under treatment after returning from overseas; or the only remaining of two or more brothers capable of earning a livelihood (the other brother or brothers having been killed or disabled on service, or being presently in service overseas, or in training for overseas or under treatment after his or their return from overseas); brothers married before 4th August, 1914, living in separate establishments and having a child or children not to be counted, in determining the fact that the man is the "only" remaining son or brother; (b) where extreme hardship arises by reason of exceptional circumstances such as the fact that the man concerned is the sole support of a widowed mother, an invalid father or other helpless dependents.

It is to be noted that in all these cases the governing factor is not hardship, loss or suffering to the individual concerned, but to others, that is, members of his family or those depending upon him.

### Procedure to obtain leave of absence.

A simple system for dealing with these cases has been adopted. Forms of application have been supplied to every Depot Battalion and an officer of each battalion has been detailed whose duty it is to give them immediate attention. The man concerned should on reporting to his unit state that he desires to apply for leave of absence on one or more of the grounds mentioned and his application form will then be filled out and forwarded to Militia Headquarters, Ottawa. In the meantime, if the case appears meritorious, the man will be given provisional leave of absence for thirty days so that he may return home and continue his civil occupation while his case is being finally disposed of.
