Mr. Chas. Pierce's sawmill at the river is now running smoothly and merrily.

Rev. S. Boal delivered addresses at South Porcupine last week in behalf of the Navy League and its noble patriotic work for the sailors of the Empire.

At the United Church, Cochrane, Melvin Hobson and Mrs. E. A. Hughes both of Timmins, were united in marriage on Wednesday, June 26th, by Rev. Geo. A. Steel.

Before leaving South Porcupine last week for his new duties as Chaplain with the overseas forces, Rev. T. Andrews was presented with an address and a purse of gold as an expression of the esteem held for him in South End.

Towards the end of the game the contest became very close and at the end of the ninth innings the game was a tie. In the extra innings the Merchants won by one. It was some game, all right, and the people, like Oliver Twist, ask for "More."

Chief Wilson and his assistants are deserving of credit for clearing out of town last week a couple of gangs of women whose activities are of general moral and financial injury to all but the doctors and the devil.

D.D.G.M Bro. Martin Myles, accompanied by Bros. W. H. Pritchard and Hugh Boyle, paid an official visit to Cochrane Lodge of the I.O.O.F. last week and officiated at the installation of officers there.

Victor Wikkallo went over from Timmins to Schumacher the other day and got a bottle of liquor. Then Constables Rayeroff and Bennett got Victor and his bottle, and Magistrate Atkinson will decide tomorrow who really is the Victor in the charge laid for having liquor in a public place. In the meantime Victor is out on \$225 bail.

Miss Ethel Lafferty, for a time stenographer in J. W. Mahon's law office here, has taken a position in the Town site office of the Abitibi Power & Paper Co. at Iroquois Falls. Miss Lafferty was very popular here in many circles and will be much missed, especially in the D.Y.B. Club where she has given untiring, faithful and efficient service.

To-morrow, July 11th is the anniversary of the Porcupine Fire of 1911 that wiped out Pottsville and South Porcupine, razed the buildings and equipment on the Hollinger, Dome and other mines, and did other property damage, as well as causing the death of between 70 and 80 people in this district. Thanks to the protection afforded now from forest fires, both by the Province and by Providence, this district is not at present in danger of a recurrence of the disaster. The fire rangers are doing good work in protecting against the bush fires, but the rains are even more effective as guards against this menace.

Cobalt Councillors, and, incidentally, the ratepayers received a shock last week when the estimates for the year were presented and it was found that the collectable revenue would not equal the requirements of the estimates as submitted. Even a 45 mill rate would not raise enough to meet the expenditures planned. Everybody has been thinking that Cobalt was in unusually good financial condition and position, so the probability of a high tax rate came as an unpleasant surprise. The Council deferred the striking of a tax rate, when the situation was understood, and the matter is to be further considered, with a view to economizing and cutting down expenses.

Chief Wilson last week received an answer to a letter written by him to the Forestry Department regarding the case of H. LeBarre recently placed under arrest by the Chief on the charge of illegally carrying firearms. Chief Wilson has held that being a game warden did not entitle a man to carry a revolver, while the fire rangers were specially forbidden to have firearms with them. The letter from the Provincial Forester endorses this view, saying that enquiry at the Fish and Game branch shows that there is no authority given for game warden to carry fire arms, while the regulations of the Forestry Department positively and distinctly forbid the carrying of revolvers, etc., by those on the fire-ranging staff.

Wm. Marynuk, one of the two men arrested on a charge of stealing \$700 from a fellow Austrian by the highway route, escaped from Cobalt jail on Thursday last. He was allowed to remain in the corridor of the jail and he made his escape in broad daylight by bending back the bars on the window. All the previous day a number of foreigners remained in the vicinity of the jail and one at least became so disorderly that his arrest was necessary. In fairness, it is not right to condemn the foreigners too harshly. If one man may be rescued from jail by one riot, why should not another alien be delivered by the cover of another disorder? If judges assist in the setting at naught of the good work of local police and magistrates, are the foreigners altogether to be scorned for taking advantages? If the aliens are lawless fellows, the British are still more corrugated jackasses.

MAY BE FOUR-TEAM BASEBALL LEAGUE HERE.

The success of the week-end baseball game this week has gingered up some of the baseball enthusiasts of the town and Timmins accordingly may have a four-team league. The teams will likely be composed of the office men, the merchants, the Hollinger, and the T. & N.O. staff. The last named is not definite, but some of the T. & N.O. men claim they have sufficient talent for a good ball team. In any event, three good teams could easily be secured with the available talent, and the league would provide clean, healthy amusement and recreation for the outdoor days. Get busy, boys!
