Timmins News in Brief

Mr. Harry Rutledge is visiting at his home in New Liskeard.

Mrs. J. A. Crause returned last week from a vacation in Toronto.

Mr. J. W. Reed left on Sunday for a business trip to Haileybury.

The next regular meeting of the D. Y.B. Club will be held at the home of Mrs. Thos. Blackman on Monday evening.

Mr. G. N. Pearce, of Manilla, and daughter, Mrs. A. Varcoe, of Ashburn, have been the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. McInnis, Moneta.

Mr. Thos. Hogg has accepted a position with the Abitibi Power & Paper Co. at Iroquois Falls and left for that place on Sunday.

Mr. Chas. Barnard, driver of the Fire team spent a few days last week visiting new Liskeard, Haileybury and other points south.

Constable Greer and family returned on Monday night after a few weeks' holiday spent at their old home at Charteris, Que., and other Eastern points.

Owing to the absence of some members of the Council, there was no quorum for the regular meeting of the body on Monday afternoon, so the Council will hold its next meeting at the call of the Mayor, probably next week.

Mrs. Jas. Heppelstone returned this week on leave until further notice from military service, and is back at his desk at A. S. Fuller's office. This is his third or fourth attempt to get overseas, each time being unable to get by the eagle-eyed medical staff.

A local lover of baseball suggests a game between the Knights of Columbus and the Masons to follow the game between the two Masonic Lodges this week-end. He points out that a good team of baseball artists could be secured among the K. of C. members here, some of the names mentioned upholding this possibility.

Dominion Police Claudery left this week for Toronto, having left the service after several months' work in Timmins and district. It is his intention to go West in the near future. With the leaving of Officer Claudery, Timmins is left without any representative of the active military service police. The work here in connection with the enforcement of the Military Service Act will be carried on from Iroquois Falls, at least for the present.

Mr. C. O'Connor, who has been on the Dominion Police force stationed here for the enforcement of the Military Service Act, left last week for Toronto in the hope of being able to get overseas again in khaki. Mr. O'Connor spent sometime in the trenches being wounded more than once and eventually being invalided home to Canada on account of the loss of an eye. However, he still is anxious to serve King and Country further, and believes that he could give useful service in some of the branches for which absolute physical fitness is not imperative. Before leaving here he expressed his appreciation of the kindness shown to him in Timmins. "I hope that all the boys from Timmins who are now doing their bit overseas may be spared to come back and enjoy the many privileges and kindnesses that I have enjoyed in my short stay in the Camp," he said.

A big crowd of interested spectators witnessed the week-end game of baseball. The teams playing were somewhat the same as the previous week, with a few changes.
