Timmins News in Brief

Mrs. A. R. Globe and family are back in Camp after a visit to Toronto.

Mr. Syd. Beanland, who is now at Boston Creek, visited Timmins during the week-end.

Mrs. Wm. Rinn, who has been under going hospital treatment at North Bay has returned home much improved in health.

The sympathy of all will be extended to Mr. and Mrs. M. Katz, Fourth Avenue, in the death on Tuesday last of their infant child aged 5 days.

The Cochrane Post last week says: "Mrs. Jack Williams and Miss Margaret Williams accompanied Mrs. Poupart to Timmins last Friday, and expect to visit there for a week or so.

The Dance, given under the auspices of the Baseball Clubs, in the Masonic Hall last Friday night proved both successful and enjoyable. There was a good attendance, the music and refreshments were all that could be desired, and a general pleasing evening was passed by all attending. As a result of the event the Red Cross will benefit to the extent of \$16 to \$20, the net proceeds being in that neighborhood.

Lieut. C. Tomlinson, one of the Princess Pats Battalion, has been appointed Inspector of the Northern Ontario division of the Dominion Police. This post was formerly held by Lieut. Bob Dibble, famous both as an aviator and a returned soldier. Lieut. Tomlinson has been making a tour of his field, organizing and arranging his forces. He was here last week, and there are five of his men now at work in the immediate district.

Returned soldiers in the canvassing line were here in force last week. Two returned men in uniform were here soliciting subscriptions for The Veteran, the official organ of the returned heroes. They made a noteworthy "clean-up." Five returned soldiers were also here in the interests of the Maclean publications. They also did considerable business for this Toronto firm.

Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Easton moved to town on Saturday last and will be decided acquisitions to the good citizenship of Timmins. They have taken up residence in the house recently occupied by Hill, Clarke and Francis on Fourth Avenue. Mr. Easton disposed of his furniture business before leaving South Porcupine and he is confining his efforts here to the undertaking, embalming and picture framing lines.

The Advance owes an apology to Miss Ruby Hawley, of Schumacher, for inadvertently omitting her name from the list of successful students at the recent Entrance examinations in this district. Miss Ruby Hawley was one of the successful candidates winning a good place among those now entitled to attend High School. The omission of her name and that of another candidate referred to a week ago was apparently due to the dropping of a line as set up on the linotype machine in this office.

Announcement is made from Ottawa that the Dominion Government will send a force of about 4000 men to represent Canada in the army being raised to assist the Russians and Czechoslovaks in their struggle against the Central Powers. There are two questions raised by such an announcement:—(1) Would it not be as well to fight the Bolsheviki pro-Germans at Brantford, Windsor, and other Ontario towns? (2) Will Judge Rose sentence Consvoitch to be the leader of Canada's expeditionary forces to Siberia?

Mr. Jack Maclean returned on Saturday evening from Toronto where he has been taking osteopathic treatment. From this form of treatment he has received much benefit and expects that the further treatment to be taken shortly will completely relieve him from the back troubles that have seriously handicapped him during the past year or so. "Jack" was in Toronto at the time of the recent riots in that city and happened to be stalled in a motor car near part of the scene of action. "It was the quickest work you can imagine," he says. "The soldiers made the speediest and the most complete job of the work they had undertaken. It only took them a few minutes to completely wreck one of the foreign restaurants. They smashed marble chairs and counters, leaving them in small pieces. It was the same with plate glass windows and the equipment generally. The police were swept aside easily; they had no show at all. It was the quickest work I have seen for a long time."

A new Union Church was formerly opened at Huntia a week ago, Bev. R. E. Morton, of Iroquois Falls, having charge of the proceedings, and being assisted by Rev. W. J. Arms, South Porcupine, Rev. E. M. Burgess, Jack-sboro, Rev. J. W. Edwards, Cochrane, and the pastor at Huntia, Rev. R. E. Benson. The church opens entirely free from debt. County Master D. McDougall, of Iroquois Falls, also organized and opened the Huntia branch of the L.O.L. in the new church building.

Among the list of appointments made last week by W. H. Wardrop, K.C., the Masonic Grand Master, to the Grand Lodge of Canada, A.F. & A.M. in the Province of Ontario, was V.W. Bro. Jas. H. Brown, new Liskeard, as Grand Superintendent of Works. V. W. Bro. Brown was one of the visitors to Timmins at the recent institution of Northern Lights Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, and he has many friends here who will be both interested and pleased at the appointment and the honor thus conferred.

Officers Greer, Sally and Allen raided a gambling party in an alien boarding house early Sunday morning and arrested three who were in the game. Later in the early morning Officers Greer and Sally raided another trio gambling on the Lord's Day Before Justice of the Peace Montgomery on Monday three of the men were fined \$10 and costs each, and the other three \$5 and costs. They were all either Russians or Austrians. One of them was Saval Proux, who has been so often picked up by the police that he must think now that they are specially after him because he used to have a moustache like the Kaiser.

Another move is being made in the matter of thinking about the development of the peat resources of the North Land. Mr. A. Anrep, expert for the Dominion Government, together with Mr. A. A. Cole, of the Peat Commission, is making a preliminary investigation of the peat bogs near Cochrane. It takes a long time for the Governments to get started at anything, but when the public become restless another investigation may always be commenced. Luckily, however, the peat bogs will not spoil like cold storage butter and eggs, so there can still be hope that sometime, somehow, something may be done.

The Haileyburian last week says: "Mrs. Charlotte Cameron Lessard, the wife of Lieut. Achille Lessard, of Haileybury, arrived in New York City last week from London, England, and joined her husband at Ottawa, where they are remaining for a few days at the Chateau Laurier. After a visit in Haileybury, they will take an extensive trip in the South. Mrs. Lessard is an authoress of note, and was married to Lieut. Lessard about a year ago in England." Lieut. Lessard is well known in Timmins where he frequently visited his sister, Mrs. C. G. Cummings. He was also in charge here of the returned soldiers enforcing the Military Service Act in this district some months ago.

The Dominion Police stationed here for the enforcement of the Military Service Act made a raid on the dance in the Masonic Hall last Friday evening. Two or three were found without their papers on them but were able to show that they had duly registered and were also all right as regards the Military Service Act. A German Jew, however, who was in town on commercial business was not so fortunate. He was registered as an alien enemy but had no permission to travel to Timmins. He had secured the necessary permission to travel from Toronto to North Bay, but had simply come the rest of the way to please himself. It is also said that he stopped off at several towns between Toronto and North Bay to attend to his business, though his permit did not allow this. Before Justice of the Peace Montgomery on Saturday he was fined \$1.00 and costs. It will take quite a few "One Dollar and Costs" to convince the aliens, who refuse to obey the very easy law in their behalf, that our law is not a trading joke.
