Timmins News in Brief

The Town Council will meet on Tuesday afternoon next.

Constable McInnis and family are visiting his old home at Manilla, Ont., and other points in Old Ontario.

Mr. and Mrs. F. C. H. Simms leave this week for a holiday in Toronto and other southern points.

Blueberries are reported as plentiful near Mileage 228, about one mile from Nellie Lake. The frosts have done no harm to the blueberry crop in this particular section.

Sergt. P. F. K. Gallagher, formerly of the 159th and 228th Battalion, is now in charge of road construction at the soldiers' settlement at Kapuskasing.

Mr. Thos. Torrance is spending a two weeks' holiday in North Bay and other points south. He has been talking about going on fishing trips, so his friends here will expect him to bring back a number of the finest specimens of fine big fish—stories.

Most Worshipful W. H. Wardrop, K.C., Masonic Grand Lodge Master for Canada, will visit Golden Beaver Lodge, A.F. & A.M., Timmins on Saturday evening of this week, August 31st. The honor of a visit from the Grand Master is so important an event that no doubt there will be a large gathering of the Masons of the district to mark the occasion.

Mayor J. P. McLaughlin returned last week from his trip to the south. Mrs. McLaughlin is remaining at the John Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore for treatment and will likely be away for two or three months. Her many friends in the Camp will wish for her every possible benefit from the treatment and a complete return to health.

Work is progressing very rapidly on the fine new Separate School building. The contracts for the painting and decorating were let last week to N. Racicot of Timmins, and the building will be ready for the painters very shortly it is expected. While the building work is being rushed along by the contractors, Quinlan & Co., of North Bay, close watch is kept that only the best work is done and nothing slighted. When completed the school will rank as one of the North Land's best.

Chief Roy last week arrested Chas. McDonough at South Porcupine on a charge of stealing a shirt from Reams bottom & Edwards' store. When a search was made of the shack used by the accused a number of other articles thought to be stolen were found, including several items bearing the mark of the Davidson Mine Co. McDonough was allowed out on \$300 bail until Thursday's court, but when his case was called he could not be located. The fire started in some empty sheds on the property and the reports suggest that the fire was not of accidental origin. Neighbors tell of an automobile stopping before the place a little time before the alarm of fire was given. The fire had good headway before it was discovered.
