SUDBURY CHIEF STOPS

ALIENS RUNNING ROUND

Much of the trouble and unrest among alien enemies in the North Land has been caused in part by the freedom allowed in travelling around to the alien enemies. In this way agitafors have had a fairly free hand in getting from one place to another to sow their seeds of trouble. The alien blindpiggers and the alien procurer of women for immoral purposes have also found the regulations regard ing travelling to their advantage. Recent amendments to the law have placed the municipal police and other local authorities in stronger positions in the matter of giving aliens permisson to travel. Chief Brown, of Sudbury, has taken common-sense advantage of the opportunity for the common patriotic good. Recently he has refused dozens of applications from alien enemies for permission to leave Sudbury. "There is a veritable ebb and flow of a certain type of aliens throughout the country practically all the time," says Chief Brown, who is a Scotchman. "Certainly no good, and some harm, comes from all these aliens running around," he says. As there is lots of demand for labor in Sudbury, and as he does not want to shunt off the agitators on other towns to work further harm there, he is refusing alien enemies permission to run ing alien enemies permission to run around.
