Timmins News in Brief

Mr. and Mrs. M. Nagle returned Saturday evening from their vacation in the south.

Mr. Thos. Torrance is back from his holiday at his home in North Bay and other points south.

Miss Nellie Richardson left on Wednesday last for the Rainy River district where she will be employed as a school teacher during the year.

Mr. H. C. McDonald, manager of the Imperial Bank, is away on his vacation. Mr. Hewson is relieving manager during Mr. McDonald's absence.

Mr. Frank McGuire, of the Chas. Pierce & Sons staff, left last Wednesday for a holiday at Tilsonburg, Orangeville and other Southern Ontario points.

Mr. Gilbert Eldridge, of the Northern Canada Supply Co. Store Staff, returned on Friday last from his two weeks' vacation spent at Bracebridge and other points south.

Mr. Prout, of the Beaver Mine, Cobalt, is taking Mr. C. Kemsley's place at the Hollinger. Mr. and Mrs. Kemsley leave this week for Welland, Ont. The many friends they have made in the Camp will regret their departure.

Only the careful driving of Capt. Stevens, of the V.N.T. prevented an auto accident that might have had serious results. He was coming along on the Hollinger hill and turned out to pass. As he turned to the side of the roadway the road fell away beneath the car and the auto was thus thrown into the ditch. The fact that Capt. Stevens was running slowly prevented any serious results from the collapse of this section of road. No particular harm was done to the car or its occupants, though the accident collected a crowd in short order.

The Dominion Police have been active here recently in the arrest of defaulters under the Military Service Act, and have been doing good work in this line in a commendable way. During the past few days a number of defaulters have been taken in charge and escorted to Iroquois Falls for examination and to be dealt with. The Dominion men here have made several successful trips into the bush in the district, in some cases securing men wanted and in others getting on their trail.

Mr. Harry M. Wilson, of South Porcupine, was among the visitors to Iroquois Falls on Labor Day, and friends, after noticing that he was not as seriously injured as at first feared, were tempted to call to him, "Take off your face mask, Harry!" He had strips of plaster crossed and crisscrossed over his nose and head. Last Thursday night while practising with the South End firemen for the Labor Day sports at Iroquois Falls, he was thrown off the ladder by a hose that got out of control. Medical attention was at once secured for him as it was thought he might be badly hurt. Luckily, however, his injuries were not serious, though no doubt very painful. His nose and forehead were badly cut and bruised and several stitches were necessary to close the wounds. He is now on the way to complete recovery from the injuries and from the appearance of the face mask.

The rumor or report circulated last week in town to the effect that after September 1st every person in Canada would be placed on sugar rations is one of those stories that have a certain grain of truth but yet are wide of the mark. It is not the intention of the Canada Food Board to inaugurate any card or rationing system for private families in regard to sugar, at least not at present. There are some regulations regarding sugar that go into force on September 1st but these deal only with wholesalers and retailers and do not apply to consumers. Of course, the former regulation referring to it being illegal to have more than 15 days' supply of sugar on hand at any time still applies to all consumers. In addition the Food Board has recommended a VOLUNTARY restriction by private families of the amount of sugar used. It is difficult to obtain sugar at the present time and also there is usual difficulty of getting transportation for the sugar so all should attempt to help matters out by wasting no sugar and curtailing its use so far as possible. This should be done voluntarily, and the Food Board up to date has only recommended this to private families. Should waste continue and conditions demand it, the Board will no doubt pass further regulations, but at present the wild stories about sugar rations are not supported by the law or the facts.

So far as can be learned there was "nothing doing" in Cobalt Labor Day on account of the wet weather.

Mr. Ronald Vary has left the Camp to take a position in one of the big chrome-asbestos mines at St. Cyr, Que.

Mr. Dan Warren, manager of the Northern Canada Supply Co. Store, left last week for a vacation in the south.

The dance in the Miners' Union Hall on the evening of Labor Day was one of the most successful events held this year. The attendance was very large, and the Ladies' Auxiliary, under whose auspices the dance was given, are to be congratulated on the enjoyable evening given to all attending. Colombo's Orchestra furnished the music for the occasion.

"Mr. Bert Dewar can have all the little shots at me that he likes," says the Timmins amateur gardener who planted the very early peas this year, "but though he may argue that seedling for garden produce should not be done before June and all that, I have had the satisfaction this year of taking off the THIRD crop. And the last one was as good as the first or second."

The Junior Football team from Timmins defeated Schumacher team on Tuesday of last week. The Timmins boys were all young fellows while Schumacher had four grown men playing. The game took place at Schumacher and though the Schumacher team, (or rather, some of them) were ready to fight, and wanted to fight, according to the boys from here, the Timmins lads now boast of the big victory against big odds.

Messrs. E. P. Stewart, B.A., and Mr. Gullen, K.C., of Toronto, representing the Dominion Alliance, were in Timmins over the week-end and gave addresses on temperance matters in the churches here. They touched upon the progress made during recent years in the matter of temperance and temperance legislation and the need for continued effort along these lines. Reference was also made to the effect of temperance sentiment on the prosecution of the war.

There have been a great many cases of summer complaint in the Camp during the past few weeks. A number of children have died from the disease and for a time it seemed as if the trouble were assuming the proportions of an epidemic. The cooler weather, however, has apparently helped to moderate the disease, and among adults there have been no deaths, though some have been very dangerously ill. A few are tempted to blame the trouble on the water, but this does not seem to be the chief cause, as those using wells, etc., have not been exempt nor has there been exemption among those using town or spring water. The cause more probably may be traced to the carrying power of flies and the general use of meats, etc., during the hot weather.

In hurriedly changing his clothes on Monday morning a young man who went down to Iroquois Falls for Labor Day neglected to change his military papers into the suit he wore for the occasion. After the train drew out of Porcupine the Dominion Police, who are very keen on the trail of possible defaulters on that branch of the line, found the lack of documents and the young man who is not yet nineteen had a time explaining his position. However, as many were willing to vouch for the facts of the case even to the extent of giving affidavits in the matter, he was allowed to spend the day unmolested. The incident, however, should impress on all the fact that every man at all times should carry with him the necessary papers to prove his position under the Military Service Act. While the most of the Dominion Police are reasonable and courteous they have to carry out the law, and their work is much easier if every man is ready to produce his credentials when requested. Don't forget! Carry your papers!

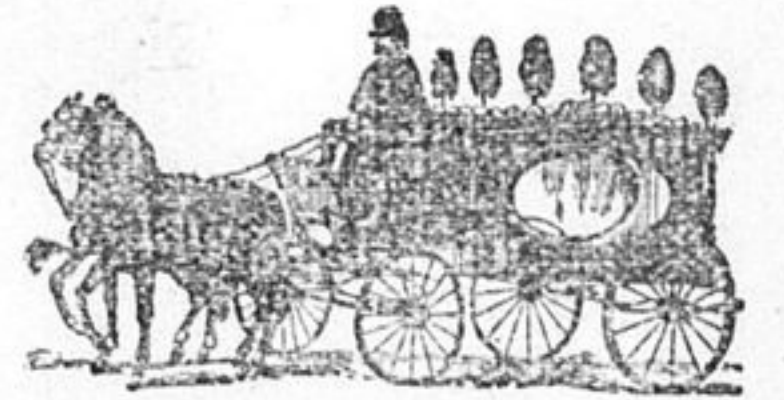
