THE BOLSHEVIKI PROVEN GERMAN AGENTS.

At the present time the United States Government is authorizing the publication of documents and other proofs that leave no possibility for doubt as to the fact that the whole Bolsheviki movement in Russia was planned and used by Germany for its own ends.

What may be of even more interest to people in Canada are proofs now being shown as to the fact that Germany ordered the sending of Bolsheviki delegates to neutral and Allied countries. These paid German agents went from Russia with instructions to foment strikes, to create riots and disorders, to destroy railways and munitions works, and in short, to do anything and everything that could be done to injure the lands they visited or to hamper the cause of the Allies.

groups are simply ignorant and unwise, but they make all the better tools for the enemy on that account. Over a year ago one of these revolutionary groups was broken up in Timmins. Then aliens came in from outside and re-organized the gang.

To those who have foolishly shown sympathy with the Bolsheviki ideas it is surely only necessary to point to its proven fruits in Russia and elsewhere, and it is particularly worthy of note that Germany, after fostering and using the Bolsheviki creed, took the sternest measures to keep the doctrine completely and strictly outside its own borders.

PRESS PRACTISES THRIPT AS WELL AS PREACHES IT.

Mr. John M. Imrie, manager of the Canadian Press Association, points out that Canadian newspapers are not only preaching thrift in these war days but they are also practising it. Some further suggestions are made by the newsprint paper section of the Canadian Press Association for economy in the use of paper, together with the resulting saving in labor, materials and transportation.

Although Canada is so largely a source of supply of pulp, this country uses much less of news print paper per capita than the U.S. For every million people in Canada 12,000 tons of news print paper have been used per year, while in the United States the figures are 18,000 tons per million of population per year.

THE TORONTO WORLD AFTER ALIEN SLACKERS.

For some years past newspapers like The Advance and The Sudbury Star, living in immediate touch with the problem, have been calling attention to the injustice to loyal Britishers through the treatment given aliens in this country. The big daily newspapers have hitherto been too occupied with other matters like Daylight Saving fads and Temperance fancies to give the notice demanded in the interests of Canada by the alien question.

AIR MEN IN CANADA ISSUE OWN MAGAZINE.

RECORD SENTENCE FOR RUSSIAN AGITATOR.

The authorities are still working on the Bolsheviki agitation centering chiefly in Timmins, Brantford, Windsor and Sudbury districts but reaching out to other places. At Sault Ste. Marie last week Wasyl Enchuk, an alleged Russian of 33 years of age, was fined \$4,000.00, or five years' imprisonment, under the War Measures Act for having objectionable literature in his possession.

Five Hundred Grateful Men and Women Wanted at Once in the Porcupine Camp

The British Navy has made possible the continued prosperity and safety of Canada during this war. The Navy has guarded our commerce and the transport of our soldiers and protected our shores. The debt to the Navy is great indeed.

Greater still is the debt to the British and Canadian Mercantile Marine. 15,000 of these sailors have been murdered by U-Boats and mines; 4,000 of them are prisoners of war; yet still 393,000 of them,—all volunteers, no conscripts,—bravely "carry on." They have carried 20 million men, 30 million tons of munitions and war supplies, and 140 million tons of food and material during the war. They have carried over 80 per cent. of the American troops. They have assured the feeding and the supplying of the Allies. They have played the game like men. Yet they have no pensions, no insurance; they have no Patriotic Fund or Red Cross. The Navy League is the organization trying to care for the 40,000 dependents left by the brave merchant sailors who have died on duty. The Navy League provides the sailors with comforts, Hospitals, Sailors' Institutes, etc. The Navy League is appealing for funds in Canada this week,—Sailors' Week. The Porcupine Consolidated Patriotic Fund agreement prevents a canvass here for this purpose at this time, but a campaign for new members for the Porcupine Branch of the Navy League is now on. You can show your sympathy by joining the League. Your subscription will go to help the sailors. If the canvassers do not hunt you up, hunt up the canvassers.
