## Timmins News in Brief

Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Ellis returned home last week after a visit to Cobalt friends.

Seven or eight teams are at work this week on the grading of Spruce street, and work is progressing satisfactorily.

Constable C. McInnis, of Moneta, has returned, accompanied by his family, from their vacation at Manila and other points south.

Her many friends in the Camp will be pleased to hear that Mrs. R. E. Sullivan, of the Dome, who underwent an operation at the Toronto Hospital recently, is making satisfactory progress to recovery.

The Harvest Thanksgiving services of St. Matthew's Church will be held on Sunday, September 29th., at the usual hours of 11 a.m. and 7.30 p.m. Holy Communion will also be celebrated at 8.30 a.m.

The National Thrift Campaign's advice may be summoned up in the two phrases:—"A dollar saved over here helps the boys over there," and "Don't administer your finances on the come-easy, go-easy plan. But Save!"

Cochrane's donation to the Navy League funds in the Sailors' Week campaign totalled \$1114.55, of which amount T. Scott, Jacksonboro, collected \$100.00, and Guy Lawson, Smooth Rock Falls, turned in \$200.00. Cochrane's objective was \$1000.00.

The building of the new Separate School continues with very satisfactory progress being made. The work is now nearing completion. Last week Mr. E. M. Allworth started on the work of the wiring and electrical installation, the contract for this important work being given to him.

Mr. I. K. Pierce left on Monday morning for Montreal to take treatment from a specialist there for what is feared to be a form of appendicitis. "Bill," as he is popularly known, has not been feeling any too well lately, and thinks it the wisest to see to the trouble before it gets too firm a grip. His innumerable friends here will wish him well, now as always, and this time in a double way.

The T. & N.O. train Saturday evening was four hours late and so automatically the Saturday evening train became the Sunday morning train. If the Daylight Saving scheme were enlarged so as to allow a perfectly free handling of the clock, this sort of thing might be avoided and all trains could arrive on time. The delay Saturday evening (or Sunday morning) was due to the breaking of an axle on the engine of the train coming from the south. A new engine had to be brought from North Bay to take the train on its way.

Mr. P. Delisle, for five years with the Machinists' Department, of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines, left on Sunday's National for Amos, Que., where he will take charge of the power plant of the Martin Gold Mines. Mr. Delisle has made many friends in the Camp during his stay here and all will regret his departure while wishing him all success in his new place. He served some years in the French Navy and in 1914 responded to the call of his country again, serving during the war for about a year. In 1915 he was injured in an accident to one of the machines on board his ship and was honorably discharged from the French Navy, returning to his position here at the Hollinger, where he has been employed ever since.

The attention of The Advance has been called to the words, "mileage, fees, etc.," in the reference last week to the moving of the Division Court office from South Porcupine to Timmins. A South End friend complains regarding these words. The suggestion in The Advance was to the effect that as the larger proportion of the Division Court cases originate in Timmins, there would naturally be a material saving in "mileage, fees, etc.," by the moving of the office here. The South End friend maintains there would be no difference in fees as these are established by statute. He admits the saving in mileage, but denies that there is any "etc." It must be admitted by all that many will save in legal costs or fees (that is, payments to their lawyers) through removal of the Division Court office, as it will not cost as much for Timmins as it cost to have them go to South End. So there WILL be a saving in "fees" all right. And there will be also a saving in postage telephone calls, and so forth, so the "etc." It might not have been the best form of English to claim a saving in "mileage, fees, etc.," but it was the best good sense. Good afternoon.

Timmins troop of Boy Scouts will parade to St. Matthew's Church on Sunday next at 11 a.m.

Mrs. T. Lawlor and son returned this week from their extended visit to the West, their pleasant trip taking them as far as Vancouver, B.C.

The Timmins Billiard Room owners have subscribed \$50 to the Navy League of Canada, the contribution being made through the Ontario Billiard Association.

There was a very enjoyable and successful dance at Connaught on Friday evening last. The proceeds were in aid of the Catholic Army Huts for the comfort of overseas soldiers.

The eulre and dance on Monday evening by the local L.O.L. proved a very pleasing and successful event in every way. The attendance was large and all thoroughly enjoyed themselves. Colombo's orchestra furnished the music for the occasion.

Byrnes Presbyterian Church are holding a social evening Thursday night in the Church. One of the purposes of the gathering is to form a Social Club for the coming winter. All interested are cordially invited to be present Thursday evening.

Mr. H. J. Lefelzer, who has been in the Porcupine for the past seven years and so can justly be termed an old-timer, leaves this week for Sudbury, Ont., where he has a good position with one of the big business concerns.

The canvass for new members for the Porcupine Branch of the Navy League still continues. This week Mrs. Rees brought in 5 new members. Last week Mrs. Newman added one more to the list of six secured by her. Other canvassers are working, the failure of the League buttons to arrive being one of the chief drawbacks. Some of the canvassers, however, also notice an unpatriotic and selfish attitude in many quarters.

Mr. Jos. Gorman, of Cobalt, was last week elected as one of the Ontario Executive of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress at the annual session of the union body in Quebec. "Jimmy" Simpson was defeated for re-election as vice-president, and James C. Waters, who has been prominent in labor circles for many years, was ousted from the presidency of the Congress by Thos. Moore, of Niagara Falls.

Haileybury is troubled just at present with an epidemic of book agents. The Haileyburian thinks they should pay a transient trader's license, or move on to some other town "where they need books more than they do in Haileybury." The Haileyburian does not specify where that place may be, but Scotty jumps up and threatens to biff anybody in the eye who will dare even to whisper "South—Bend, Indiana."

In times past any boy who could behave himself, and some who would not, were allowed in the local pool rooms without any question, though the law forbids boys under 18 to frequent these places. Last week, however, the police gave due warning to the local pool room proprietors that this breach of the law would no longer be permitted, and so henceforth no boy under 18 will be free to frequent pool rooms, until something else turns up.

A certain express man suggests that the customs office is to be moved to Porcupine Junction so as to be equally distant from both Timmins and Iroquois Falls. There is fine sarcasm in this suggestion as it touches on the standing excuses given by authorities for the inconvenience to the majority of the public by the maintenance of public offices in places where the public cannot be conveniently or economically served. But with Porcupine Junction putting in electric lights it is hard to say what benefits and advantages may be seen there when the darkness is dispelled for twenty-four hours in the day.

At a meeting last week of the Toronto National Labor Council a motion was passed calling the attention of the Provincial Secretary for Ontario to the need for a night watchman at every hotel or boarding house where 25 or more people sleep. The Labor Council made special reference to the recent Iroquois Falls Hotel fire where six people lost their lives. In this connection it is only fair to state that there was a night watchman at the Iroquois Hotel and in this respect the Abitibi Company had taken due precautions against danger. The proposal of the Labor Council, however, is worthy of full consideration in the interests of the public safety.
