Timmins News in Brief

Mr. A. S. Fuller is on a trip to Boston and other southern points.
 Mr. H. E. Montgomery, Clerk-Treasurer, left last week on his vacation.
 Mrs. Geo. Lake and children returned on Thursday evening from their holiday at Toronto and other points south.
 Mr. R. Banks, of the T. & N.O., has been transferred to a North Bay run, Brakeman Downey taking his place here.

The work on the grading of Spruce street is being carried along as rapidly as possible in view of the difficulty in securing labor, etc.

W. H. Wilson, Clerk of the Township of Tisdale, is attending District Court at Haileybury this week on behalf of the Township in one or two tax suits.

Miss Lillian Kellett, Deaconess, of the Tract Society's Mission to Sailors on Inland Waters, was collecting funds in the Camp this week, the money to be expended for books for the soldiers and libraries for the Canadian Navy. In Schumacher Miss Kellett collected \$6.10, and in Timmins \$71.35.

The funeral took place on Monday morning to the R. C. Church and cemetery, of Henry Belanger, the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Belanger. The baby died on Saturday after a brief illness. The cause of death was intestinal toxemia. The child was only six months old.

Work on the alterations and improvements to the Timmins police station are proceeding rapidly and well. This new municipal building will be used for clerk and treasurer's office, tax collector's office, assessor's office, police court, council chambers, etc. It is being equipped with a furnace; the cells are being placed in a new basement; and an extension to the present storey will also be made.

New Liskeard Fair last week is reported as a very good agricultural show, but poorly attended, no doubt on account of the weather and the war,—the two standing excuses of the North Land. The showing of potatoes was unusually good at New Liskeard this year, and there were other striking proofs of what the North Land can do in the way of agriculture and market gardening.

Chen Sze Yin, editor of the Vancouver New Republic, has an article in the last issue of The Canadian Courier in which he advocates the idea that Chinamen in Canada should go on farms, rather than confining themselves to running restaurants and laundries. He says that for intensive farming the Chinaman has even the Belgian beaten. A Chinaman can make a living farming a plot no bigger than a back yard, he says. Timmins has a Chinaman farmer who has made good. John Chow is one of the successful pioneers of North Land farming where so many have failed.

Jimmy Deacon is all ready to enter and win any competition next year either here or elsewhere for chasing the greasy pig. Some corrugated villain opened a crate in the express car one day last week and let out a number of pigs. "It was a dirty Irish," said Jimmy, "but it might have been worse,—they might have also opened the car door." At first Jimmy was a little bashful with the porkers, not being sure but that they might kick or punt or bite, but he got used to them after a time and so worked on their better feelings that they went quietly back into the crate. Jimmy says that to be a real expressman these days a man has to be an up-to-date farmer, so that he can talk sense into a flying pig, or whistle escaping fowl back to their crates.

Any in Timmins who may be on friendly terms with the Austrians, Russians, or other foreigners who have been working or studying along Bolshevik lines should warn them against the serious risks they are taking by even having Bolshevik literature in their houses. The recent Order-in-Council noted elsewhere provides heavy penalties for having any of this literature, for belonging to any of the proscribed societies, or for attending the meetings of any of these groups. Last week at Toronto Magistrate Denison sentenced Constantine Goshink, the secretary of one of these anarchistic groups, to a fine of \$1000 or 3 years in prison for having objectionable literature. Any aliens having Bolshevik literature would do well to burn it at once, or hand it over to Officer Allen. If in any doubt as to it being objectionable, it will be best to take no chances, but to destroy it or hand it over to the officer.

Messrs. Colburne, Robinson, and other express and T. & N.O. men went duck shooting last week. Each reports on the other as shooting once into the lake and thus getting a duck down. But it was great sport, anyhow!

Euro Kyllonen, the five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Kyllonen died on Monday of this week after a brief illness. Death was due to meningitis. The funeral took place on Friday morning to the Protestant cemetery.

The Rebekahs dance for to-night and the Firemen's dance to-morrow evening have both been cancelled in deference to the desire of the authorities to take every means possible to minimize all danger of the spread of the diphtheria infection.

Engineer Lou Shaw, of the T. & N.O., is spending his vacation in the U.S.A. Writing from Chicago last week he reported unusual prosperity and hustle across the line, with business booming, money plentiful, and the ladies all handsome and well-gowned.

Dr. L. Gagnon, Veterinary, of Haileybury, was in town this week and in view of the apparent needs here in his profession, he has decided to make regular visits here. These visits will be at least once a month. While here this week he gave attention to the large number of horses in use by Mr. Matt. Boivin.

Application has been made at Haileybury for the administration of the estate of the late Orelie Della Donne, who shot herself in Timmins on Aug. 1st, after taking the life of a young lady here. The applicant is his brother. There was \$150 on the person of Della Donne after the tragedy and he had a further \$500 in the bank. The apparent heirs are a father and sister in Italy and the applicant (a brother living at Sesequinika). These will share equally in the estate.

Householders should take notice that the second instalment of taxes is due and payable on or before October 15th. After that date the means and methods for collecting taxes are liable to be disagreeable for all concerned. Householders, therefore, will not only save interest charges, but will also save themselves unnecessary annoyance by seeing that all their taxes are paid by the 15th.

As the result of a raid made last week on a Sudbury poolroom the Dominion police got eight Finlanders who were not usefully and regularly employed, and these eight were consequently fined by the Magistrate and advised to find useful work at once. The law against idleness, like every other law, must be enforced to be of any benefit, and "keeping at it all the time" is the only way that the authorities can win respect for the law or for themselves.

Owing to a break in one of the parts of the pump at the central station last Wednesday, South Porcupine had its water supply shut off for a time. The Big Dome, however, came to the rescue with the loan of the necessary auxiliary machinery and South Porcupine was in this respect all ready for the unexpected visit of the Fire Underwriters' Inspector on Saturday. Had he visited South End a day or two earlier, however, the unfortunate accident could have been explained.

Mr. G. McIntosh, who was injured in an accident at South Porcupine some days ago, was brought last week to St. Mary's hospital, Timmins, for treatment. The injuries received and the shock suffered to the system through the accident had left him in a rather serious condition, but at the hospital here he is making excellent progress to recovery. His general health is now good and it is expected that the injured leg be set in a plaster cast in a day or two. All will be pleased to know that Mr. McIntosh is recovering nicely from the accident.

Mrs. S. Buevetsky and children are remaining in the West for a few weeks' further visit. Mr. Buevetsky returned here last week as noted in our last issue.
