**THE HUNS AT THE END  
OF THE ROPE.**

Since July 18th the Teutonic forces in Europe and the East have met nothing but defeat. On the Western Front the German line has been steadily pushed back, the forced retreat gathering such momentum that it threatens at any moment to become a complete and disastrous rout. The surrender of Bulgaria, the successes of the Allied Armies in Palestine, and other victories of arms and statesmanship in the East make it clear beyond question that (to use an Irishism) "Germany's sun has set in the East." There is no hope in the East for the Hun; there is nothing but menace and disaster promising in the West, and conditions at home for the Teuton are growing swiftly to the point of being beyond bearance. So, Germany, Austria and Turkey have asked for an armistice, and a conference to secure general peace. There could be but one answer to such a proposal, and that answer a thundering "No!" from the civilized nations of the world. To the brave souls who have given their lives for the Great Cause,

to those who to-day risk all dangers for the freedom of the world, the world owes it that no treating, no parleying shall take place with the nations who have disregarded every sense of honor and decency, who have committed murder and rape. The Huns are not honorable warriors to be considered round a peace conference table. They are degenerate criminals to be punished by an aroused world. They have used the "White Flag" before too often for their own treacherous ends. As the French newspapers almost with the one voice assert, there can be nothing now but an unconditional surrender. No sane man in the Allied Nations would have the war continue one single hour longer than necessary, but every thoughtful man must recognize that no breathing space, no truce, no opportunity to recover must be allowed to the forces of evil.

It may take a little while longer of effort and struggle to bring the criminal nations to a complete and unconditional surrender. But it will be worth it all. And nothing else will be safe or sane. From talk of "the will to power," "world domination," and "victory by arms," the Germans have reached the place where they plead for peace. In the next few months they will travel further along the same road, and soon indeed they will reach the point where they will be ready to "give themselves up," to "plead guilty," and to bear their punishment and pay the penalty for the abominations they have committed. Hold fast!

**TEMISKAMING LAWYERS  
FORMING ASSOCIATION.**

During the sessions of the District Court at Haileybury last week there was naturally a large gathering of legal men from all over the North Land. There is an old saying about some-

body finding something for everybody to do when there is nothing else doing, or words to that effect. At any rate the legal lights got together and the first steps were taken for the formation of a Law Association in Temiskaming. A committee was appointed to deal further with the matter and probably by the time of the higher court sittings at Haileybury on November 19th, everything will be in readiness for the formal launching of the Temiskaming Law Association. Practically every up-to-date county in Ontario has its Law Association and this form of lawyer's union usually accomplishes much good for the profession without doing any special harm to the general public. Indeed, there are known cases where it has been of distinct public advantage to have a Law Association, while there is always the indirect benefit that what helps one class of the community very often works good for the community in general. The chief questions to be dealt with by the Temiskaming Law Association when finally organized will include the establishment of a law library, the drawing up of a tariff of fees, and the providing of better accommodation for lawyers at the Haileybury court house. It is hoped to interest all barristers and solicitors in Temiskaming and secure a representative membership for the proposed association.

Mr. W. J. Bauldry, late of Cochrane and well-known throughout the North Land, has been appointed Colonization Agent for the T. & N.O. with headquarters at Haileybury, where suitable accommodation has been provided in the station there.

The charge against Major (Foghorn) McDonald, the well-known old-timer of the North Land, in connection with the alleged illegal wearing of uniform has been withdrawn and the case dropped on mutual understanding. Foghorn, on the other hand, took the stand that he had the right to the uniform as he was under contract to the end of the war and that his discharge from Ottawa some months ago was unauthorized and illegal. However, as he agreed to hereafter refrain from wearing the uniform, but to dress in mufti, the case was dropped. The matter came before the Montreal courts.

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**NOTICE—MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917**

**REGISTRATION OF  
UNITED STATES CITIZENS**

Male citizens of the United States living in Canada of AGES 21-30, both inclusive, MUST REGISTER BY REGISTERED POST with the Registrar under the Military Service Act of the district in which they live, during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING SEPTEMBER 28th, 1918; and such CITIZENS OF THE AGES 19, 20 AND 31-44, both inclusive, must so register during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING OCTOBER 12th, 1918. It must be emphasized that THIS INCLUDES AMERICANS LIVING IN CANADA OF THE ABOVE AGES, MARRIED AND SINGLE, and includes ALSO ALL THOSE WHO HAVE SECURED DIPLOMATIC EXEMPTION OR HAVE REGISTERED WITH AN AMERICAN CONSUL, or HAVE REGISTERED FOR MILITARY SERVICE IN THE UNITED STATES.

Registration letters may be handed to local Postmasters for despatch to the proper Registrar, under the Military Service Act.

**NOTICE—MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917**

**MEN EXEMPTED AS FARMERS**

Having in view the importance of leaving a sufficient number of men on those farms, which are actually contributing to the National Food Supply, notice is hereby given as follows:

1. ALL MEMBERS OF CLASS I POSSESSING EXEMPTION AS FARMERS which is expiring and WHO WISH TO REMAIN EXEMPT should communicate with the Registrars under the M.S.A., of their respective districts, REQUESTING AN EXTENSION IN TIME OF SUCH EXEMPTION. Questionnaires will thereupon be issued to these men by the Registrar and they will receive further exemption upon furnishing satisfactory proof that they are contributing sufficiently to the National Food Supply.

2. In order to facilitate productive employment during the Winter months, MEN EXEMPTED AS FARMERS SHOULD APPLY TO THE REGISTRARS FOR PERMITS TO ENGAGE FOR THE WINTER IN SOME OCCUPATION OF NATIONAL INTEREST, SUCH AS LUMBERING, MUNITION WORK, ETC. Such permits will serve to enable exempted farmers to pursue other useful occupations for the months during which farming operations cannot be carried on.
