Timmins News in Brief

Mr. W. E. McCoy, of the Hollinger, is spending his vacation in the south.

Mr. C. M. Auer returned on Monday evening from a visit to the south.

The Presbyterian Church here has been improved by the addition of new entrance steps, railing, etc.

Work on the improvements to the new municipal building (formerly the police station) are being rushed along at commendable pace.

Some cases of hog cholera are reported from Moneta. The infected animals were promptly destroyed and adequate measures taken to prevent further infection.

Mr. R. Allen returned last week from a trip south, and has been laid up since with an attack of grippe. He is now, however, practically recovered and will be out again in a few days.

Sergt. J. M. Studor, who went overseas with one of the first battalions recruited in the North Land, arrived home in Camp on Thursday evening last. His many friends in the Porcupine are pleased indeed to see him in the Camp once more.

Mr. J. B. Speller, of the V.N.T. Mine, left this week for Kirkland Lake where he and Mr. R. E. Sullivan, formerly of the Dome, have the contract for the installation of the electrical plant and system at the Teck-Hughes mine.

Water in the basement of the T. & N. O. station has made necessary the provision for more adequate drainage of the station property. Accordingly, for some days past a gang of workmen have been busy tearing up the street and throwing the dirt around to put in a new system of drains, etc.

Mr. Geo. Fulton, of Timmins, and Miss Winnifred Starling, of South Porcupine, were married at South End by Rev. Mr. Arms on Monday evening. Their friends extend best wishes.

According to figures submitted at the last regular meeting of the Cochrane Town Council the taxable assessment of the town for 1919 will be \$1,722,471. The total exempt assessment is given as \$600,905. The Ontario Government Railway and the Dominion Government Railway properties being assessed for \$543,775, and none of this being taxable.

It was intended to re-open the public school here this week, but at a meeting of the School Board last week it was decided to defer the opening until next Monday. The reason for this was that the Thanksgiving Day holiday would take one day off the teaching days this week while the Teachers' Institute would mean two or three more days off, so that it was hardly worth while to open the school for the day or two that would be available for teaching this week.

MEMBER OF BAND DIES FOLLOWING OPERATION

Was a Popular and Respected Citizen of Timmins for Past Four Years.

There was general regret felt at the death in Haileybury hospital last week, following an operation for appendicitis, of Antony Dellesandra, one of the members of the Timmins Band. He was popular and respected by all who knew him and was an especial favorite with his fellow countrymen from Italy. When the remains reached here Thursday night a large number of the members of the Timmins Italian Society were present at the station and these, with other friends, formed a procession to follow the body from the station. The funeral took place on Friday afternoon and was very largely attended. The Timmins Band played funeral marches to the R. C. Church and grave and the Italian Society had over one hundred members in the cortege, all wearing the badge of the Society. Following the custom of their country, five young girls in white followed the hearse carrying flowers. The procession was in charge of Mr. Leo Masciolo, chief of the Italian Society here, and large silk British and Italian flags were carried at the head of the parade. Rev. Fr. LeDuc conducted the services and interment was made in the R.C. cemetery.

Engineer Lou Shaw returned last week from a pleasant three weeks' holiday in the U.S.A. He visited several of the leading cities there and reports the weather as the finest and business booming in practically every line.

Mr. and Mrs. J. P. McLaughlin returned home last week from the John Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, where Mrs. McLaughlin has been undergoing treatment. Mrs. McLaughlin has received much benefit from the treatment and all her friends will wish for her continued recovery to complete health.

Through the efforts of the local fuel commissioner, Mr. H. J. Brown, Cochrane has been able to secure a new allotment of anthracite coal for the town. Instead of the 540 tons of coals previously allotted, Cochrane will get 1140 tons for the winter. Three carloads of coal are said to be now on the way to Cochrane.

Mr. T. F. King returned last week from Toronto where he spent some days attending the annual convention of the Ontario Billiards Associations. Among the matters of general interest at the Convention was the voluntary agreement of the billiard and poolroom proprietors to restrict the use of fuel in the national interests during the coming winter.

The Dance given in the Masonic Hall on Friday evening last by the Timmins Volunteer Fire Brigade proved a most enjoyable event, though the fear of the "Flu," apparently kept many from attending. At any rate the attendance was small, and no effort having been made to sell tickets, the proceeds did not quite cover expenses. However, those who attended report it as one of the best dances ever held here so far as a pleasant time and good company are concerned. Appel's orchestra furnished good music for the occasion.

Hon. Dr. H. Beland, formerly Postmaster General in the Laurier Cabinet, and for four years a prisoner of war in Germany, is to deliver an address at Sudbury on Thursday evening of this week in St. Andrew's church under the auspices of the Red Cross. This is his first visit to the Great North since his release from Germany. Dr. Beland's wife died while he was a German prisoner in Belgium but the Huts refused to allow him to see her during her illness. Dr. and Mrs. Beland were on their wedding tour in Belgium when war broke out and Dr. Beland remained to give medical assistance so badly needed to the stricken inhabitants of Belgium.

ONTARIO'S MINING LAWS NOT SO BAD AFTER ALL.

Much has been heard of the terrible corrugated spiffitions evil of the Mining laws of Ontario. One expert mining journalist (we are a courteous people, sometimes) has given columns upon columns to consign condemnation of Ontario's mining laws. He has conceived himself, perhaps, that there are no worse mining laws on top of earth or underground. But some days ago Mr. Marcel of the Quebec Department of Mines was in the Porcupine Camp with a view to studying on the ground the conditions here and learning something of Ontario's mining laws and how they are viewed by miners, prospectors and others, with a view to securing information and suggestions for the improvement of Quebec's mining laws. It is apparently admitted that the Quebec laws are not as favorable to mining development as Ontario's laws. So if Ontario has such a desperately wicked set of mining laws as Friend S. R. Clarke has suggested, words will fail altogether in regard to Quebec laws. It is in any case a fact that Quebec has not made the same proportion of development in mining matters that Ontario has done in recent years, and while Ontario's laws regarding mining might no doubt be improved in several small details, they work fairly well in the main, and Onee will likely adopt many of the features of the Ontario mining law.
