## NORTH BAY WANTS FIRE CHIEF BORLAND.

In looking recently for a new Fire Chief, North Bay turned its attention to Fire Chief A. Borland, of Timmins, once described by Councillor Pierce as "the best fire chief in Canada." At the time many were of the opinion that Councillor Pierce was using strong language in this description, but since that day Timmins has had such valuable experience of the worth and ability of the Fire Chief as to share generally the enthusiasm shown by Councillor Pierce a year ago. Consequently, it was only to be expected that when North Bay invited Chief Borland to come down with the view of securing his services as Fire Chief at North Bay, Timmins should suggest that he make no definite arrangement without first giving this town opportunity to offset any offer from North Bay. Chief Borland visited North Bay last week and the Council there were very favorably impressed with his record and experience. He

did not, however, close any agreement with them, pending the action of the local Council, the majority of whom seem to agree with the citizens in general that it would be a serious loss to Timmins and to the fire-protection and insurance rates of the town if Chief Borland were allowed to leave here at this time. The Council meeting Monday did not deal with the question, probably on account of the absence of the Chairman of the Fire and Light Committee, so it is still possible that Chief Borland may accept the North Bay position and Timmins thus lose the most noted fire chief that has been in the North Land.

Cobalt Red Cross workers are disinfecting and sterilizing all articles now being sent overseas. The idea is to prevent all possibility of the influenza infection being carried to the soldiers through the articles sent from Cobalt. The disinfecting takes a lot of extra time and labor, but the Cobalt ladies, who hold the Canadian record for Red Cross work, consider neither time nor trouble when working for the brave men overseas.
