Timmins News in Brief

Mr. and Mrs. James Dubroy, Monday, and four children are seriously ill with the Influenza.

BORN—At Strathroy, Ont., on Sunday, October 24th, 1918, to Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Thomas (formerly of Timmins)—a son.

The sympathy of all will go out to Miss Edith Wilkes, formerly of Timmins, in the death of her mother at Iroquois Falls. Death was due to heart trouble and advancing years.

Miss C. Ratchford last week received the sad news of the death of her brother, Pte. Edward Ratchford, who died from wounds. Miss Ratchford left last week for her home at Sturgeon Falls.

First Air Mechanic G. F. Garrett, of the Royal Air Force, was a visitor to Timmins during the past week. He was formerly with the Imperial Bank here, and the many friends he made in town were pleased to see him again. They will also be pleased to note his advance in rank to First Air Mechanic. He is stationed at Camp Mohawk, Deseronto.

Last night a man named Carl Anderson showed such evidences of being dangerously unbalanced that his arrest resulted and he will be examined as to his sanity. It is said that he is a Swede and there is a suggestion that his condition has resulted at least in part from the recent progress of the war. One of the objectionable actions that resulted in his being taken into custody was his performance with a large knife at the Windsor Hotel last night. He was furiously stabbing the wall with this knife and it was feared that he might take another turn with the wicked-looking weapon.

Mr. R. Eddleson, who has been ill with the Influenza, is able to be out again.

"Well, did you celebrate last night?" a business man in town was asked on Tuesday morning. "No," he replied, "I was sober last night."

Mr. W. S. Macpherson, tax collector and secretary for the Victory Loan Campaign, is able to be at his work again after a trying time with illness. He is now recovered, but not yet reached his accustomed energy and health.

Mr. H. Colborne, for some months Express Company Agent, recently applied for a transfer to the south, and is now at work in Toronto. His place here as Express Agent has been taken by Mr. W. H. Cheeseman, of North Bay.

All will be pleased to learn that "Shorty" Sheridan is continuing to make satisfactory progress to recovery from his attack of influenza. He was one of the assistants at South End and did much good work that there is special desire for his recovery and special pleasure at the reports that he is gaining each day and will soon be well again.

There will be general regret at the news of the death of Mrs. Joseph Clusseau, of South Porcupine, who died in Haileybury hospital on Sunday night. She had been undergoing medical treatment for some two months or more. A husband and one child survive and to these the sympathy of all is extended. Mr. Clusseau was just recovering from a severe attack of influenza when he was called to Haileybury on Friday last. Mrs. Clusseau's condition then being so serious that no hope was held out for her recovery.

Mr. W. Borland returned last week from his holiday at London, Woodstock, Toronto and other places south.

The Hollinger Mill has the proud distinction of having 79 per cent. of its employees as subscribers for the Victory Loan this year.

Express Messenger Robinson left last week for Winnipeg, being transferred to that division of the Canadian Express Co.

Mrs. Norman Burke and children arrived last week from Cobalt to join Mr. Burke here. The boys, who had been on the sick list from Influenza, are now all recovered.

Mr. F. M. Burke is on the sick list. The soldiers overseas have recently been sending out to their friends at home printed Field Service Postcards with everything else stroked out but the words:—"You must buy Victory Bonds to help us win the war." Last week there were several such cards received in Timmins.

The patient at St. Mary's hospital, referred to last week as causing so much trouble while delirious or unbalanced and who was to be examined as to his sanity, has since died. Every possible care was given the unfortunate man in his illness by the good Sisters of St. Mary's, but they were handicapped by the fact that the town has no proper accommodation for such cases. The difficulty experienced in controlling this man emphasized the truth of the suggestion of Dr. MeInnis that the town should provide some form of padded cell accommodation for violent cases. The patient in question had to be taken in charge by the police on more than one occasion, yet he could not be removed from the hospital because there was no other place he could be taken to. At the same time the hospital was unfairly used in being forced by humanity to keep such a violent case.
