PATRIOTIC CLUB REPORT FOR MONTH

Contributions Show Marked Falling Off During Last Few Months.

As will be noted by the report of the Treasurer given below, the contributions to the Porcupine Consolidated Fund show a decided decrease in the past few months from the record shown in earlier months of the year. In September the contributions totalled over \$2500 while in October they were \$1640.97. For November they were only \$776.12. Over \$12,000 of the total pledges is still outstanding. Apparently, the popular idea is that the war is over and the need is past. This, of course, is not a correct view. For several months at least there will be continued need for funds for patriotic purposes. Also, it should not be forgotten that the signing of the Armistice does not relieve anyone from the pledges made.

The Treasurer's report for the Porcupine Consolidated Patriotic Fund, as at November 30th., 1918, is as follows:—

Total pledges, \$37,664.00.
Receipts:—Total contributions to date for 1918, \$25,644.40; received from Timmins Red Cross, \$72.35; from Timmins D.Y.B. Club, \$106.65, proceeds of theatre nights, etc.; total, \$25,823.40.

Disbursements:—Canadian Patriotic Fund, Ottawa, \$9,000.000; Timmins Red Cross, \$4,300.00; Schumacher Red Cross, \$3,250.00; South Porcupine Patriotic Society, \$3,100.00; Timmins D.Y.B. Club, \$833.30; Salvation Army Overseas Work, \$250.00; France's Day Fund, \$300.00; Knights of Columbus Army Huts, \$200.00; sundry administration expenses, including expense of campaign in January, \$304.72; balance in bank, \$4,285.38; total \$25,823.40.

The following is the Treasurer's report as at November 20th., 1918, of the Canadian Patriotic Fund:—

Receipts:—October 31st, balance in bank, \$820.48; received from Ottawa Treasurer, \$500.00; total, \$1320.48.

Disbursements:—paid to soldiers' wives during month, \$522.85; Nov. 30th, balance in bank, \$797.63; total, \$1320.48.

DECREASE IN WAGES SAYS NEW YORK PAPER.

Opinion in banking circles seems to lead to the belief that wages of labor, particularly common labor, will drop decidedly in the near future. Now that the competitive bidding for labor has stopped at least temporarily and the shifting process from war work to peace work has brought large supplies of labor to the big industrial centres, it is not considered likely that wages can be kept up by any governmental agency much less by any fixed policy of the labor unions. Competition among working men to get new jobs now takes the place of competition among employers to get working men. The logical result is a drop in wages.

ENGINEER WHO SURVEYED COBALT TOWNSITE DEAD.

Mr. Leonard O. Clarke, civil engineer and surveyor, died recently in Toronto, aged 38 years. He was a prominent figure in his profession and had done much good work in the North Land. He enjoyed the distinction of being the engineer who surveyed the townsite of what is now the thriving town of Cobalt. For about twelve years the late Mr. Clarke was a resident of North Bay and for a time he was town engineer there. About two years ago he moved to Toronto. The funeral was conducted with Masonic Honors, the deceased being a prominent member of the Order. He was a Past Provincial Prior of the Algoma District and a member of the Sovereign Grand Priory of Canada. Of late years Mr. Clarke had been engaged on contract work for the C.P.R. on the Lake Superior Division. A wife and three children survive, and the many who esteemed the late Mr. Clarke so highly will extend to the bereaved relatives and near friends the sincerest sympathy in the death of this able and upright citizen.
