URGING CONSTRUCTION OF T. & N.O. TO JAMES BAY.

Cochrane Town Council last week held a special meeting to organize for a propaganda to ensure the early extension of the T. & N.O. Railway to James Bay. It was decided to make most strenuous representations to both the Federal and Provincial Governments in regard to the matter, and also to secure through publicity and other efforts the co-operation of all the towns of the North Land in the matter. As a first step in the work of starting the campaign Mr. James Stewart was appointed Industrial Commissioner for Cochrane. It will be his special duty to make plans and preparations for the presentation to the Government at Toronto of the arguments for the commencement of work on the James Bay extension. Associated with him will be a committee including the Mayor and three members each from the Board of Trade and the Town Council. Last week the Cochrane Council at the special meeting made an appropriation of \$1000.00 to be drawn upon in connection with the work of the campaign. The first move will be an educational propaganda to emphasize the necessity and the benefits of continuing the T. & N.O. to James Bay. This will be followed by a monster delegation from the North Land to wait on the Government and lay the merits of the case before the representatives of the people.

SOME INTERESTING FACTS FROM TELEPHONE DIRECTORY

The Porcupine Telephone Lines have just issued new telephone directories, printed at The Advance office, of course, and an estimated reader of this paper has called attention to one odd fact about the names in the directory. "Smith, Brown and Jones," he says "are supposed to be the commonest names in the world. Most directories have long lists of these particular names, but the Porcupine Telephone directory only mentions one Smith, one Brown and not a Jones at all." The most common name in the Porcupine Telephone directory is "Wilson," this name appearing six times, three times in Timmins list and three times in the South Porcupine list. "Moore" comes next with five phones in Timmins and one in South Porcupine, though this list of six is made up of the business and residence phones of three residents of the Camp.

There are 154 phones listed for the Timmins exchange in the new directory the list including Moneta and Schumacher. Many new names have been added since the last directory was printed and some changes have been made. There is no change, however, to the fact that for good printing "the way you want it, at the time you want it," you still should phone 26.

For South Porcupine, there are 66 phones listed, this number including the Dome and Golden City.

IMPERIAL BANK INSTALS MODERN SAFETY BOXES.

Last week the Timmins branch of the Imperial Bank installed the first section of its new and up-to-date system of safety deposit boxes. These boxes are of the most modern construction and insure absolute safety from fire or other accident for documents, jewelry and other valuables. The boxes are about three feet long, about three inches deep and about five inches wide. There is ample room in them for all ordinary needs. They are of modern steel construction and the bank guarantees their safety. The lock construction is one of the interesting features of these safety deposit boxes. The customer has one

style of key and the bank has another. The bank cannot open the boxes, but at the same time the customer cannot unlock the box without the aid of the bank's key as well as his own. There are double sets of keys for the bank and the customer for each box, and no set of keys will unlock any but the one box for which they were made, thus double safety is assured to all using these safety deposit boxes. The section in use for customers is stored in the bank's vault, and for the convenience of customers wishing access to these deposit boxes, the bank is planning a re-arrangement of the fixtures, with a straight passageway through to the deposit boxes at the end where the Savings Department is now located.

MONEY FOR AGITATORS NONE FOR PEOPLE IN NEED.

At Sudbury last week eleven Finlanders were fined for having objectionable literature in their possession. Six were let off with \$50 fines each, four were taxed \$100 each, one was fined \$150 and costs and Victor Salo had to pay \$200 and costs. Some of the cases will be appealed. In giving his decision in one case Magistrate Stoddard took occasion to point out that Salo had forwarded money from Sudbury Finlanders to defend I.W. W. agitators in jail in the United States, while at the same time there were cases of heart-touching need among the Finlanders in the district and English-speaking residents had to relieve this distress. In other words the Sudbury Finlanders had money to defend foreign agitators whom they did not know, but they had no money to give to deserving people of their own race who through illness and misfortune were in need of help.

BOOTE TRIES TO POSE AS MACARONI AND HARDWARE

Police Seized Liquor Last Week-end and One Man Faces Charge of Illegality.

Last week the police seized two shipments of liquor coming in here concealed. One was plainly marked on the outside as "Hardware," but inside there were ten 1-gallon cans of highwines. When the box was moved it gave forth a gurgley sound that tempted Chief Wilson to open it to learn what kind of hardware made so liquid a sound. The box was addressed to "T. Benbowers, Timmins," and no one has yet called for it. At present the box is in the basement of the police station, while the liquor is locked up in the police vault. The shipper's name on the end of the box was given in green ink as "G. Greenberg, Montreal."

The other liquor seized was not taken by the police until it had been delivered in town. Chief Wilson moved some boxes at the freight shed last week, and though the cases were plainly marked "Macaroni," the sound they gave when shaken was of another type. There were eight boxes marked "Macaroni," but two of the boxes had highwines in them. All told there were three gallons of highwines concealed in this "Macaroni" shipment. The name of the sender was given as "A German," and of course the liquor came from Montreal. Chief Wilson waited until this shipment was called for, then he followed it, and as a result Antonio Russo, a local Italian employed at the Hollinger, was arrested on a charge of breach of the O.T.A. Russo did not deny the ownership of the liquor. Indeed, his most important remark to Chief Wilson was that it was funny that they had sent him three gallons when he had only ordered two. Russo will receive a hearing to-morrow (Thursday), in the meantime being out on bail.

BIG PUBLIC GATHERING FOR THE WAR VETERANS

He thought the success of the Goldfields Branch already assured. He made telling references to the noble work done by the women of Canada during the war and suggested that they might still aid and support. In his own town of Winnipeg the Ladies' Auxiliary was of unusual help and inspiration to the Veterans. In soliciting the hearty co-operation of the public, Mr. Rutland pointed out that by supporting the brave men back from overseas the people would not only be conferring a benefit on the men themselves but on the whole community.

Mr. Jas. Geils roused the enthusiasm of the audience with his gifted singing, in fine voice and with pleasing musical interpretation, of the "Veteran's Song."

G. A. Macdonald, chairman of the Porcupine Recruiting Committee of the Royal Air Force, said he was proud of the number enlisting in the Air service from this district, but prouder far of the quality of the men. On various occasions the R.A.F. headquarters had remarked "on the superior class of men from here, their coolness, daring, adaptability and attention to duty being surpassed by none." Timmins and the Porcupine had given more recruits to the Air Service, in proportion to population, than any other part of Canada. For the veterans he suggested the same loyal support and the same generous co-operation, until they were re-established in civil life, that had been given the soldiers when overseas.

Rev. Father Theriault commenced: "We should not impose on good nature." "That," he said, "is not from the Bible; it is from Dr. McInnis earlier in the evening." Father Theriault promised he would not impose on the good nature of the audience by a lengthy address, and he didn't. Instead, he made good nature by his brief, witty and well-pointed remarks. One of his thoughts was that this country should get away from religious strife, and he hoped the returned soldiers who had fought for justice and the rights of minorities would lend their power to the assuring of harmony and unity among all classes in Canada. He wished all success to the Great War Veterans and stood ready to do anything he could for them. He pleased the audience greatly with one of his inimitable stories.

Rev. J. D. Parks, pastor of the Byrnes Presbyterian church, brightened his address with humorous stories and many witty sayings. He emphasized the point that the Great War Veterans were featuring the idea of "Service" to others. The men who served the community were the best men, and if the returned soldiers who had given such noble service overseas were to continue to emphasize the helpful purpose of service to others they would be a great power for good in the community. The meeting closed with the National Anthem.


TOWNSHIP OF TISDALE.
