## Timmins News in Brief

Mr. J. H. Black, of Toronto, was a visitor to Camp last week.

Mr. R. Martin, of Ottawa, visited friends in the Camp on Monday.

After being closed for over a year, the Schumacher Theatre has re-opened under the former management.

Born—In Moneta on Sunday, Feb. 2nd, 1919, to Mr. and Mrs. John Landers,—a daughter.

The "National" on Friday was over four hours late, the cause on this occasion being that it was not on time.

Mr. R. Eddlestone left on Tuesday morning this week for Boston Creek where he has some promising claims that he intends to further develop.

Mr. Morris Daher returned last week from Toronto, and reports his mother as being much improved in health following a course of treatment taken in the city.

At the meeting of the Timmins L. O.L. on Monday evening one of the special features of the proceedings was the presentation to Wor. Bro. J. W. Faithful of a Past Master's Jewel.

Messrs. Simms & Hooker have taken over the E. G. Dickson insurance and real estate business in Schumacher and will carry this on in addition to their steadily growing business in Timmins.

Ever since the last dance given by the Timmins Fire Brigade, the Entertainment Committee has been besieged with requests for another one before Lent. To satisfy this very general demand the Fireman announce another of their good social evenings for Thursday, February the 10th in the Masonic Hall.

Mr. John T. McGregor, formerly constable at Schumacher, who recently returned to the Camp after over two years' service overseas, has taken over the O'Connor House at Schumacher, and is conducting that boarding and rooming house on up-to-date lines. The popularity of this returned soldier should assure good patronage for this Schumacher hotel.

During 1918 Cochrane Fire Department had only seven calls, and one of them proved a false alarm. The total cost to the Town of Cochrane of the Brigades' services was only \$271.50. Figuring on the basis of calls answered and work done in fire-fighting the Timmins Fire Brigade, if paid as generously as Cochrane's Firemen, would have received over \$1550.00, while as a matter of fact Timmins Brigade only received \$500.00 from the municipal treasury for 1918 services.

Lieut. Gordon Spence of the Royal Air Force returned this week to Deseronto after a visit of a few days with friends in Timmins and district. Lieut. Spence was on the staff of the local branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce when he joined the Air Service about a year and a half ago. He was very popular here, being prominent in hockey and other sports, and the same qualities of thoroughness in work, attention to duty, and efficiency in athletics, won him rapid advancement in the Air Service. For some time past he has been Flight Instructor at Deseronto Camp. He likes the Air Service and may remain permanently on the R.A.F. staff.

Petitions for the commutation of the death sentence on Chas. Cooper were forwarded to Timmins last week, but were as promptly returned to whence they came. The petitions suggested that there had been miscarriage of justice in the trial and conviction of Cooper, and Chief Wilson, to whom they were sent here for placing so that they might be signed, felt that this implication alone made it impossible for him to have anything to do with them, as he very properly considered that being an officer of the law he could not countenance the implied reflection on the administration of the law at the recent trial in Haileybury. "Mr. Justice Logie and the jury hearing all the evidence and knowing the facts are no doubt in a much better position to arrive at a just decision in the matter," he said. In many parts of the district, however, the petitions have been largely signed, just as another petition to hang Cooper twice would likely also be very largely signed. Nearly anybody will sign a petition for anything, anyhow, any time. At Englehart, however, the petitions were received coldly, and the same is true of several other sections of the district.

Mrs. J. P. Taillon gave a very pleasant "Bridge" at the Goldfields on Monday afternoon.

Mr. W. H. Gates has been appointed Clerk-Treasurer of Buckle Township to succeed Mr. H. A. Day.

Mrs. Gordon Mitchell left this week for a visit to North Bay, Bradford and other points south.

Mr. G. E. Fairbairn, formerly of South Porcupine, has been appointed Clerk and Treasurer of the Township of Teck, with offices at Kirkland Lake

There will be a big night at the Oddfellows' Lodge next Tuesday evening, and all members are specially requested to be on hand.

Chief Chas. McInnis of Tisdale was among those going to Haileybury this week in connection with the court sessions there.

Mrs. D. Laprairie and children are ill this week, but are making good recovery, and all will wish them a speedy return to health.

The Dance at the Union Hall on Saturday evening was one of the best of the series being held there, the attendance being large and all enjoying a very pleasant evening of good music good dancing and agreeable social pleasure.

The Old-timers and the "New Boys" are getting ready to practice for the getting ready for the big hockey match here soon for the benefit of the Children's Aid Society, and the doctor.

Haileybury Firemen have purchased the Haileybury Rink and are now busy putting it into shape, part of the interior having been torn out by the previous owners, the Timmins Brothers. The Firemen secured it on good terms, \$2500 being the price, \$500 down and \$250 every six months until paid for. It is expected to be in shape for skating this week.

The County Orange Lodge held its annual meeting this week at Iroquois Falls, where delegates from all the Lodges of the district gathered on Tuesday for the business of the County Lodge. Last night there was a banquet given the delegates by Iroquois Falls Lodge, with a noteworthy menu and toast list. Several delegates went over from Timmins for the event.

The report of the Government Creamery at New Liskeard for 1918 shows that a very prosperous and successful year has been passed. From November 1st, 1917, to October 31st, 1918, the Creamery produced 45 tons of butter, over 272,834 pounds of cream being used, gathered from 222 patrons with 800 cows on the total list. Over \$34,000.00 was paid to the farmers of the district for the cream during the year.

A fire alarm was turned in from Box 13, (at Marshall-Ecclestone's corner), on Monday just before noon. The Firemen made a very speedy response, only 45 seconds elapsing from the alarm to the time of arrival of the team on the scene. The Fire Chief and the Chairman of the Fire and Light Department had turned in the alarm simply as a test. The test was fully met.

Just at this particular time, and in view of the fact that many people see a striking similarity in the problems of the towns of Sudbury and Timmins, especially on account of the difficulties arising from both towns having so large a proportion of other than English-speaking citizens, there will be interest here no doubt in the fact that at the last meeting of the Sudbury Town Council the Assessor and Tax Collector was authorized to secure an assistant for three months, the town to pay this assistant \$100.00 a month while employed.

Officer R. Allen is in Haileybury this week attending the sessions of the District Court which commenced on Tuesday. There are two cases to come before the Court that are of special interest to Timmins people, and incidentally to Officer Allen. One of these cases is that of Vasil Guta, an August, charged with high-grading, and the other is that of S. Feldman, dealer in scrap iron, etc., charged with the theft of material from the Hollinger Mine. Guta has been out on bail since last summer when he was arrested by Officer Allen on the charge of unlawfully having a quantity of gold ore in his possession. Mr. Feldman has also been under bail for several months in connection with some scrap iron taken from Hollinger property.
