Mr. A. Morel, of Cobalt, is here in charge of the Grodwards Company business in the absence of Mr. Vincent Woodbury in the far south.

The Town Council of New Liskeard has erected two arches of welcome in honor of the returned soldiers of the town.

All will be delighted to hear that Pte. M. Shields, formerly with the Canadian Express Co., at South Porcupine, who was reported some months ago as killed in action, is on the contrary still alive and well and back again in Canada. He is at present in Toronto but may make a visit to the old Porcupine in the near future.

The courage and patience with which the little girl bore the injuries received and her sweet disposition and cleverness won all hearts at the hospital. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon.
