**NON-UNION MESSENGER
FOUND WORK UNPLEASANT**

So Decided to Return From Whence
He Came.

In conjunction with all the other employees of the Canadian Express Company from coast to coast, the members of the local staff at Timmins went out on strike at 6 p.m. Thursday. No Canadian express matter was handled after that time, but the Dominion Express service was not affected, except that business was much increased by the fact that people would not or could not ship by Canadian express and so the call was greater for the Dominion Express service. The strike was caused by the refusal of the Canadian Express Company to give shorter hours and increased rates of pay after the Conciliation Board had given an award practically endorsing the requests of the men. The Company instead of "coming across," wanted to appeal the award to another Commission, and the employees decided to strike. From the inauguration of this strike the Canadian Express service has been completely closed up along the T & N.O. None of the men remained at work, so far as handling Canadian Express matter was concerned. The Company made one or two attempts to man the service. One man got as far as Cochrane as messenger, but he could not handle the express alone. Canadian Express parcels on the trains or in express offices could not be moved or handled. Luckily there was no perishable goods at this end of the line at least. For the first day or so there was some loss and inconvenience through newspapers sent by Canadian Express not being delivered.

On Saturday night an Englishman came in here as Canadian Express messenger, but he did not have a very good time at all. No one was rough to him or even rude, but he could not get meals or room or even a cheery word in town. He met some of the strikers on Sunday and had a chat

with them, voluntarily signing a paper to the effect that he would not continue to work for the Canadian Express Co. while a strike was on. He took the noon train out of town again, headed for Toronto, though he was shy a dollar or two of enough to pay his fare back. The Company would not help him because he was going away, and the strikers would not assist because he had come here. "The walking is good near Toronto" was about all the comfort he received. Since then no effort has been made to man the service on this part of the line.

**A BANNER NIGHT
IROQUOIS FALLS HOTEL
OPENED THIS WEEK.**

Needless to say, practically everybody was on tour, some conducted and some otherwise and nothing was heard save expressions of surprise and satisfaction at the building and its furnishings. It is an easy first in Northern Ontario, and at the moment we can think of nothing to touch it on the main line between here and Toronto.
