At Niagara Falls, N.Y. the other evening there were a number of motion pictures being shown of the American troops at the front. The Americans were shown standing at ease, playing games eating their meals, on parade, at drill, and so on, and so on. There was a plentitude of pictures of the Americans at the front. At last some one in the audience called out in a loud tone, "Wonder where the Canadians were?" And a well modulated voice at the rear of the hall responded, "Oh, the Canadian were up the line holding back the Huns while the Americans were having their pictures taken."

MR. CHAS. CORNWELL DIES IN MONETA ON SUNDAY.

Friends learn with deep regret of the death in Moneta on Sunday, April 27th, of Mr. Charles Cornwell. The deceased was a blacksmith by trade and had been a resident of the Camp for some years. He was born in Collingwood about 36 years ago. Death was due to pneumonia following an attack of the prevalent influenza. The family have suffered much ill fortune recently and in this will have the sincere sympathy of all. Last year the deceased injured his foot while at work at the Hollinger and blood-poisoning developing he was laid up for several months, only returning to work a short time ago, when soon after he was attacked by the "flu." A couple of weeks ago the three-year-old boy of the household died from the prevalent malady, and Mrs. Cornwell and the other boy of the family have also been very ill with the influenza. Mrs. Cornwell is making good progress now to recovery, but the boy is still quite ill at the hospital.

MANY NORTH LAND TOWNS TO BANQUET SOLDIERS

A number of North Land towns have arranged or are planning banquets or other forms of public welcome home for returned soldiers. Cobalt and the Township of Coleman held the first of such events last week, and the Town and Township expect to have other similar public functions to give welcome home to the men come back later from overseas. The most of the towns, however, are awaiting until all or most of the soldiers have returned before holding this form of public welcome, being content in the meantime to give them some sort of civic reception on their arrival at the station. Timmins has been following this latter plan, it being the intention, when all or most of the men are back, to hold a monster public reception for them. In the meantime, places like Uno Park and the Township of Whitney are battering the plain civic reception idea by giving each returned soldier some noteworthy gift. In Whitney each returned man is presented with a five-dollar gold piece. At Uno Park the presents have been of money or of other gifts that seemed most fitting or desirable. Sudbury has not had even an arch, and the civic reception idea has not been worked very thoroughly, but Sudbury is now planning a monster banquet to returned soldiers, the event to be held probably in the next six weeks or so.

ARSON CHARGE BASED ON QUEER KIND OF ROMANCE

Arch. McPhee, of Massey, is in Sudbury jail awaiting trial on a charge of arson, and the story behind the case is an odd one, to say the least. McPhee took a fancy to a young lady employed by a family named Mooney, living at Massey. He wrote the young lady romantic letters, but she would have nothing to do with him, and would not reply to or even acknowledge his letters. He continued the one-sided correspondence, but the letters took a different tone. He wrote about all the calamities that would happen to him if the girl continued to ignore him. Still the girl paid no attention to his attentions. Then there was an odd kind of a fire at the Mooney house. Rags soaked in oil were pushed through the ventilating holes in the storm windows downstairs and then ignited. Mrs. Mooney was awakened by the crackling of glass, and arousing her husband, the fire and the apparent style of its origin were discovered. With the aid of a neighbor the fire was stopped, and practically no damage was done. Mr. and Mrs. Mooney, however, did not enjoy the idea that anyone should try such a performance around their house and the police were asked to investigate. After several weeks of Detective Holmes work McPhee was arrested and now is in jail awaiting trial at the summer assizes.
