Timmins News in Brief

Board of Trade meets on Tuesday evening next at 8 o'clock.

The annual convention of the Northern Ontario Baptists will be held in Cochrane the latter part of June.

The Pas Manitoba, Board of Trade is advertising for 1000 prospectors to explore the district for minerals. Big activity is expected around the Pas this summer.

The event for Friday evening of this week, May 2nd, is the Open Dance under the auspices of Golden Beaver Lodge, A. F. & A. M. Dancing will commence at 9 o'clock, in the Masonic Hall, and there will be the very best of music, dancing, and a general good time for all attending.

Pte. R. Wayland, who spent about three years overseas on military service, most of that time in France and Flanders, and who was wounded on three different occasions, returned to Canada a couple of weeks ago, and is now visiting his brother, Mr. J. Wayland, of the Hollinger staff.

A very successful Masquerade Ball was held under the auspices of the Women's Auxiliary in the Miners' Union Hall on Friday evening last. The attendance was large and all enjoyed a very pleasant evening. The costumes and make-ups showed much originality and skill and were noteworthy for their variety and excellence.

Matheson last week completed the erection of a fine welcome home arch in honor of the soldiers from Matheson. Practically every town on the T. & N.O. from North Bay to James Bay now has its welcome arch. The Union Jack now flies over the Timmins Welcome Arch, with smaller flags of the Allies also on the structure.

Mr. Wilkinson was appointed Rector's Warden, and Mr. H. W. Warren, People's Warden.
