PRESENTATION BY D.Y.B.

**CASE AGAINST SPANIARD
DISMISSED ON THURSDAY.**

At the Police Court last Thursday the case against Bankista Garcia for an alleged attempt to shoot a woman on street some evenings previously was dismissed, there being no evidence that he had fired a shot and no gun or ammunition being found in his possession or in his rooms. The evi-

dence of a couple of witnesses was to the effect that a shot had been fired at the woman while she was coming down street, and the rest of the case was based on the woman's story that the Spaniard had threatened to shoot her. In dismissing the case the Magistrate warned the accused to keep away from the woman, as he had promised to do previously when charged with threatening her from motives of jealousy. Among the other cases J. Stewart was fined \$200 and costs for having a bottle in a public place. Three boys, who have repeatedly been in trouble, on theft and other charges, were committed to the Industrial School for training.

**STRIKE ON AT TORONTO
MEAT PACKING HOUSES.**

There may be a scarcity of meat here next week a leading merchant suggested to-day, the reason being the strike at the packing house plants in Toronto. On Tuesday three thousand of the employees of the packing houses and stock yards in Toronto went on strike for better wages and conditions. One effect already has been an increase in the price of meat, meat going up a cent a pound on Wednesday. With all the comment on war profiteering by the big packing houses, the public sympathy will be specially with the men out on strike. A large number of the men concerned are returned soldiers.
