The date for the Liberal Convention for the Northern Ontario district has been fixed for Wednesday, June 4th Hon. Rudolphe Lemieux, Hon. Geo. P. Graham, and Mr. Hartley Dewar, M. P. P. are expected to be present to deliver addresses on the political topics of the day.

The Open Dance given by Golden Beaver Lodge on Friday evening last in the Masonic Hall proved a very enjoyable event as is usual with all the events under the auspices of this Lodge. There was a good attendance, and all present were pleased with the good dancing, the music, refreshments etc.

Sunday next, May 11th, is "Mother's Day," and will be specially observed at the evening service in the Presbyterian church. Rev. J. D. Parks will deliver an address appropriate to the occasion, and there will be special music. An alarm of fire was sent in from the Old Bank Saloon corner on Monday just after twelve noon. The chimney on the Canadian Club Cafe building was burning merrily and a business man going to lunch turned in an alarm rather than take any chances. The metal top on the chimney was burned through and sparks were flying in good shape, but the fire was soon put out. The Brigade made the usual prompt response to the call, and some of them earned their pay for the whole year by the damage done to their clothes through mud and so on.

An effort is being made to have Trains Nos. 46 and 47 stop at Nushka each day. Petitions to the T. & N.O. for this convenience have been circulated recently and very largely signed by the citizens of Nushka and district. In fact practically everybody who has had a chance has signed the request to the Railway. If the matter is possible and practical at all, the T. & N.O. should grant the request. Pioneers in places like Nushka should be given every possible convenience and assistance. The T. & N.O. was professedly built as a pioneering road, and this fact should not be lost sight of, though too often it is apparently forgotten.

There was an alarm of fire sounded by the Hallinger whistle shortly after midnight on Saturday night, and the alarm drew out an unusually large crowd on Pine street and around the station, from which latter place many thought they could see the fire in progress. The fire was at No. 1 Bank House and was of very short duration, the effective sprinkler system making it impossible for a fire to get really started there. Shortly after the first alarm from the whistle, other blasts gave the signal that all was well again. On the sounding of the alarm the Timmins Fire Brigade was in readiness to respond, but did not receive the signal that their help was required, so it was not necessary for them to turn out.
