There seemed to be a story current in Cobalt this week that a man named Tom Bessi had been murdered in Timmins after a quarrel over a game of cards. A brother-in-law of Bessi's telephoned on Monday to Chief Wilson for particulars, but nothing was known here about any murder this week among the foreigners. Another yarn, but this one chiefly confined to town, was to the effect that a foreigner dissatisfied over something or other, chopped off one of his woman's hands with an axe. The authorities here, knew nothing about such a case. Both stories seem to have been cases of brilliant imagination getting off to a good start.

MEMORIAL SERVICE AT SOUTH END ON SUNDAY

Under the auspices of the Grand Army of Canada there will be special memorial services held in the Theatre at South Porcupine on Sunday afternoon, May 18th, at 2.30, in honor of the departed comrades who gave their lives in sacrifice during the war. Rev. Mr. Arms will conduct the services, and there will be special music for the occasion. All the fraternal societies in the district have been notified and asked to co-operate. The G. A. C. will assemble opposite the King George Hotel at 2 o'clock and march in a body to the theatre. All friends are invited to attend the event. Friends in Timmins will find the train service very convenient for the occasion, the train leaving here at one o'clock arriving at South End long before the time set for the services, while the returning train also allows ample time for attendance at the complete service.

GOLD LEAF LODGE O. Y. B. STARTS WITH 29 MEMBERS

The Timmins Lodge of the Orange Young Britons, recently organized here, was duly instituted last Friday evening in the Oddfellows' Hall, with Mr. Percy Craig as the first Master. The District Lecturer, Sergt Major Simpson, of Haileybury, was the only District officer able to be present for the occasion. Twenty nine candidates presented themselves for initiation, but on Friday evening only twelve were put through this step in the work, the other seventeen being duly initiated at a supplementary session in the I. O. O. F. hall on Monday evening of this week. On Friday evening Bros. A. Craig, L. DeGraham, W. McHugh and W. E. Johnston, of Haileybury, Timmins and Toronto Orange Lodges, were elected honorary members of Gold Leaf O. Y. B. After the work of the Lodge a pleasant line of refreshments was enjoyed at midnight. At the next meeting the second degree will be put on, there being 29 candidates of this degree, and a number of visiting brethren from Haileybury are expected for the occasion. The election of officers for Gold Leaf Lodge will take place in the course of a week or so. It is the intention of the new lodge to organize a brass band here in the near future.

DOUBLE WEDDING AT R. C. CHURCH MONDAY MORNING

A very pretty double wedding took place at the Timmins R. C. church on Monday morning. Rev. Father Leduc officiating. The first marriage was that of Roselda, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur L'Heureux, of South Porcupine, to Donas Tremblay, son of Mr. David Tremblay, of Cornaught. The bridesmaid was Miss Gerinas, sister of the bride, while Mr. P. O. Tremblay, brother of the groom, was groomsmen. Both the bride and the bridesmaid were beautifully gowned in slate crepe de chaine with white floral decorations.

The second marriage was that of Miss May Beck, of Pembroke, Ont., to Mr. H. E. Burtwell, of South Porcupine, (better known in the Camp by his theatrical name of "Bert De-..."). The contracting parties in the previous ceremony, Mr and Mrs. L'Heureux, acted as bridesmaid and groomsmen for this second ceremony. The bride in this happy event was

dressed in an attractive elephant grey costume, flowered with white roses and maidenhair ferns. A number of the friends of the contracting parties were present at the church, while interest was also added to the ceremonies by the presence of a number of flower girls. The double wedding party had a retinue of four automobiles, in which they paraded Timmins and South End and received the congratulations of friends and acquaintances. Afterwards the party adjourned to the home of Mr. and Mrs. L'Heureux, South Porcupine, where singing, dancing, instrumental music and a general good social time was enjoyed, together with a pleasant wedding supper. GOOD ROADS LEAGUE SUGGESTED BY MAYOR

Dr. McInnis Thinks Motorists Might Help in Securing Better Highways

In connection with the visit of Hon. G. Howard Ferguson to the Camp and the consequent discussion of better roads for the North Land, Mayor Dr. McInnis was impressed with the fact that a Good Roads Association here could do useful work in keeping alive public interest and impressing on the Government continually the need for improved highways. In addition such an Association could co-operate with the authorities in the search for the best ways and means and methods for better highways. This of course, goes back to the oft-broached proposition of a Motor League for Timmins and district. The growing number of motorists have particular interest both from the standpoint of business and pleasure in the matter of good roads. Most of them are business men and so interested in good roads from the economic point, while their special use of the highways for the pleasure of motoring add to the keenness of their interest. The present would be a good time for the formation of a Motor League in the Camp. Such a league could do much to further the public interests, as well as protecting the rights of motorists generally. A public meeting for the organization of a motor league will likely be called here in the near future, and from this league may grow a Good Roads movement that will be of general advantage.

FIRST FOOTBALL GAME RESULTED IN A DRAW

Closely Contested Match Between Timmins and Porcupine-Dome Teams.

The Porcupine-Dome Football team came to Timmins on Thursday evening last to start the season with a win, but Timmins held them to a draw game. During much of the game the South End team, as the crowd persisted calling them, seemed to have the best of the play, but the worst of the luck. Timmins scored the first goal within five minutes of the start of the match by some nice combination work on the part of the forwards, Twaddle scoring from a well-placed shot. Nicholson scored for South End about five minutes before half-time, making the score equal, one goal each way. Neither side scored in the second half, although Timmins had the best of the play much of the time, keeping South End defence busy all the time, South End making three or four desperate attempts to force the game to the Timmins goal. R. Harrower, the Porcupine-Dome centre half, was the backbone of the team. He broke up the combination of the Timmins forwards time after time. Nicholson, for the visitors, was also a noteworthy number, as well as Bill Black who worked hard for the team. Porcupine-Dome was awarded a penalty kick in the first half, but Trimble proved himself equal to the occasion by saving a well-directed shot. There was an unusually large crowd of fans at the game. The match was well contested, clean and well-played, and handled in able manner by Mr. J. White, referee.
