NUMBER OF SETTLERS COMING INTO THE NORTH

According to Director of Colonization Macdonnell, there is a decided boom in the number of settlers coming into the Northern part of Ontario this year. The war had a depressing effect on the settlement of the new parts of the North Land, but now with the war apparently over, there is increased interest especially in the great Clay Belt. The number of settlers taking up land this year in the Clay Belt is greater than any year since 1914. At least double as many enquiries have been made already this year regarding Crown Lands for settlement as were made all last year. The settlers coming into the North Land this year are chiefly of three kinds,—returned soldiers, people from England, Ireland and Scotland, and American settlers. The returned soldiers get Crown Lands free, while the others pay 50 cents an acre for land for settlement. While there have been scores of new settlers, coming into the North Land this year, however, there is room and opportunity and need for hundreds more.

THERE MUST BE MONEY IN TIMMISKAMING FARMS

Many farms around New Liskeard and further north have been sold recently and the prices secured, as well as the amount of profit confessed by the sellers while at farming operations would suggest that there is money made in farming in the North Land these days. One man told The New Liskeard Speaker that he had cleared about \$10,000.00 in ten years. Another confessed to making about \$6,000.00 and a living in the same time. A third, who sold his farm by auction and thought he had not received anything near its value, admitted that he had cleared six thousand

dollars. Most of these selling their farms say that their reason for doing so is that the buyers are so anxious to get into the farming game while they are a little tired of the quiet life and not averse to getting south where there is more tame life and supposedly a milder climate, with black-fly industry not so extensively developed.

Capt. Frank Francis, of the firm of Hill, Clark & Francis, who returned to his home in New Liskeard after several years' service overseas, was a visitor last week to Timmings, being warmly greeted by his many friends in the Camp.

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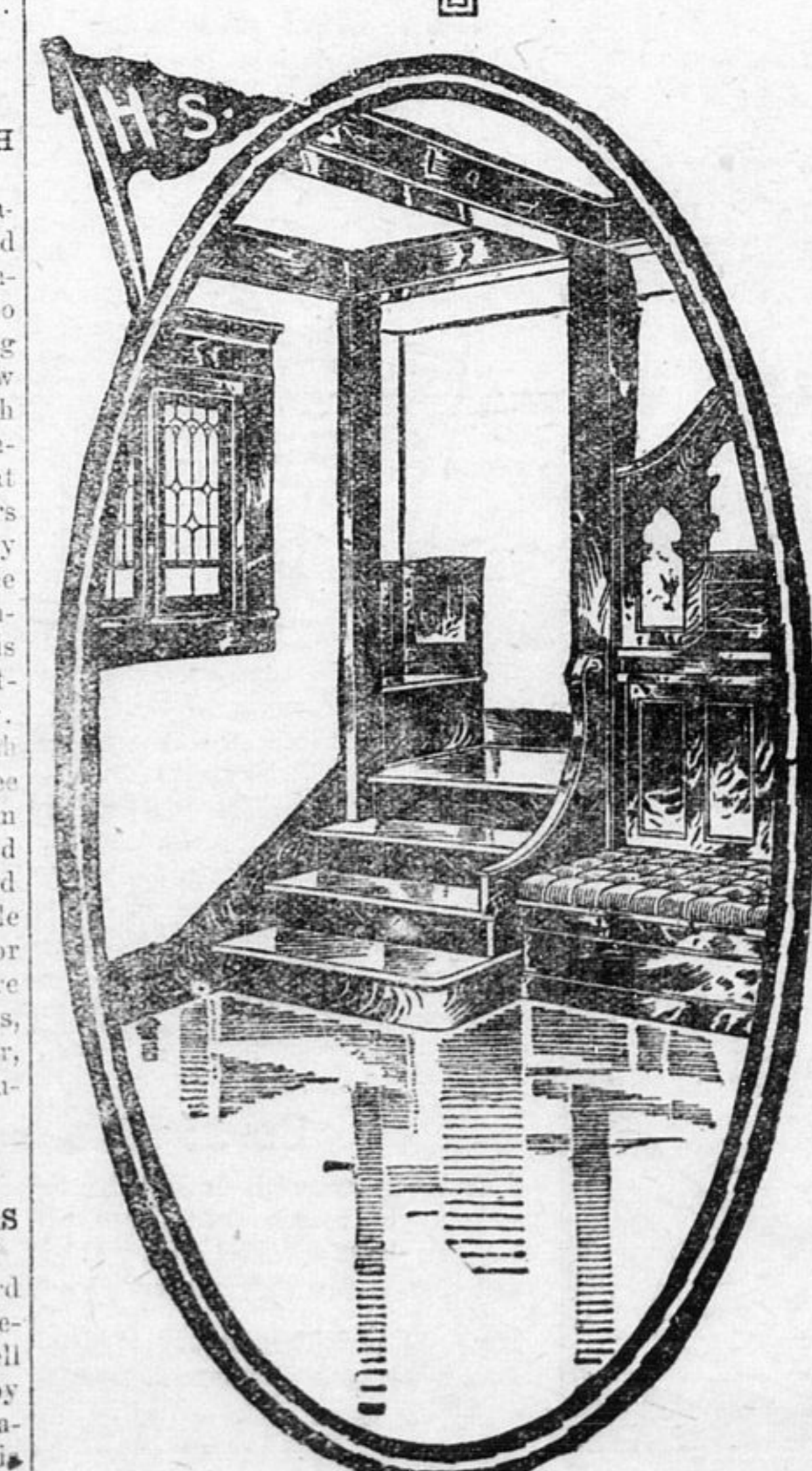
