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TISDALE COUNCIL LOOK AFTER HEALTH MATTER

Scavengers Appointed. Timmins and Tisdale May Co-operate re Dump. Other Council Matters

Several matters of importance were dealt with at the regular meeting of the Tisdale Township Council on Friday evening, June 13th. In addition there was much routine business, including the consideration of communications and other routine work, and the passing of the usual payrolls and other accounts. Reeve C. B. Morgan occupied the chair, and all the Councilors were present. On motion of Councilors Mackie and Hutchison it was decided to have the Fire and Light Committee make a report on all properties belonging to the Township, that are covered by insurance, and if they find that there are any not insured that they be granted power to insure them. Also the Clerk was authorized to put in a claim for two lengths of hose and one extension ladder to Insurance Company, these being destroyed in the fire of May 15th, 1919.

The Clerk, on motion of Councilors Hutchison and Muskett was authorized to write Miss M. Mayhew advising her that her application for the position of assistant to the Clerk is accepted, the salary to be \$17.00 per week, and also that the Clerk notify her of the temporary nature of the appointment.

The question of an incinerator was discussed. It was moved by Councilor Walton, seconded by Councilor Muskett, that Messrs. Mackie, Muskett and Hutchison be appointed a Committee to meet the Timmins Council regarding the joint dump and the proposed incinerator and to report at the next meeting of the Council.

Tenders for Sanitary Cans were received and discussed and the tender of A. Brazeau for galvanized iron cans at a price of \$2.00 each was accepted on motion of Councilors Hutchison and Muskett. The Clerk was authorized to order six hundred cans for delivery as soon as possible.

On motion of Councilors Hutchison and Muskett, the contract for scavenger work at Rochester, Moneta and Schumacher was given to George Cousineau, at \$200.00 per month. On motion of Councilors Walton and Mackie R. Talento was awarded the scavenger contract for South Porcupine and the Dome, at \$220.00 per month, this to include the burning of the dump and all other necessary work.

On motion of Councilors Hutchison and Walton, the Bailiff was instructed to collect the amount owing for taxes on the Connaught Hotel and property, after giving the owners a reasonable time to pay, and notifying them of his instructions.

The question of pound keepers and pounds being discussed, it was moved by Councilor Muskett, seconded by Councilor Walton that Romeo Talento be appointed pound keeper for South Porcupine; George Cousineau, for Schumacher; William Bailey for Moneta and Gillies Lake; the pound-keepers to keep all fees, according to Provincial regulations.

The question of supplying the King George Hotel with water was further discussed and left to the Fire and Light Committee.

Mr. H. E. Burtwell presented a largely signed petition regarding the granting him of a license to conduct an ice-cream parlor, etc., and on motion of Councilors Walton and Muskett, this petition was referred to the Chief of Police, to be further reported on to the Council.

TWO LEAGUE FOOTBALL GAMES THIS EVENING

Two league football games are scheduled for this (Wednesday) evening, one here and one at Iroquois Falls. At the Athletic grounds here to-night Timmins and Porcupine-Dome will try conclusions again. The Porcupine-Dome team has played three games, won two and lost one. Timmins has played two, won one and lost one. The game lost by Timmins was to the Porcupine-Dome team on South Porcupine grounds, but the boys here hope to reverse the result on their own grounds, though they know that they will have to "go some" to achieve this result. The game this evening will be one of the

most interesting of the season. At Iroquois Falls to-night the McIntyre and Iroquois Falls teams play. The McIntyre so far has nothing but wins to its credit and the boys from Schumacher look for another win on this occasion. At Schumacher on June 11th they won from Iroquois Falls and confidently believe they can do it again. Iroquois Falls, however, hopes to give them a surprise, and start a winning streak, after a run of hard luck. At most of the games so far Iroquois Falls has been handicapped by being unable to play its best men who were unable to get away from their other duties for the games. Russell Burton, the 17-year-old son of Mr. J. Burton, New Liskeard, was drowned at Swastika last week. The story told regarding the sad affair is that Russell and a number of other boys were on a raft in very deep water and some of the lads "jared" Russell to jump into the water. He did so, and being unable to swim he drowned before help could reach him, none of his companions being good enough swimmers to render him assistance.

For years past New Liskeard has taken the stand that it has a monopoly or a special privilege of some kind in regard to Dominion Day Celebrations. In past years New Liskeard has insisted on having a big day on July 1st, irrespective of neighboring towns. On one occasion, indeed, New Liskeard held its First of July though a nearby town was the scene of the Temiskaming Firemen's Annual Convention and Sports Day, an event that the whole district was interested and concerned in. Just how this sort of thing feels will be apparent this year to New Liskeard, for New Liskeard this year is the scene of the Firemen's Tournament for the North Land so looks for the support and co-operation of all the district. North Cobalt, however, is having a day of its own on July 1st, in honor of the Bucke Township men who have returned from the Great War. North Cobalt had made preparations to have a circus come there as one of the features, but New Liskeard made objection that the circus would not come. North Cobalt, however, is going on with a big day for July 1st. The circus referred to also thought of coming to Timmins, but when dropping its engagement with North Cobalt cancelled all its dates on the T. & N. O. and will not visit the North Land at all this summer.

BEST YEAR YET AT THE MCINTYRE-PORCUPINE

Mr. J. P. Bickell, president of the McIntyre-Porcupine, was well pleased with what he saw on his recent visit to the mines here. On his return to Toronto, in an interview with one of the newspapers there he said that the earnings of the McIntyre-Porcupine for the current quarter showed the greatest earnings in the history of the mine. The statement for the present three months, ending June 30th, which completes the fiscal year for the company, will be better than any preceding quarter. Mr. Bickell said: "When the annual statement comes out its contents will be most gratifying to the shareholders. The additions to the plant and equipment now under way and which will effect additional economies in operation, contemplate the expenditure of upwards of \$100,000 within the next three months. Development work on the levels is proving most satisfactory, considerable increase in value as greater depths are reached."

As to general conditions in the North Land he believed that the labor troubles would subside and that the sanest counsels would eventually prevail. Conditions in gold mining had not improved materially, so far as the cost of production is concerned, and of course the gold mines did not have the advantage enjoyed by the silver mines of having higher market price for their product.

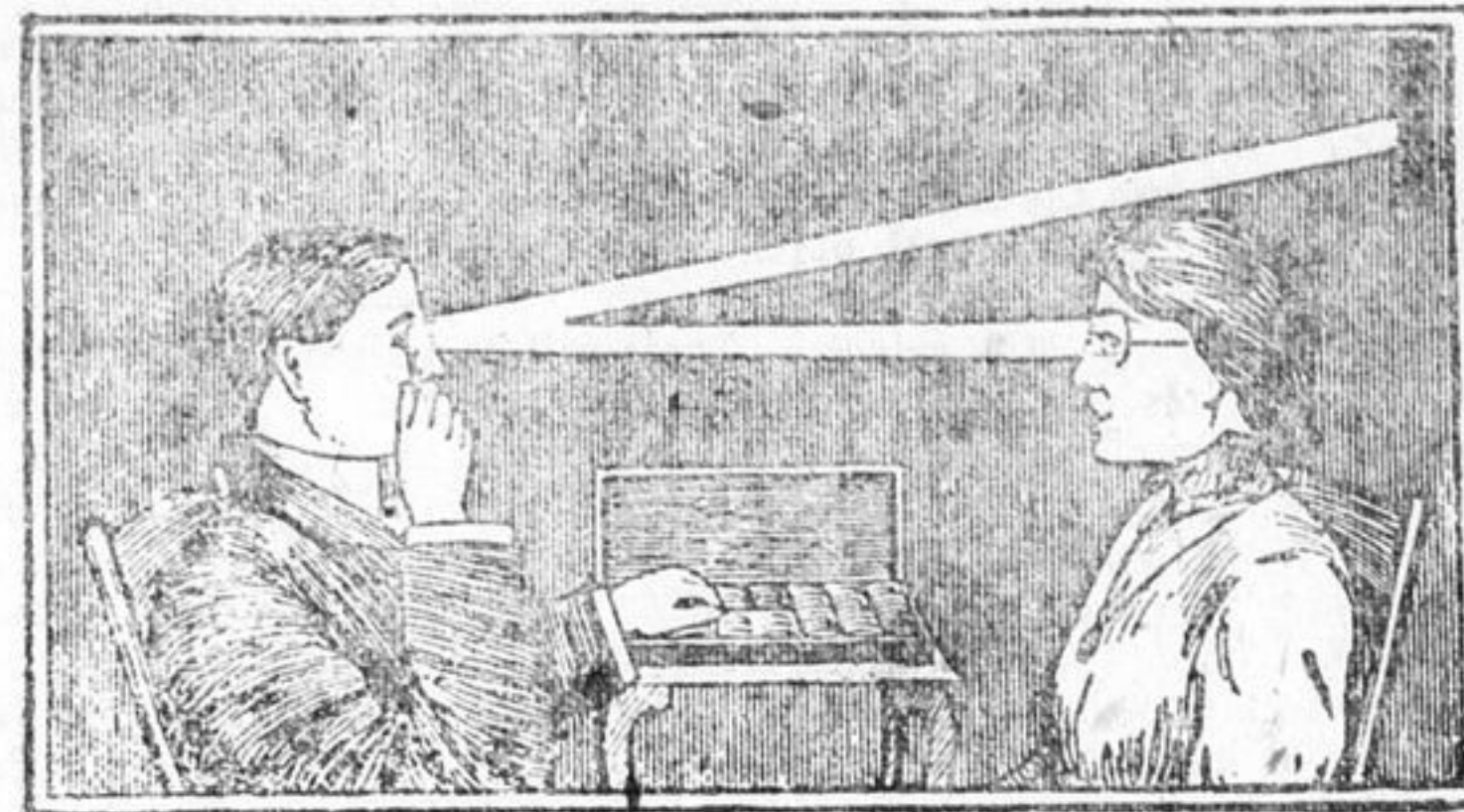
