**WHEN THE FIRE MENACED  
KAPUSKASING COLONY**

Friend "J. C." of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Colony at Kapuskasing sends the following description of the hours when Kapuskasing was threatened by last week's fierce forest fire:—

S. & S. Colony, July 1, 1919  
The sun shone down like a ball of copper through the haze of smoke, and our eyes were smarting and full of tears as we watched a great column of fire and smoke coming across the tree tops in the woods at the other side of the clearing.

"Ba' gosh she's some fire, eh?" said Henri, "how long you think she's tak' to come here?"

"If the wind keeps up," I replied "it will be here before very long."

"Well, then, I purty soon dig the hole," said Henri, and suiting the action to the word he started in with pick and shovel and dug a hole about three feet square and the same depth.

"What are you digging the hole for, Frenely?" asked the man from Toronto.

"To bury my clothes," said Henri. "When I leave this Camp I shall carry my clothes with me," said Toronto.

"Maybe you glad to throw your clothes away and save yourself," replied Henri, "Me I save myself and come back for the clothes after the fire is over. C'est plus facile, eh?"

The wind was getting stronger and we could feel the seorch of the fire in our very faces as we anxiously watched the advancing flames come nearer to the edge of the clearing.

"Dig a hole and bury that dynamite," I commanded, pointing to six cases of stumping powder.

"Right-O," said the boys; after which we stood to with pails of water and shovels to try and keep the fire out of the piles of dry stumps on the homestead we were clearing.

"Good job the railroad is between us and that fire," said Toronto, as he pounced on a spark and buried it with as much care as he would have buried the man who fell and broke the rum jar in France.

And so we stayed all day until evening. Then the wind had died down, and leaving one man on guard we went to a well-earned supper.

"Guess she's all right for to-night," said Toronto.

"Yes," I replied, "but take Henri's advice and dig a hole and bury your clothes in it, for if this wind gets up again in the morning you won't be able to travel fast enough carrying a suit-case."

**PRACTICALLY \$900.00  
CLEARED ON JULY FIRST**

Receipts Over \$1300.00. Committee Sends Grounds Committee Cheque for \$300.00.

The Committee in charge of the "Big Day All Day"—July 1st—met on Thursday evening to wind up the affairs of the event. It was found that the total receipts for the occasion totalled \$1305.75 and the expenses were \$414.10, leaving a balance to the good of \$891.65. The Committee decided to send a cheque for \$300.00 to the Athletic Grounds Committee. The grounds were fenced in for July 1st, the men at the work keeping on until late on Monday evening to complete the fence. Not only in aiding to some extent in the sale of tags, but also in giving more business-like control of the grounds, the fence was of material assistance for the day's sports. The Committee also asked the Secretary to write the Miners' Union, Fire Chief Borland, Mr. J. T. Easton, Mr. Geo. Lake, and several others for specially generous assistance given in making the day the success it was. In addition there is the general appreciation of the co-operation shown by the mines, the merchants and the public in so many ways in helping on this "Big Day All Day."
