TIMMINS NEWS IN BRIEF

Born—In Timmins on Sunday, July 6th, 1919, to Mr. and Mrs. H. Hattton—a son.

Mrs. J. W. Reed and family returned home this week from a visit to her old home in Michigan.

Mrs. Carr arrived last week from Toronto to join her husband here, the latter coming here some weeks ago to join the J. R. Gordon store staff.

The work of oiling the street was started yesterday, from the depot to the Northern Canada warehouse and Pine street to Marshall-Eleestone's store corner being done.

Mr. Geo. Drew, formerly of the E. G. Dickson staff, Timmins, but who has been overseas on military service during the past couple of years, is expected back in the Camp this week.

Rev. Capt. Father J. R. O'Gorman, of St. Patrick's R. C. church, Cobalt, returned last week after two and a half years' service as chaplain overseas.

Just as a commentary on North Land weather it may be noted that there were some of the hottest days of a hot summer last week, and at the same time it may be remembered that on a couple of nights during the milder week-end there was frost enough to do serious damage to flowers and garden stuff in the district.

In the Northern Ontario Baseball League series of games (more familiarly known as the District League) Ironquois Falls and South Porcupine play, this afternoon at South End. The game will be lively and interesting one and both teams promise to put up a winning brand of ball. A large number from Timmins intend to go out to see this game, the Wednesday half-holiday making this convenient and the game being considered by the fans as likely to be an interesting one.

The ladies at Schumacher have taken up the game of baseball this year, and their practices recently show that some of them are developing considerable skill at the game. As Timmins has a couple of ladies' baseball teams it might be a good idea to have a match between teams from the two towns. Umpire Auer says "Sure, I wouldn't mind umpiring the game, I've ived quite a while already."

Sunday, July 6th, was set apart by Premier Hearst as a special day of thanksgiving and praise for the Province of Ontario, the idea being to have special services in the churches in recognition of the signing of peace. Owing to the short notice given previous to the event the day was not very well observed throughout the Province, but in Timmins special reference was made in all the churches on Sunday to the advent of peace after the world war.

GOLDEN BEAVER AND PORCUPINE PLAY BALL

One of the most interesting games of baseball of the season was the match on Monday night between baseball enthusiasts from the Golden Beaver Lodge, Timmins, and the Porcupine Lodge of the A. F. & A. M. Similar teams played here last year, so a big crowd turned out for the event on Monday, sure that there would be lots of fun, no ill-will, and perhaps some good ball-playing. And in every particular the crowd got more than twice their money's worth, there being no collection or gate money taken. The score was 13 to 12 at the finish of the seven innings agreed upon for play, but in this case "13" was not an unlucky number for the Golden Beaver Lodge for without recourse to the wisdom of Solomon it was universally admitted that this baker's dozen was greater than the ordinary dozen, and so the Porcupine brethren were defeated by one run,—generally thought to be that one run of Herb Hooker's in the far outfield, district of Moneta. The battery for the Golden Beavers included D. McInnis and John Fogg, the latter making his usual specialty of the famous Fogg roundhouse curve. Behind the bat C. G. Williams did good catching though some were such hot ones that he let them go till they cooled off. The other players for the Timmins Lodge included:—Ben Martin the captain, who withdrew when he saw some of the others would not play ball like he did; R. Eddy, G. S. Lowe, Vic Emory, Geo. Brady, and Messrs Cousins and Bailey. For Porcupine Lodge Monaghan drove them all over the plate, that is all but some that went around the batter's neck. He was greatly encouraged in his work by the catcher, W. M. Widdfield who gave valuable support not only to the pitcher but to the umpire, the base runners and the men that came to bat before him. The latter he generally told which balls to hit at and if they did hit at them the umpire supported the catcher's opinion by yelling "Strike." The others with the Porcupines were:—J. T. Easton, Geo. Lake, R. Vary, E. H. Bridger, H. W. Hooker, and Messrs. Stevens, Gray and Vanderwater. Mr. C. M. Auer was the umpire and on one occasion it looked as if a ball thrown by the catcher and side-stepped by the pitcher was going to kill the umpire, which all looked like a deserved judgment and pleased the crowd to the point of howling with laughter. There were so many incidents in the game that all of them can not be recounted. Mention should be made, however, of Ben's spectacular catch of a foul ball. Speaking of foul, Bridger at bat showed himself the fowl fancier. He fanned the air the first two balls, and then one, two, three, four, five and six, he hit up fouls as fast as the ball was thrown to the plate. When the pitcher's arm was tired Ernie took pity on him and quit the foul-raising business. One of the fouls went over the fence behind the catcher. "That's a home run" says Widdy, "Only it's the wrong way." "Oh, my home's up that way," Ernie replied. Through out the game there was the best of humor and lots of evidences of the right kind of good sport. Everybody had a good time, whether they deserved it or not, including the players, the spectators,—even the umpire. At the end of the fifth innings the score was Golden Beavers 13, Porcupines 5. In the sixth innings the Porcupines got three runs and in the last innings four more while the other team scored no more. The return game will likely be played some other time, and there will be a big crowd because everybody enjoyed this exhibition.

The ladies of the town are busy blessing Jack Maclean, Town Foreman, for the oil and tar that he put on the streets and that others now put on the carpets of the homes of town. Jack says that the road will soon take a grip of the oil and tar, but some of the ladies say they'll take a grip of him if they get him. So he is working down at the pumping station until after dark.
