The Ontario Government have announced their intention of purchasing pure-bred live stock for the Government Farm at New Liskeard.

Pte. Gerald Kennedy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Kennedy, returned to South Porcupine on Saturday after several years' service overseas.

The Cochrane branch of the G. W. V. A. have arranged to open club rooms and have leased the small building next to the Beaver Abitibi Co. offices in Cochrane for this purpose.

Among the soldiers returning this week from service overseas was Pte. Arthur Stingle who came in on Sunday's National after returning from overseas last week after some years spent with the colors.

District Deputy Grand Master Bro. W. M. Whyte officiated at the installation of officers at Cochrane I. O. O. F. on Monday evening in his usual capable manner. Bros. A. G. Carson and Geo. Lake also went up from Timmins and were among those assisting at the installation ceremonies.

The cow kept sinking deeper and deeper into the mire, and to hold her from going right through, she was roped and eventually with the aid of Mr. Pigeon's team she was rescued out of the mud. After being rescued the cow laid motionless on the ground as a number of boys and others gathered round her and thought sad thoughts believing the animal to be dying or dead. Then all of a sudden the cow got up with a series of snorts and kicks and made off as if getting into the cyanide were part of the usual day's business. Mr. J. W. Ray, of Toronto, took charge this week of the Goldfields, Mr. Kurt returning to England. Mr. Ray is an experienced and competent hotel manager having for many years successfully conducted one of Oshawa's leading hotels.

In the district baseball league series Porcupine Dome defeated Iroquois Falls last Wednesday at South End by the score of 12 to 6 in an interesting game, a large number from Timmins being in attendance though many hurriedly left on the false rumor that this town was endangered by bush fires.

When the bush fires were raging near Fredericton recently the women and children took refuge in the large culvert under the railway track at Buskewog. Some of the settlers also removed their valuables to the same place of apparent safety. It is a question, however, whether this place of refuge would have been habitable in case the fire had gone that way, but in any event the big culvert promised some measure of protection and safety.

Mr. P. Bardeseno returned last week after his service overseas in France and England. Leaving Canada with an infantry battalion as corporal he was transferred to the signalling section and there through his well-known speed and skill as a telegrapher his promotion was rapid. His innumerable friends here gave "Pete" a very hearty and sincere welcome back to the old Camp of which he was one of the popular pioneers. He left on Saturday for a two weeks' visit to his mother in Wisconsin, after which he will return to Timmins to take up again his business interests here.

At South Porcupine last week Chief C. McInnis had D. Levinson before the Magistrate for allowing his pigs to run at large. Mr. Levinson was warned that he must keep his pigs off the streets and other public places at all times and under all circumstances and with this warning and the payment of the costs, the case was left. Mr. H. E. Burtwell was charged with having a manure pile on the nurseries property that was an annoyance to some or a menace to health. He explained that he was willing to remove it, but had not yet been able to get time to do so after the police had warned him. He was given one more week to have it removed and everything to the satisfaction of the Chief of Police.

From the report in these columns of the recent meeting of the local Conference on the High Cost of living it might appear that Mr. J. A. Devaney, one of the representatives from the Board of Trade, questioned the profits made by local merchants and contrasted prices here and at Iroquois Falls in certain lines of goods. Mr. Devaney made no references along this line, the comparisons being made by another speaker. Mr. Devaney confined his argument to much the same lines as he did in taking up the question at the recent Board of Trade meeting. His opinion was that the conditions causing the high cost of living are by no means local and that only some such plan as the limitation by law of the profits of manufacturers and wholesalers in particular and other dealers in general will bring any real remedy. Mr. Devaney's suggestion in brief is that profits from trade should be limited by law just as profits from money loaned are now controlled by the law.
