**TIMMINS WINS FROM  
McINTYRE AT LACROSSE**

A big crowd gathered at Schumacher on Thursday night last for the first of the series of lacrosse matches between Timmins and McIntyre teams. There was a lively game with something doing all the time and much good play, though Timmins completely outclassed the McIntyre team. However, Armstrong, McIntyre, Labrash, Jean Pare and George MacDonald, for the McIntyre, worked hard and with some effect to prevent any complete walk over. The latter particularly, is swift on the field and a steady worker and promises to develop into a fine player. The old-timers like D. Loughrin, Geo Smith, P. McIntyre, W. M. Widdifield, J. A. Theriault, J. Everard, W. G. Smith, F. Ogilvie and J. T. Easton were too many for the McIntyre men and scored almost when they felt like it. Among the younger players for Timmins Frank McGuire played a great game. Good work was also done by Wilf. Brown, Duggan, Desarmeau, Chas. Pozzetti and B. E. Martin. The score, however, tells its own story. It was 9 to 1 in favor of Timmins. Ed Leslie in goal did not have as much to do as the McIntyre goal tender, the old-timers saw to that but what he had to do he handled in his usual cool and efficient way. By the attitude of the spectators, the game was most interesting and lacrosse is apparently as popular as the National Game should be.

A "still alarm" on Tuesday evening brought out the Fire Brigade in their old-time prompt style of response. The fire was at the Timmins Quick Lunch, a new restaurant recently opened on Cedar street, and making a speciality of "hot dogs," pork and beans in the old style, etc. Not much damage was done by the fire, as it was noticed in time and the fire brigade soon made it look like nothing at all, a few well-directed shots from the chemical tank taking all fire out of the fire. The blaze damaged the beaver board finish of a part of the lunch room and did a little other injury. It is thought that the origin of the fire was combustion caused by an oil stove being placed too close to the beaver-board wall.

LIGHTNING AT LISKEARD**

Milton Parcher, a seventeen-year-old Cobalt young man, was instantly killed on Sunday afternoon by being struck by lightning while in an open field near New Liskeard. He was with some other lads who were returning from a swim in the White River. When the flash of lightning came the other lads were shocked and dazed, while Milton was apparently struck in the neck by the bolt of lightning. His death was evidently instantaneous.

**SILVER FOX BRINGS \$525  
WHITE FOXES \$56 A SKIN**

At the July sales of the Armstrong Fur Trading Co. at the Pas Manitoba, a total of \$64,000.00 was paid, one Winnipeg buyer's purchase amounting to \$41,000.00. Messrs. Revillon Freres secured one silver fox at \$525.00, and W. J. Young bought 21 white foxes at \$56.00 a skin. The one blue fox brought \$86.00, Beaver fetched \$22.65; rats, 2.12; otter \$2.25; Marten, \$2.00; mink, \$14.00; lynx, \$5.00; bears, \$20.00; fisher, \$80.00; red fox, \$35.00; cross fox, \$78.00. There were 13,000 rats sold at this sale. The prices paid at this sale are not likely to be repeated again though no very large decline is expected, a steady price list being looked for during the ensuing year.



When it became definite, known that H.R.H. the Prince of Wales would open the Canadian National Exhibition this year the manager at once got into touch with the official photographers in London and requested a profile photograph of him for reproduction on the Victory Year Medal to be awarded to the winners in the Agriculture and other sections of the Big Fair. The photo shown above was received after considerable delay, and immediately a cable was rushed back to this effect:

"A mistake has been made. One you sent shows the Prince without hat or coat and with khaki shirt collar turned in. Charabug desirable, but hardly dignified enough."

Then came the answer:

"Sorry you dislike it. It's the Prince's favorite picture, taken with the Canadians in France and in every sense official."

And that is the reason why the Prince's picture will appear on the Canadian National Exhibition 1919 medals, hatless, coatless and in the careless attire of the Fighting Man in France. He will open the Big Fair on Monday, August 25th.

**REVIEW OF WAR WORK OF  
TIMMINS AND DISTRICT**

Representatives of the Canadian Associated Publishers have been in Timmins for the past two weeks in connection with the gathering of information, etc., relative to the war work of the district. The Veteran, the official organ of the G. W. V. A. in a recent issue says: "An announcement is made that will prove of exceptional interest. The Canadian Associated Publishers have undertaken to produce a war record which will deal with individuals and communities, giving to each that personal attention and description necessary to complete a war memorial, and no expense or labor is being spared to make this book one which will appeal to any person who served, either at home or abroad during the Great War."
