## Timmins News in Brief

Mr. Cecil Culbert returned to the Camp last week.

Mr. W. R. Lowery, of Cobalt, is in the Camp this week on a business trip.

Mr. J. Wayland returned on Thursday last from a visit to the south.

The next meeting of the Town Council will be held on Monday night.

Mr. Wilfred Brown is back in the Camp, after a couple of months in Kirkland Lake, previous to which he was on active service overseas.

Messrs. Geo. A. Smith and T. E. King left this week for Ottawa, having recently been appointed delegates to the Liberal Convention meeting in the Capital this week.

The games for the next few days in the Lacrosse schedule include McIntyre at Timmins on Thursday of this week, and Timmins at McIntyre on Friday, Aug. 15th.

Dr. Wood, who is well and favorably known as a specialist in the diseases of men and women, is now at the Hotel Goldfields, Timmins, and may be professionally consulted until Saturday next.

The Girls' Baseball game with the Schumacher team, expected to be played on Saturday evening last at Schumacher, was postponed until this week on account of the circus in the Camp last week.

Good progress is being made in the erection of the new Hollinger houses near the Athletic Grounds and on Spruce street. Work is also under way at the new Hollinger hospital on Fifth Avenue.

At New Liskeard on Friday the saw mill formerly known as the McCamus and McKelvie mill, and recently taken over by Messrs. Hill, Clark & Francis, was destroyed by fire, but by good work the firemen saved a large building adjoining, used as a sash and door factory. Sparks flew across the river and set fire to buggies on the deck, three rigs being destroyed out of a large consignment there.

Mr. Watt successfully conducted a bakery here before the war, and the quality and service then given the public will mean a very warm welcome back for him now to the business life of the Camp.

A general meeting of the Timmins Football Club and a Smoking Concert combined will be held this (Wednesday) evening August 6th, commencing at 8 o'clock, in the Oddfellows' Hall, over E. H. Bridger's store. The evening's program will include literary and musical numbers, "Smokes," and "drinkables," and a pleasant evening is assured to all attending. All members of the Timmins Football Association are cordially invited to attend, and as the membership runs close to the 100 mark there should be a godly crowd present.

And take notice that after the expiration of one month from the date of the first publication of this notice, the Acting Director of the Northern Development Branch, Lands Forests and Mines, Ontario, will under section 7 of said Act, apply to the Minister of Public Works at his office in the City of Ottawa, for approval of the said site and plans, and for leave to construct the said bridge.
