And take notice that after the expiration of One month from the date of the first publication of this notice, the Acting Director of the Northern Development Branch, Lands Forests and Mines, Ontario, will under section 7 of said Act, apply to the Minister of Public Works at his office in the City of Ottawa, for approval of the said site and plans, and for leave to construct the said bridge.
