**ANOTHER OPEN AIR BAND
CONCERT GIVEN SUNDAY**

Sunday afternoon about four o'clock the public had a pleasant surprise when a band under the leadership of Mr. R. Secco, marched up Third Avenue and stopped before the New Empire Theatre where an hour's good music was furnished in the open air. A large crowd gathered in a short time to hear the band music and all were pleased with what they heard. This Band was a combination of the Finlander Band and what was formerly the Italian Society Band. "What do you think of the European Band?" Jimmy Salomon asked. "That is what we ought to call it," Jimmy continued, "the European Band." If Jimmy's name for it is to be accepted then the European Band certainly furnished a fine line of good band music and if they are running rivalry to the recently-organized Citizens' Band then the town can easily stand all that kind of rivalry and be pleased. On Sunday, Sept. 14th, the Citizens' Band gave their first open air band concert and the citizens were well pleased. Sunday the "European Band" gave its first open air band concert and again the people were well pleased. Next Sunday, the weather being favorable, it is understood that the Citizens' Band will give another open air concert. If so, the public once more will be delighted. As President Wilson told the Japanese on one occasion "Go to it, gentlemen!" The variety of the selections on Sunday were worthy of note and all were well played. Special mention might fittingly be made of the cornet and clarinet playing, while the general instrumentation was good, and under the leadership of Mr. Secco this band will develop special excellence. The general impression is that a good move was made in combining the talent of the Finlander Band and the Italian Society Band. Perhaps, a further combination of this European Band with the Timmins Citizens' Band might be a further advantage. But in the meantime the public will be pleased enough as it is. Previously there were no band concerts, and the prospect now of frequent ones is a delightful one. If the Citizens' Band and the European Band will hold rivalry band concerts on alternate Sundays the public will keep on showering praise on the last one to be held, so that the other may come along the next week to beat it.

**THINGS STILL HUMMING
AT THE PAS, MANITOBA.**

The Pas Herald reports all the hotels and boarding houses as filled with mining people who are looked upon as the advance guard of the crowd to follow. By many it is thought that a real old-time mining boom has really begun in the Pas.
There appear to be no new developments in the matter of the gold finds. Mr. J. B. Tyrell is making an examination of the mineral fields of the district for the Dominion Government for the purpose, it is stated, of determining the need of a railway from the Pas, and the justification for its immediate construction. About 300 claims have been recorded in the Pas district since April 1st this year. The official report of the Manitoba Government is among the expert reports now awaited with interest.
There are no new developments in the oil strike, and it remains yet a question whether commercial oil has been found. Oil shales were found about 20 miles south of the Pas, and some crude black oil was scooped from the surface of a water spring. Shales have been forwarded to assayers for examination, and it is already known that these shales contain a certain quantity of oil, but whether sufficient to class them as commercially profitable is not stated. Interest in the Pas, however, is very keen and faith very strong, according to The Herald, but the oil situation for the present is overshadowed by the excitement created by the gold strike.
Last week the Hollinger Stores made announcement to their customers that hereafter the meats and grocery departments would close each evening at 6 p. m. on Saturdays and pay days. This means that these departments will close every day at six, excepting Saturdays only.

**MCINTYRE ANNUAL REPORT
VERY SATISFACTORY ONE**

Better Ore in Sight in Reserves. Net Profits Show Small Increase

The annual report of the McIntyre Porcupine Mines Limited is a very satisfactory one. The report was sent out last week to the shareholders, and as usual it is in very commendable form, as well as the matter being of the agreeable kind for those interested in the Company. The report shows that the net profits for the year ending June 30th has increased to \$683,350.00 as against \$680,361.00 for the previous year. The production of ore was 179,874 tons of an average value of \$9.76 a ton. The average value the previous year was \$9.61. Development work for the year amounted to 6,637 feet, and ore valued at \$1,776,203.00 was hoisted. The ore reserves are given as \$1,777,324.00, as compared with \$1,490,432.00 the previous year. The average value of the ore reserves the year under review is \$11.00 per ton, as compared with an average value of \$9.80 for the previous year. Total ore reserves now are 433,057. The total assets have increased by half a million, being now \$5,614,837. The surplus now stands at \$1,163,731.00 as compared with \$872,172.00 for the previous year. Current assets are \$717,804.00, as compared with \$393,678.00 for the previous year, while current liabilities have only increased from \$106,180.00 to \$122,377.00. One of the chief changes in the current assets is the increase from \$50,000.00 to \$250,000.00 in Victory Bond holdings. In his annual statement President J. P. Bickell refers to the difficulties encountered during war-times and how the costs of material and supplies have not declined apparently since peace was signed. Referring to the prevailing high cost of living he says: "In order to assist our employees the company has established its own store, selling all commodities at cost, and has also inaugurated insurance benefits, whereby employees receive half of their wages in case of sickness." He also points out that the improvement in grade of ore noticeable at depth is most gratifying and augurs well for the future prospects. "The management feels confident, provided that nothing unforeseen occurs, that the earnings shown for the last four months of this period will be maintained throughout the ensuing twelve months." The development program for the year contemplates the continuous sinking of the shaft, now down over 1400 feet.

**HOLLINGER ANNOUNCES
ANOTHER DIVIDEND**

A dividend of one per cent upon the capital stock of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines Limited is announced, payable Oct. 7th, 1919, to shareholders of record at close of business on Sept. 27. This is Dividend No. 68.

**RUSSIAN NOW ACCUSED
OF MANY SERIOUS CRIMES**

Committed for Trial on Forgery Charge, Now Accused of Wounding, Burglaries, Etc.

Last week Magistrate Atkinson committed a Russian with a name Joe Dymnen and several aliases for trial on a forgery charge. Under ordinary circumstances Joe would have had a comparative rest from police troubles until he had his trial before a judge, but in this case it was different. After he was committed for trial Constable Rayeroff kept on busy on the case and one of the results was that Joe may have a number of other charges also to face. One of these may be that of wounding with intent to do grievous bodily harm. This arises from a fracas some months ago at Iroquois Falls where another foreigner was badly wounded, though the culprit could not be traced at the time. Last week Chief Morbey of Iroquois Falls came over here with a couple of witnesses who were able to identify Joe as the man who did the wounding and got away. Joe strenuously and indignantly denies the suggestion, but he has also other things to deny. He is accused of having a part in some of the burglaries committed in this district, and several charges may be laid against him according to the police.
This Russian, Joe Dymnen, with his aliases was charged on Thursday only with one charge of forgery. According to the Crown's evidence and information Joe forged a cheque on Sept 11th for \$600.00 in the name of Frank Doxan. He was able to secure the cash and went away. Constable Rayeroff was sent on his trail and followed him down the line, tracking him to North Bay. At North Bay Constable Rayeroff by some clever work secured his man and brought him back here. It is understood that Joe was planning another little coup, but if so a different sort of coup from the one in which Constable Rayeroff landed him. Joe wouldn't do much talking to the police and all the information he gave about his movements did not help him much. The police on the other hand, once on the trail, kept right on Joe's tracks and the solution of several mysteries may be expected from his arrest, by which Constable Rayeroff is entitled to due credit.

The International Football Match between picked Scottish and English teams this afternoon will likely be the last event on the Athletic Grounds at Timmins this season. The contract has been let for the ploughing up of the ground, levelling off, etc., to have it in first class shape for next year. It was intended to commence the work the beginning of this week but the contractor was good enough to hold off until to-day's game could be played. He will start the work to-morrow, however, so the grounds will not likely be ready for use again this season, unless the weather is different to most past years in the North Land.

Work was started this week on the improvements to be made to the police station and municipal building which has been in an unfinished condition since last year when alterations and extensions were made to the structure. This week sees the start on the work of extending the top portion of the front of the building. In addition to making further room for the residence part of the building now occupied by the Chief of Police, the present addition will complete the structure so that it will have some sort of appearance along accepted lines.
