Timmins News in Brief

Mr. Carl Muller is away on a holiday visit to New York State and other points of interest.

The Timmins Oddfellows held a very pleasant Euchre and Smoker last night.

Mrs. T. Lawlor and son, Arthur, returned Monday night from a holiday spent at Buffalo, Toronto, and other points south.

Miss Martin, formerly of the Timmins Post Office staff, but for the past few months at Cochrane Post Office, left last week for her home in Hamilton.

On Saturday last the Hollinger Stores brought in a car of fruit which was sold very quickly. All day until the fruit was disposed of there was a busy time around the car. The carload included choice peaches, pears, apples, grapes, cucumbers, tomatoes, corn, peppers, etc. The employees of the Hollinger and McIntyre buying from the car report the fruit as of the finest quality and in excellent condition and the prices below regular charges here. At the car peaches sold for 95 cents to \$1.55 per basket, according to quality; apples, 95 cents per basket; grapes, cucumbers, tomatoes, each 55 cents per basket; pears, \$1.45 per basket. The fruit was secured from Mr. Chas. Sheridan, so the quality was assured, for this fruit man has brought in many carloads of fruit into the North Land, all kinds of fruit, but never yet "handed the people a lemon."

Last week the home of Mr. and Mrs. Scharf, Haileybury, was entered by a man at about 10.30 in the evening, when only Mrs. Scharf and her baby and two young ladies were in the house. Mrs. Scharf heard the man moving around downstairs and went to see who it was. She ordered the intruder out of the house, but he refused to move or speak. In the meantime the young ladies telephoned for Mr. Scharf. The burglar, who is described as "a very large, broad-shouldered man, clean shaven, coarse and rough-looking dressed in a dark suit, and with his cap pulled low down on his forehead," stayed until Mr. Scharf entered the back door, then he escaped from the front door, and no clue has yet been secured as to his identity. The only thing taken from the house was a sum of money, about \$2.00, in a baby's bank in the house.

Harvest Thanksgiving services will be held in St. Matthews Church on Sunday next as follows:—Holy Communion at 8.30 a. m., and Morning and Evening Prayer with special music at 11.00 a. m. and 7.00 p. m. respectively. The anthem in the morning will be, "O Lord, how manifold are Thy works," and in the evening, "Ye shall dwell in the land." Sunday School will be held at 3.00 p. m. and the sacrament of Holy Baptism administered at 4.15 p. m. Police court cases have proved profitable to the town this month, Chief Wilson reporting this week that fines for this month already total \$1400.00.

Constable Bennett had Bill Romanuk before Magistrate Atkinson on Thursday on a charge of illegally having liquor contrary to the O. T. A. As a consequence Bill had to pay a fine of \$200.00 and costs.

The Haileybury Public school building is to be completely equipped with a set of modern fire escapes.

The water in the rivers in this district is reported as higher now than during the spring months this year. This is a tribute to the effect of the rains during the past few weeks. Last week the floods swept away the bridge over the Shaw River, south of Porcupine.

Both the public and high schools of Haileybury are overcrowded, difficulty being found even in finding seats for the pupils in the public school. There are 475 pupils on the public school roll and several of the rooms have over 50 pupils.

There is a regular exodus going on from Sudbury of Austrians and other foreigners living in that town during the war. Last week fully 200 are said to have left Sudbury for Montreal in the hopes of being able to get back to Europe. The lumbermen of the district are said to be specially affected by the leaving of the foreigners, as it is difficult to get other men to do the kind of work the aliens had engaged in.

Mr. Harold Martin, Canadian Express Co. messenger on the Porcupine branch, left last week for his home in North Bay and will be away some weeks. On his return here he will be accompanied by his bride and they will take up residence in the house recently occupied by Mr. C. Staaf.
