HOLLINGER STORES MAKE 15 PER CENT. REDUCTION

Some Prices Will Be Below Cost
Coupons Replace Cards for Employees.

SUCCESSFUL NAVY LEAGUE MEETING AT SOUTH END.

Rev. Capt. Boal, formerly Chaplain in the British Navy, and now organizer for the Navy League of Canada, came to the Camp on Friday evening and spent the week-end here on business in connection with the Navy League work. On Sunday evening a meeting was held in the Majestic Theatre, South Porcupine, and despite the unfavorable weather and the very short notice given of the meeting, there was a crowd of about 100 present for the event. Dr. McInnis, Mayor of Timmins, and President of the Porcupine Branch of the Navy League, occupied the chair, and in opening the meeting outlined the aims and objects of the Navy League of Canada. Dr. McInnis also referred to the Big Drive for funds for the Navy League to be on this month, and said that he knew that South Porcupine would need no urging to do its part in this campaign, judging from its patriotic efforts in the past. There was some money left from the Porcupine Consolidated Patriotic Club contributions and Dr. McInnis hoped that the societies concerned would give a share of this to help the widows and orphans of the sailors. Rev. Capt. Boal in opening his address said that this country was so far from the sea that people were liable to think that they had little active concern with the Navy or the mercantile. He showed, however that this was not the case, for the gold and silver industries of the North depended for their very life upon unhampered shipping on the sea. For 100 years Canada had had the protection of the British Navy without a cent of cost and the use of the mercantile marine. He urged more Canadian ships and more Canadian sailors as a sound Canadian policy for the future, touching on the educational programme of the Navy League in this regard. In the meantime, he pleaded eloquently for consideration for the widows and orphans of the sailors who had given their lives during the war. Rev. W. Armes also spoke briefly but aptly on the good work of the Navy League and the part played by the sailors in the war—a part that should not be forgotten, and that should assure the fullest attention and generosity to the widows and orphans of the men of the Navy and the Mercantile Marine. Reeve C. B. Morgan, in a short but capable address, assured Capt. Boal that the campaign would have the fullest co-operation and support from the people of South Porcupine. Speaking from his own experience in the work of canvassing last year, he said he had not met with a single refusal or rebuff. Another feature of the evening was the fine selection of pictures given through the kindness of Mr. Fera, proprietor of the theatre. Scenes of the Old Country and views of the departure of the Canadian troops on the palatial ocean liners were shown, and all were much enjoyed by the audience. A collection taken up brought so generous a response that more than double the amount required for the necessary expenses of the meeting, such as light, etc., was received. The theatre was given free of rental for the evening, as were also the motion picture films shown.

The workmen of Ontario appeal for better beer—non-intoxicating beer—beer containing 2.51% alcohol by weight—THE BEER OF THE BALLOT.

Samuel Gompers, the world's greatest labor leader, stated the workman's position clearly when he said:

"The normal men, the men of Labor who work eight hours a day and no more, the workmen who earn decent pay, the workmen who have comparatively comfortable homes, they do not want the artificial spirit. The man of normal spirit finds comfort in pleasant surroundings; he does not need, and, as a rule, does not partake of intoxicating drinks; he shuns the effects of intoxicants. What we now ask is that the men of Labor, the masses of our people, shall have the opportunity to drink a glass of beer of not more than 2 1/2% by weight of alcohol in that

beer, and I am told you cannot drink enough of that character of beer to get drunk even if you tried."

Scientific tests, practical experiments and thorough research prove that beer of even greater strength than 2.51% of alcohol by weight, is absolutely non-intoxicating. (The results of these tests have been filed with the United States Circuit Court of Appeals).

As no harmful results can possibly come from drinking beer of this quality—is there any fair or logical reason why the working men should not have the more palatable beer for which they are asking—THE BEER OF THE BALLOT?
