**ORGANIZE NORTH LAND
HOCKEY ASSOCIATION**

Strong League Planned to Include
Sudbury, North Bay, Haileybury,
Cobalt, New Liskeard, Timmins,
Hollinger, Iroquois Falls.

Recently hockey enthusiasts in town have been in communication with Cobalt and other outside towns with a view to a big season for hockey in the North Land this coming winter. If the plans as now proposed materialize, the coming winter will see the most interesting and extended hockey season yet in the North Land. The plans now under way include the organization of a big Northern Ontario Hockey League, to include Sudbury, North Bay, Cobalt, Haileybury, New Liskeard, Timmins, Hollinger, Iroquois Falls, and Cochrane. All these teams have practically agreed to be represented at a meeting to be held in Cobalt on Wednesday, Oct. 8th at 3 p. m. Mr. J. R. Dier, of New Liskeard, President of the Temiskaming Hockey League, has called the annual meeting of the Temiskaming League for that date and delegates from every town between Sudbury and Cochrane and including those two towns have been invited and expect to send representatives to the meeting where the Northern Ontario Hockey Association will likely be formally organized. The hockey enthusiasts of Timmins and the Hollinger are to meet on Monday evening next, Oct. 6th in the Council Chambers, Timmins, to consider the matter and select representatives to go to the meeting at Cobalt on the 8th. Timmins has a goodly line-up of hockey experts, enough for two good teams, one for the town and one for the Hollinger. All interested are urged to attend the meeting in the Council Chambers on Monday evening, as this meeting will likely be the keystone of the coming hockey season's success.

The proposed Northern Ontario Hockey Association, to be organized at the meeting at Cobalt on Wednesday next, Oct. 8th will have a big programme before it. The various local clubs to be included are urged to get their ideas definitely formed on the various proposals coming up, so as to be ready to go ahead. Three delegates from each club will be permitted to attend and take part in the discussion but only one will be allowed to vote. The groups for this Northern Ontario Hockey League, as now proposed, are as follows:—

1. Sudbury and North Bay.
2. Cobalt, Haileybury and New Liskeard.
3. Timmins, Hollinger, Cochrane and Iroquois Falls.

There may be changes or additions to this grouping, South Porcupine or McIntyre, perhaps, being able to put in a team.

Other matters to be decided upon in regard to the proposed Northern Ontario Hockey Association will be the name, affiliations, playing rules, etc. Several names have already been suggested, some of them not inclusive enough and some apparently too clumsy. The most popular so far seems to be the Northern Ontario Hockey League. This however might conflict with the Northern Hockey Association in Old Ontario. The delegates perhaps can agree on a more distinctive name for the League. The affiliations of the proposed league will also need to be decided upon. One proposal is to have it affiliated with the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union accepting their amateur rules and card system. This allows the League's own constitution, playing rules, etc., and a standing with other leagues in any challenge games such as those for the Allan cup. The playing rules will be decided upon for the League, these probably to be based on the O. H. A. Another important question will be the matter of a residence rule for players in the various clubs. Then, of course, the question of trophies will also likely be touched upon. Probably there will be a cup or other prize for each group. There is reason for believing that a suitable trophy will be put up here for competition between the local teams in the series. Also, for the final competition for championship between the various winning teams in the groups there will be no doubt a valuable cup or other suitable trophy.

The North Land can have an unusually successful hockey season this year, if the present plans are carried out, and all co-operate to make the sport a success this year. There is ample material in the line of good hockey players, with promising younger players to be trained and practised. All interested in hockey in Timmins should get busy now. The first step is to attend the meeting in the Council Chambers on Monday evening at 8 p. m.
