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THANKSGIVING DAY TO BE MONDAY, OCT. 13th.

Monday Oct. 13th, will be Thanksgiving Day in Canada this year. After several other dates had been practically agreed upon changes were made and eventually the original date was re-selected. Possibly the best idea advanced for a permanent date for Thanksgiving Day in Canada was that advocated by Mr. I. E. Pedlow, M. P. for South Renfrew. Mr. Pedlow suggested that a certain day approximating each year to the date on which the signing of the Armistice took place in 1918, be set apart as a national day of thanksgiving. He emphasized the necessity for a settled date, for business and other reasons. The proclaiming of a national thanksgiving holiday each separate year on a new date was an inconvenience and unsatisfactory for business and other reasons. In selecting a permanent date, no more acceptable and appropriate day could be chosen than the day on which the Armistice was signed. Also he pointed out that this year was the year to settle the matter. In the meantime, however, the Government had decided to name Oct. 13th as Thanksgiving Day this year. Mr. Pedlow pointed out that Sir Robert Borden had promised that his idea of having Armistice Day as the national Thanksgiving Day should be presented to parliament this year before the holiday was finally set. The Government explained that Sir Robert Borden being absent owing to illness, a misunderstanding had arisen regarding the question, but opportunity was given for the presentation of Mr. Pedlow's idea. In parliament and in the country the suggestion seemed to find popular favor, but eventually it was sidetracked as noted above. First, Nov. 11th was agreed upon as the date for this year; then, the second Monday in November of each year (which would approximate to Armistice Day, and also be more convenient

from business and other viewpoints) was agreed upon. Then, Mr. Pedlow's bill was given the 'six months' hoist, the vote being 78 to 73. Thus the idea of having Armistice Day permanently slated as a Day of National Thanksgiving in Canada was sidetracked, and for this year Monday Oct. 13th will be Thanksgiving Day. Perhaps, members of the Government decided to have Thanksgiving Day on the 13th this year because they think the Ontario Temperance Act will be upheld, and so after the 20th the people will not be able to give thanks. At any event, while Thanksgiving Day is now finally set for this year, its celebration and the celebration of Armistice Day are very uncertain for the future.

ANOTHER BOOZE CHARGE AGAINST BILL ROMANCHUK

Constable Bennett, of Schumacher, has another charge to come up tomorrow against Bill Romanchuk. Three weeks ago Constable Bennett made a rather clever catch of three men who were in a buggy along with a quantity of liquor. Constable Bennett saw the men drive up a lane-way and suspecting that they had something to hide he made his way down the lane from another direction. As soon as the men saw the officer they left the buggy and tried to get away. Constable Bennett, however, managed first to secure a man named Laluk who said the booze in the buggy belonged to Romanchuk. The officer made Laluk, whom he knew, stay by the buggy, while he chased Romanchuk whom he secured on the street bringing him back to pick up Laluk. Last week Constable Bennett laid another charge against Romanchuk, a quantity of liquor being found in his house. This latter charge will come up before Magistrate Atkinson tomorrow.

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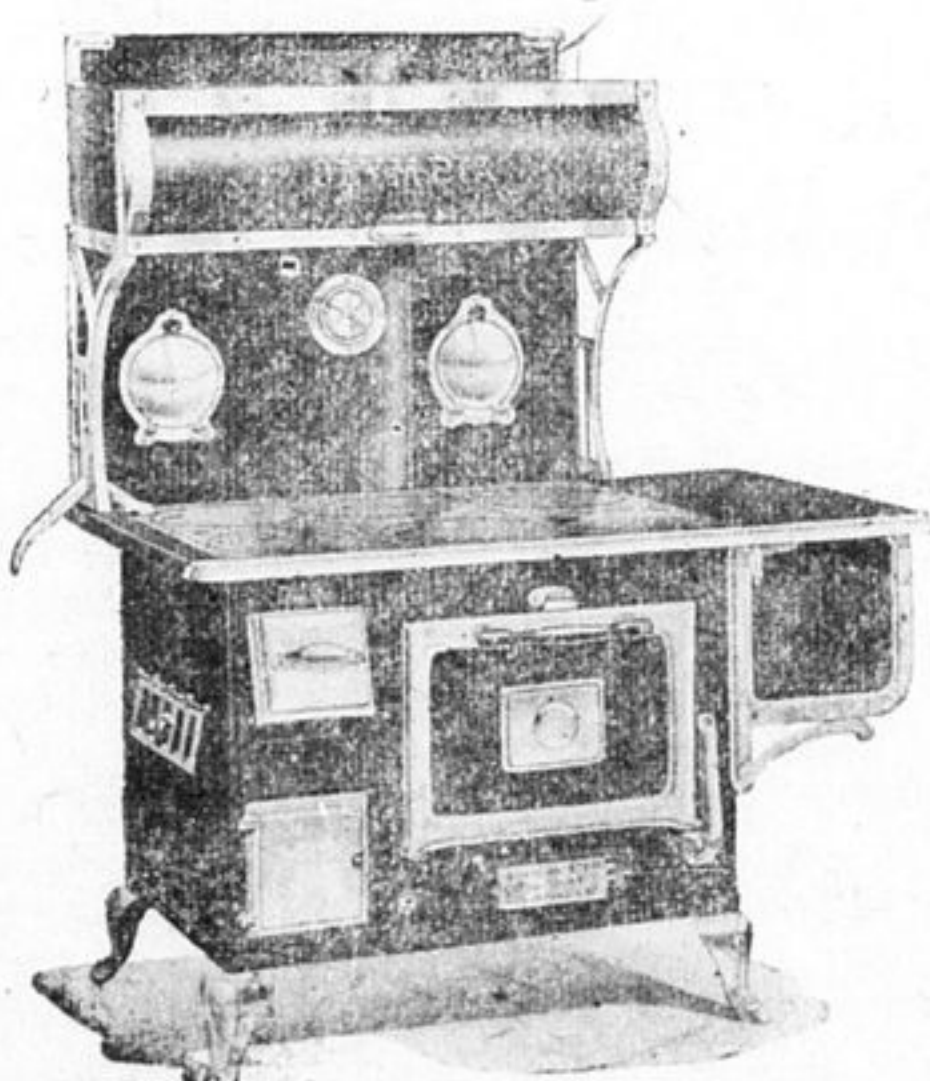

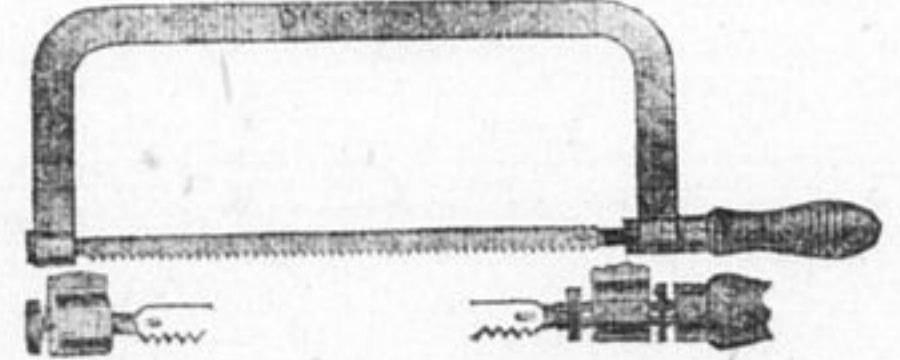
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
