Timmins News in Brief

Mr. H. E. Montgomery, Clerk-Treasurer, returned this week from his vacation spent in the south.

Mr. R. S. Potter, of Matheson, Conservative candidate in the coming Provincial election contest, spent the week-end in town.

Owing to the absence of some of the solicitors in the cases before the police magistrate last Thursday, Magistrate Atkinson granted remands in practically all the cases coming before him here last week.

As will be noted by the advertisement elsewhere in this issue, Miss J. McDonald, who has a large and successful class at Iroquois Falls, is visiting Timmins each Saturday until further notice for the teaching of piano playing.

The final meeting of the members of the Timmins Football Club has been called for Wednesday evening of next week, Oct. 8th in the Council Chambers, to commence at 8.15 p. m. sharp. As it is desired to wind up the business of the Club for the season a full attendance is desired and all holding membership cards in the Club are urged to be present.

Mr. M. O. Hammond, for years the Financial Editor of The Toronto Globe and thus in charge of the mining news department of the paper, was a visitor last week to the Porcupine. He visited the leading mines of the district and no doubt the readers of the Globe and the prospects of the Porcupine will be advantaged by the articles that will result from this visit.

The Cobalt Great War Veterans have been conducting a special campaign for new members, and ninety new members were added to the roll in the first three days of the campaign. In the teams competition Comrade Griffiths leads with forty new members added by his team. Cobalt G. W. V. A. has now a membership of about 300, and a few more are expected before the membership campaign closes to-day.

According to The Nugget, Messrs. Joseph Gorman and James McGuire were nominated as delegates from the Cobalt Miners' Union to the Trades and Labor Congress at Hamilton last week, but both of these leaders were beaten by large majorities in the voting to select the delegates. The delegates chosen to represent Cobalt at the Congress were Messrs. James Clooney and James Corrin. According to The Nugget Mr. Clooney has been known locally as an earnest advocate of the One Big Union plan. The Labor Congress at Hamilton last week, it may be noted, went on record as opposed to the One Big Union idea.

Ordinary newspapers sometimes contradict each other, but last week The Advance put that sort of thing in the shade, by contradicting itself—all in the space of one brief paragraph. In referring to a recent announcement by the Hollinger Stores the paragraph in question said first that the Hollinger Stores would hereafter close their meat and groceries departments each evening at 6 p. m. on Saturdays and pay days. That was correct. The paragraph then proceeded to say that these departments would consequently close now every day at 6 p. m., excepting Saturdays. That was a contradiction unwarranted by the facts. The Hollinger Stores will close their meats and groceries department EVERY business day. Before the announcement a couple of weeks ago, the Hollinger Stores were closing every evening at 6 p. m., excepting pay nights and Saturday nights. Following the announcement pay nights and Saturday nights are now included in the early closing, so the Hollinger Stores close EVERY business day at 6 p. m. so far as the meats and groceries departments are concerned.

In the last issue of the Canada Gazette, notice is given of the application of James Russell Booth, laborer, of Cobalt, for divorce from his wife, Olivia Booth, on the usual grounds of adultery and desertion.

Mr. Alex Borland left on Friday last for a holiday visit to Cobalt, Toronto, London, Woodstock and other points south. Fire Chief A. Borland, Mrs. Borland and Miss Maimie expect to leave this week for the south on a holiday.

Last week Provincial Officer W. Moore seized two trunks coming into the Camp. One of the trunks contained liquor and the other contained a beautiful specimen of a private still. Officer Moore is now seeking the owners or shippers of the trunks and would especially be pleased to meet the man or woman who intended to use that complete and clever little private and illicit liquor still.

The July statements for the T. & N. O. Railway is just issued and shows that the passenger earnings for the month this year were \$88,268.61, an increase of \$27,890.19 over the corresponding month in 1918. The freight earnings for July, 1919, were \$173,193.23, or an increase of \$22,535.85 over July, 1918. The passenger earnings thus showed an increase of 46 per cent and the freight earnings an increase of 15 per cent, or a total increase for passenger and freight of 23 per cent over July, 1918.

An unusual shipment of potatoes was made last week from Sandy Falls to Mr. J. H. Black, Toronto. The potatoes were all grown at the Falls and were remarkable for their large size, with the added quality that they were all as good as they were big and as fine as they looked. These potatoes, averaging about six inches in length, and well shaped and proportioned, illustrate the high class of vegetables that can be grown up in this country.

According to the despatches from Ottawa, the by-election in Temiskaming to fill the seat made vacant by the death of Hon. Frank Cochrane, will likely be held towards the end of November. The Government, it is said do not intend to allow the seat to remain open any length of time, but there is not time now to prepare the lists, etc., in order to hold the Temiskaming election on Oct. 27th the day on which the vote will be taken in the seven vacant constituencies for which writs were recently issued.

Mayor McKinnon of Cobalt is making special efforts these days to have arrangements made for the Prince of Wales to spend at least a half day in Cobalt. At present it is understood that His Royal Highness will visit Cobalt and Timmins on the same day, and it was not expected that this plan would allow for more than an hour's stay in Cobalt. Mayor McKinnon believes that this is not enough time to see all the beauties and oddities of Cobalt and so is seeking to have the royal party stay a longer time at the Silver City. Mayor McKinnon is also in communication with Admiral Halsey regarding the Prince's visit to Timmins, and is doing all possible to assure that the Prince will have proper opportunity to see the wonders of this great gold camp.
