Meeting Friday Night So Decides, After Hearing Report of Delegate to Cobalt Meeting.

There was a largely attended meeting of the bockey enthusiasts of the district in the Council Chambers on Friday evening. Mr. C. G. Wiliams, president of the recently organized hockey association, occupied the chair, and representatives were present from the McIntyre hockey

enthusiasts at Schumacher. Mr. G. S. Lowe, who was the delegate from here to the meeting of the representatives of the hockey clubs of the North Land held at Cobalt last Wednesday, gave a very clear and comprehensive report of the discussions, proceedings, etc., at 3 that meeting. enlistment. As it was not known definitely what teams would enter the number of hockey clubs that could join the Northern Ontario Hockey Association. It was proposed, however, that the playing be divided into three groups,-north, south and central,—the winners of each group later playing off. The central group would include Cobalt. Haileybury and New Liskeard. The southern group would be North Bay and Sudbury. The northern group could include Timmins, Hollinger, McIntyre, Iroquois Falls, or whatever teams might be possible up here. In case f Iroquois Falls, where there is only an open air rink, being out of the League, a team from this district could play with the Central Group, and Mr. Lowe explained that this latter plan would please Cobalt, Haileybury and New Liskeard very much. In the matter of officers, it was decided to have a president, vicepresident, secretary and treasurer for the Northern Ontario Hockey Association, with an executive to include two members to represent each of the three groups. The immediate past-president each year is to be the vice-president for that year, so that the executive each year will have one member in special touch with the previous year's bockey. The Officers, President, Secretary and Treasurer are to rotate in the three groups from year to year. This year it was thought best to have the officers from the Central Group, Mr. Lowe thought this was particularly fitting on account of the fact that the Cobalt and New Liskeard people had done so much to make the League possible and deserved some special recognition for their interest and effort in behalf of hockey in the North Land. Mr. Angus Campbell, of Cobalt, was appointed the first President of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association, and Mr. Charlton, of New Liskeard, Secretary-Treasurer. The Association had no objection to there being a separate local league here. Sudbury would likely have such an independent league for practice, etc. Mr. Lowe concluded his report by telling of the pleasant time enjoyed by the delegates. After their lengthy business session, they adjourned to the Cafeteria Cafe where a pleasant dinner was served and toasts given to those who had been instrumental in forming the League and to the success of North Land hockey,


