**CALL TO CANADIANS
 FOR THE NAVY LEAGUE**

Appeal of the Navy League is
 Directed to all Classes
 Of Citizens.

Canadians all over the Dominion will remember how in September of last year the Navy League of Canada made an appeal for one million dollars for the relief of the dependents of dead and injured seamen of the merchant marine who were the victims of the German submarine campaign.

It will be remembered how under the name of "Sailors Week," thanks to the thorough-going co-operation of the public with the workers—the campaign was a complete success and the objective was reached and passed.

The Navy League of Canada again appeals to all citizens for funds urgently required to carry on its work. The "Nelson Day" Campaign has been launched and this week the sum of \$500,000 will be raised by voluntary contribution.

The money will be devoted to the payment of the debt of gratitude to the Canadian seamen lost in the war; to provide protection and home comfort for seamen who come to Canadian ports; to educate the people to the need of a strong navy and a strong mercantile marine and to train native-born lads for service in the navy and Canadian merchant ships. All the money accruing from the "Nelson Day" campaign will be spent in Canada.

**ONE PETER IS WHITE AND
 THE OTHER IS WRIGHT**

Several in Timmins last week apparently confused Peter White, K.C., who spoke here on behalf of Mr. R. S. Potter, with Mr. Peter Wright,

Councillor of the British Seamen's Union, who spoke here some months ago on behalf of the Navy League. Some here made a special point of turning out for the meeting here on Thursday night believing that they were again going to hear Peter Wright. They heard one Peter, but not the one they expected. One Peter is an apostle of Liberal-Conservative doctrines; the other Peter is an apostle of the working man and the British Empire, and especially the British Navy. One Peter is a King's Councillor; while the other would perhaps be best pleased to be described as a Workingman's Councillor. Both Peters are able, energetic, eloquent, but they are entirely different types of men. One is White the other is Wright. The White is Right much of the time, but the Wright is White all the time and through and through. The confusion in the public mind between the two Peters was perhaps added to by the fact that Peter Wright is again in Canada, being over in this country from England in behalf of the Navy League. He is expected to visit Timmins again in the near future.

PRINCE OF WALES RECEPTION.

we trust that in the short time allotted to us, you will be able to carry away with you some idea of Northern Ontario's vast resources and the remembrance of the big and loyal spirit of its people.

It gives me great pleasure to welcome Your Royal Highness to the Town of Timmins, and to present you with this address this afternoon.

Greeted by cheer after cheer, His Royal Highness made the following reply, an autographed copy of which was left with the Town and will be a valued part of the municipal archives:—

Reply to the Address of the Town of Timmins.

Mr. Mayor:—I am most grateful for your cordial address. It is a special pleasure to me to have been able to pay even this very fleeting visit to Timmins and the Porcupine District. I know how valuable your development has been, and I wished particularly to make acquaintance with a part of North Ontario for myself.

Timmins owns its full number of veterans, men and women, from the great war, and I thank you most sincerely for the welcome which you have given me in their name. It was the fighting forces of Canada on the Western Front which first taught me

something of the spirit of this great Dominion which appeals to me so much, and I am always glad to have an opportunity of seeing my friends of the Canadian Corps again.

I will gladly convey to my father, the King, your warm assurance of loyalty to the Throne and to the free British institutions which he represents. In his name I wish the Town of Timmins a prosperous and happy future.

The Prince then reviewed the Veterans, the Scouts, Guides and School turned soldiers in the march past His Royal Highness, and they made an impressive showing. In an impromptu address to them His Royal Highness thanked them for their welcome, commented on their valor and courage in the war, and congratulated them on their smart appearance. He referred to meeting many of them overseas in France, and said that he wished now to be considered still as one of their comrades. The Boy Scouts, the Girl Guides, and the School Children also were royally complimented on their fine appearance and splendid order.

Opportunity was then made for the

Children. There were about 300 people to meet the Prince and hundreds took advantage of the occasion to be presented to the most popular Prince of to-day.

Amid enthusiastic cheers from the big crowds, the Royal party then left in automobiles for an inspection of the Hollinger Mine. Here he viewed the mine property and was taken through the mill. As a souvenir of the visit Mr. A. T. Brigham, general manager of the Mine, presented him on behalf of the Hollinger, with a beautiful mounted gold nugget. This nugget is about 6 inches by 3 1/2, mounted on a polished maple hardwood base, and encased in a beautiful plush lined mahogany case. It is an elegant specimen of Hollinger gold ore, of striking appearance, and streaked with wide patches of free gold. Its value is variously quoted as from \$1500.00 to \$7,000.00. A gold plate on the nugget bears an inscription showing that it is presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales from the Hollinger Mine. The Prince was much pleased with this gift and generally delighted with his visit to the Mine.

Returning from the Mine, His Royal Highness, shook hands with

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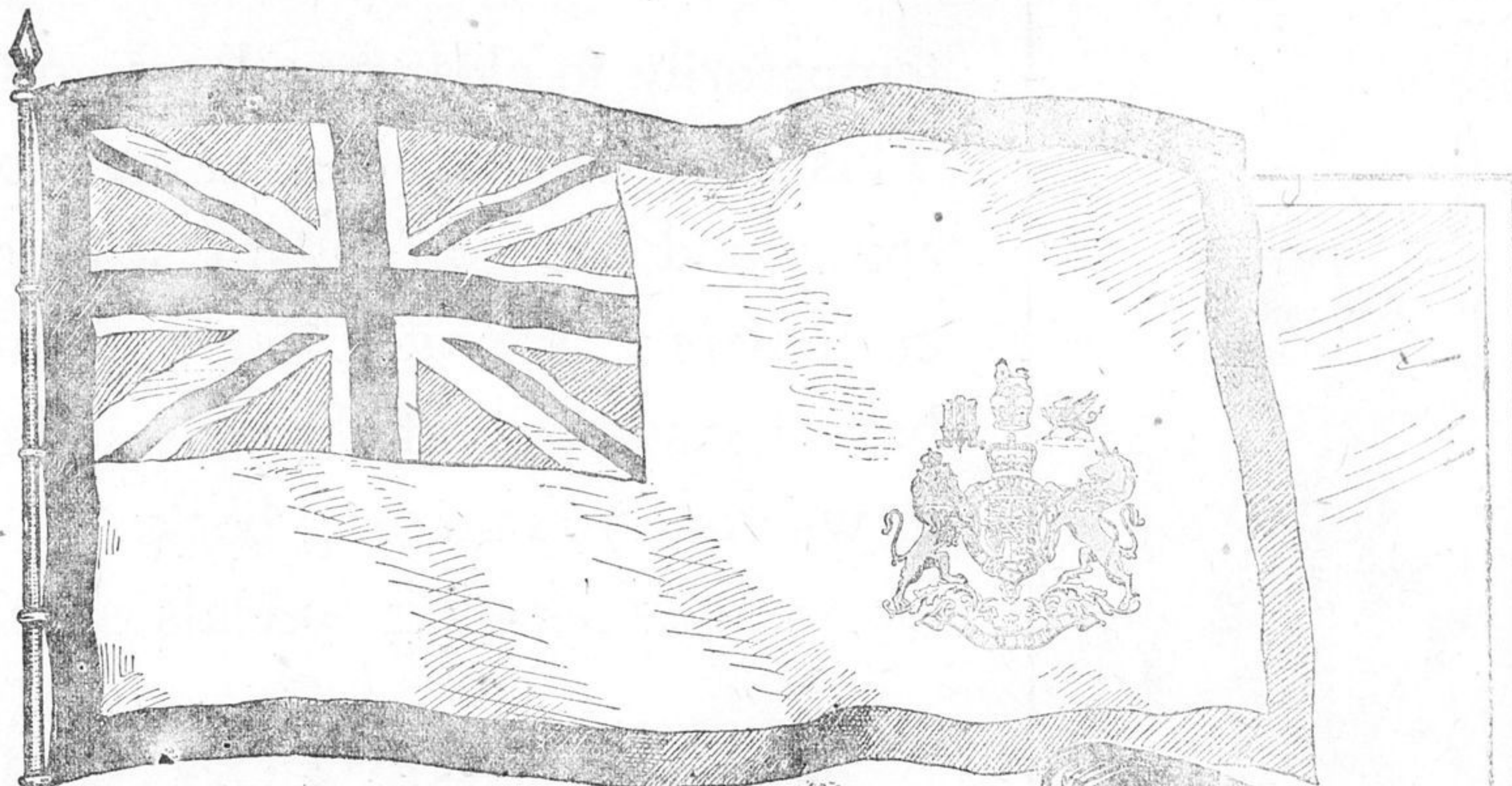

the driver of the Hollinger auto in which he had travelled (Mr. Jas. McGrath), and amid more rousing cheers, left again on his private train at 6.30.

During the visit to town copies of The Advance were secured for the Prince to be kept among the souvenirs of his visit to the Porcupine.

His Royal Highness won all hearts here by his democratic bearing and there is general and genuine enthu-

siasm here for this attractive and kindly Prince. On the other hand, the Prince was delighted with his reception here and the visit generally. The proceedings went along without a hitch of any kind, and the Mayor and his assistants have been showered with sincere commendation for the outstanding success of the event, generally acknowledged to be the best reception given the Prince outside of the big cities.



**"I Hope
 Every City and
 District Will Win
 My Flag"**

When Edward, Prince of Wales—eager, bright eyed, smiling and sincere—arrived in Canada in August, and when he voiced his great admiration of the wonderful achievements of Canadians, on the fields of battle and at home, once again we were thrilled with joyous pride.

He asked concerning Canada's reconstruction programme, and when he was told of the Victory Loan 1919, he graciously consented to the use of his Coat of Arms on a flag, which is to be the prize of honour for districts achieving their quota in the loan.

In dedicating "The Prince's Flag" at Ottawa on Labor Day, His Royal Highness said in part:—

"It is a great joy to me to be associated with the loan, which is the bridge between war and peace, and which is finishing off the job."

"I hope every city and district will win my flag."

Striking, and beautiful in design, this flag will form not only a unique memento of Victory Year, but a lasting and outstanding souvenir of the visit of His Royal Highness—a visit which will remain as one of the most memorable events in Canada's history.

The reproduction above shows the design of the flag. The body is white, the edge red; in the upper left hand corner is the Union Jack, and in the lower right hand corner the Prince of Wales' Coat of Arms.

The flag is made in two sizes, 4 feet 6 inches by 9 feet for small cities, towns and villages, and 7 feet by 13 feet 6 inches for cities of over 10,000 population.

Canada has been divided into canvassing districts by the Victory Loan Organization. Each city forms one district. Other districts have been determined according to population.

Each of these canvassing districts has been allotted a certain amount in Victory Bonds to sell. To win the Prince's Flag, therefore, a district has to sell its allotment. That is the one and simple condition.

Anticipating that many districts will buy far beyond their allotment, the organization decided that for each twenty-five per cent. excess of the quota one Prince of Wales' Crest be awarded. Thus the workers in a district doubling its quota will be the proud winners of four small crests for their Honour Flag. These crests will be sewn to the flag. The Prince's Crest—



the three ostrich plumes—is shown at the top of the coat of arms.

To every organization with fifty or more employees, where seventy-five per cent. of the enrollment invests a total of ten per cent. of the annual payroll in Victory Bonds, a supplementary Prince of Wales Flag in smaller form—48 inches by 34 inches—will be awarded.

The allotment for each district has been carefully considered, and is based on a conservative estimate of the purchasing power of the district.

Your district can sell its allotment and thus win the Prince's Flag, provided each person does his or her share.

You will gladly do your part and encourage your neighbour to do his.

Remember YOUR purchase may be the one that decides whether or not your district is to be the proud possessor of the Prince's Flag.
