ASSOCIATION SATISFIED WITH 1919 TOWN COUNCIL

two years there might be a change. There were several big questions, such as the completion of the Waterworks extensions and sewer system, better roads, new main from river, etc., to be dealt with this coming year, and if the people were satisfied with the work of the past year, it would seem that the present Council would be the best to carry these works through. The Mayor gave a detailed explanation of the question of waterworks extensions and sewerage, explaining that the delay in getting started on the contract was due to the time taken in making the necessary financial arrangements. "We are in good financial shape now and have financed the work so far without a hitch, but if we had started the work before getting the arrangements perfected, I do not know where we would be to-day," said the Mayor. Touching on the repeated suggestion of the Fire Underwriters for a new main from the river the Mayor said this would have to be attended to eventually and there must also be consideration of an enlarged waterworks system. A plan that would adequately supply the mines of the district had been suggested and such a system would be a revenue producer eventually. The Mayor also took occasion to give well merited praise to Councillor A. Brazeau for the time, the interest and the attention he had given to the waterworks extension and sewerage construction. His services had certainly been of great value to the Town in this regard. Councillor L. S. Newton also had hearty words of praise for Councillor Brazeau's good work and his constant attention to the Waterworks Dept.

President Bartleman voiced the general appreciation felt for the work of the 1919 Council, and suggested that the ratepayers continue their interest so that good municipal government might be assured. Mr. A. Booker spoke along somewhat similar lines. While there was general satisfaction with the Council, there was always room for improvement in almost anything, and to secure the highest standard Mr. Booker thought interest should be kept up by all the ratepayers in matters that concerned them so closely.

Councillor L. S. Newton gave words of appreciation for the work of the Ratepayers' Association and said he was only sorry that more did not take an interest. During the present year the Ratepayers Association had been

of value to the Council through the support given. He welcomed fair criticism at any time, and he thought that when people took a live interest there was less probability of unfair criticism.

In answer to a question, the Mayor said that the Council at its last meeting had received the report of the Committee regarding a joint incinerator for Timmins and Tisdale and Mountjoy. The cost would be comparatively small under the plan proposed, and for the advantage of the Town some such system was necessary. The present plan of garbage disposal would have to be discontinued before long. The total cost of the proposed incinerator was \$14,500.00, to be borne by the Town and Township, with perhaps some contribution from the Ontario Government for the unorganized township of Mountjoy. It was too late for the present year's Council to do anything but the matter would no doubt be considered by the next Council.

In reply to another question, Dr. Melnis said that nothing had been done by the Council in regard to installing a temporary septic tank, as it was too late in the year. The regular septic tank for the sewerage system would be gone on with in the spring.

Councillor Newton, in reply to a question regarding the proposed site for the incinerator, gave a number of reasons why it was the best available. It was in such a situation that the prevailing winds would blow away from the town, and it was conveniently located.

President Bartleman asked for an expression of opinion regarding the question of the T. & N. O., being taken over by the Federal Government as part of the National Railways. In the latter event he was informed that the branch from Timmins to the C. N. R. near Sudbury would be built, but otherwise there would be no such connection made. This line to Sudbury was of vital importance to Timmins and Mr. Bartleman suggested that the Ratepayers Association might take some action in the matter. Mr. LaPrairie and others thought this a question for the Board of Trade. M. Reed, President of the Board of Trade said the matter had already been discussed and would be before the next meeting of the Board of Trade. He thought the line should be built, but the question was which Government—Dominion or Provincial—to approach in the matter. He quoted the resolution passed by the Cobalt Board of Trade to show the advantages and disadvantages of the T. & N. O., being taken over by the Dominion. The Cobalt Board of Trade said that under Dominion ownership we would have only one train a day on the T. & N. O. He did not know what authority there was for such a statement, but thought the matter should be fully considered before Timmins made any move. He favored a plan of pressing the request on the Provincial Government and if within a reasonable time no action was taken attention could then be turned to the Dominion. Some of those present were strongly against taking over of the T. & N. O. by the Dominion. One speaker pointed out that the road was built primarily and expressly as a colonization road. Whatever the faults of the Provincial Governments in the past, they certainly had more interest in this country than the Government at Ottawa. The T. & N. O. was a North Land institution that might be improved but should not be given up. Eventually it was decided to leave the question to the next meeting of the Board of Trade.

Secretary Booker made passing reference to the ratepayers who did their "kicking" in the stores and on the streets but who would not show enough interest to turn out to a meeting of this sort. He thought the ratepayers generally should show more interest in their own business (the conduct of municipal affairs) and then they would likely find that they would have less grounds for any criticism of officials. If they would not take an interest, however, they had no right to expect anything in the line of the best service.

The meeting adjourned to the call of the President.
