SUPREME COURT AT HAILEYBURY MARCH 16th.

During the first half of next year (1920) there will be two sittings of the Supreme Court of Ontario at the Court House, Haileybury. The Jury Sessions with Mr. Justice Logie presiding, will open on March 16th. The Non-Jury Assizes will open at Haileybury on May 18th, according to the schedule now officially announced. Chief Justice Falconbridge is listed to preside at the Non-Jury Sessions.

SLEIGH DOG TEAMS USED IN MUNICIPAL ELECTION.

There was an innovation at the municipal elections in the Pas, Manitoba, some days ago. Dog teams were used to carry voters to and from the polls for the annual voting for municipal government. There were several dog teams in use for the purpose and this method of conveying voters gave a true North Land touch to the election. In the early days of the North Land camps, when dog teams are the most popular (and some times the only) form of transportation facilities there is seldom much doing in municipal election matters. Indeed in the early dog team days there is usually no municipal organization at all. When the Camps progress to the standing of organized towns and townships the humble but useful dog team seems to be too homey a feature for municipalities that confidently expect to reach city status in a few months. At the Pas, however they have progress, energy and modern methods, and at the same time have retained the useful and valuable dog team. The moral of it all is:—"Don't forget the coming Dog Race in the Porcupine!"

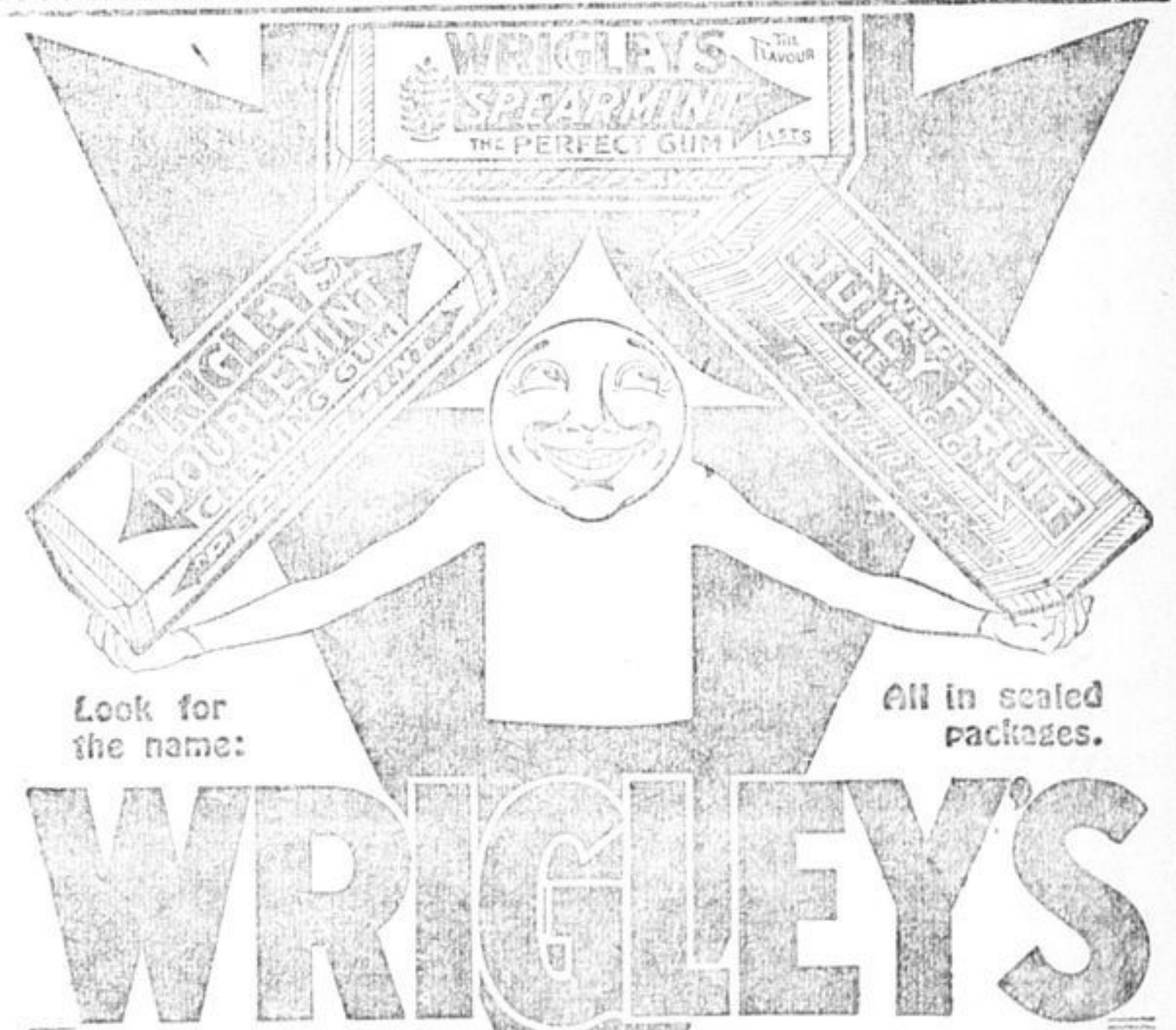
