ELEMENTARY CLASSES IN PHYSICS AND CHEMISTRY.

RAW FURS BRINGING BIG PRICES THESE DAYS.

Mr. Neh Faulkenham, old-time prospector of the North Land, and fur buyer with headquarters at Mathe son, was in the Camp this week on business. "I come up to see a man about a dog," he said. When asked about the fur business, he answered that it was "skookums." "In selling furs these days the chief thing the trappers do is to find out how much money you have and then consider if that is enough," he suggested laughingly. Fisher furs bring from \$75 to \$150; muskrats can not be legally sold in Ontario, but the Quebec variety bring \$100 each; beavers sell at \$15 to \$45; otter at \$35 to \$50. There is hardly any fox in the country, and the same may be said about lynx. "Trappers never received such prices before," he said, "but everything is high these days, so the trapper is only getting his share. I hardly think such prices can last long, but it is fine for the trappers while they do last."

BOXING EXHIBITION HERE LAST THURSDAY.

The change from the original date set for the event and other causes that had nothing to do with the merit of the occasion no doubt had their influence on the attendance at the boxing bouts given under the management of Mr. J. Flynn at the Finlander Hall on Thursday evening last. In any event there were only about 100 in attendance, though the event deserved a better crowd. There were some fine exhibitions of skilled boxing and many of those taking part in the programme showed that they had undoubtedly had much ring experience. The fact that there were no decisions given for any of the events, and no "rough stuff" in evidence perhaps disappointed a few, but those interested in skilled work with the gloves were pleased with several of the bouts. This was particularly true of the main event, in which Jim McInnis and Jack Babineau gave a talented boxing exhibition. McInnis is an old-timer in the ring, with science and experience, while Babineau, a returned soldier who made a boxing hit overseas, kept up his end of the contest. Other events for the evening showed the latent talent in the boxing line in the district.

MYSTERY ABOUT STORY OF "ONE OF THE BLOOD."

"It's too good to give away," says Manager "Pete" of the New Empire Theatre when asked to outline the story of the plot of Douglas Fairbanks' forthcoming production, "One of the Blood," snoring at the New Empire on Friday and Saturday of this week. Then, he goes to Mexico to demonstrate to the bandits what they don't know about their business, and he winds up by butting in on the affairs of a little principality in Europe. It is the jolliest old mix-up you ever saw, and Doug. Fairbanks knows how to carry it along with snap. Supporting Douglas Fairbanks are:—Marjory Daw, Frank Campeau, Lillian Langdon, Albert McQuarrie and Sam Southern, famous London and New York actor and brother of E. H. Southern, who makes his first screen appearance in this picture. This sure is some picture and is going to be one honest-to-goodness treat for the patrons of the Theatre on Friday and Saturday."

THE GHOSTS WILL DANCE AROUND NEXT TUESDAY.
