ONTARIO MINING MEN FORM NEW ORGANIZATION

At Toronto last week representatives from all branches of the mining industry met to form an association or organization with a view to stabilizing and guarding the interests generally of the Mining industry. The new organization will be known as the Ontario Mining Association. It will be a company without share capital. An office will be kept up in Toronto in charge of a secretary under salary. The following officers were chosen for the ensuing term:

President—A. D. Miles, of the International Nickel Co.

First Vice-President—F. L. Culver, President and General Manager of the Beaver at Cobalt, and the Kirkland Lake Gold Mines.

Second Vice-President—G. C. Bateman, General Manager of the La Rose Mine at Cobalt.

Secretary—B. Neilly, M. E. A., of the Penn-Canadian Mine.

The Board of Directors was chosen with the idea of including representatives of the mining industry from all parts of the Province.

IS THIS MAN RIGHT OR WRONG OR JUST "BUGS"?

Were it not for the experience here a couple of years ago when the warning of some of the "Bolsheviki" themselves proved a valuable tip to the good citizens who passed them on to the proper authorities, there would be every disposition to discredit the story told by a former Sudbury Finlander to a Thessalon citizen recently. The story told in March 1918, by a disgruntled or frightened "foreign revolutionist" to a good citizen of Timmins to the effect that there would be a monster parade here with a determined effort at all costs to release

in-ovite, the Russian orator, held ere wit out bail, sounded like a foolish piece of imagination, yet it was worked out almost to the letter before the authorities had it in its entirety one hour. The authorities here took no chances on disbelieving it, and were only handicapped by the short time for preparation and by the fact that the parade was staged several hours sooner than first planned. That these embryo revolutionists will treacherously betray each other is only to be expected. People who cannot be faithful to the country that has dealt so generously with them can hardly be expected to deal very virtuously with each other. Also, there are many of the aliens who recognize this as the best country they have ever known and who would accordingly protect its citizens from disaster or discomfort. So it is always well to at least consider the stories they may tell, and at the least take precautionary measures. The Thessalon Advocate tells about a Finlander who said he had been working in Copper Cliff, making good money and liking his work, but that he had left his job because he was "afraid." On careful questioning the Finlander said that bad things were going to happen in Sudbury, that much shooting would take place, many people be killed, and that the town would be sacked and burned. The man said he was taking his wife and family to the woods, until the "rebellion" was over. As the Thessalon Advocate says:—"This man was certainly afraid. Perhaps he knows what's going on in the councils of the 'Reds' that the authorities do not. Perhaps he is only nutty. At all events, it might be safe to investigate. A stitch in time saves nine."

Town Topics

The Salaries of all teachers in the Cobalt Public School have been increased approximately 25 per cent. The teachers applied for the increases last year but action was deferred until the 1920 Board took charge.

No hockey fan should miss the game at the Timmins Rink on Friday evening of this week when the Porcupine and New Liskeard teams will again try conclusions in the N. O. H. A. semi-finals.

At Haileybury on Friday evening last, New Liskeard and Haileybury met in the last game of the N. O. H. A. Central Group series. Haileybury won with a score variously estimated from 10 to 3, to 13 to 2. New Liskeard wished to have the game postponed, as they considered it not of vital importance, and they wanted to save themselves for the game on Saturday with Porcupine. Haileybury, however, would not agree on a postponement, and the Liskeard Club responded by sending down a pick-up, or scratch, team. Although the players were duly registered with New Liskeard, most of them were really juniors. The Haileybury goal keeper is some guardian, all right, or the score would have been double. This is the only match lost this year by New Liskeard.
