BENEFIT TO PORCUPINE FROM OVERSEAS MONEY.

Mr. Frank C. Loring, the well-known mining engineer, has just returned to Canada after a visit to London, England. According to an interview in the Toronto World, he reports money very plentiful in England and the nation rapidly recovering from the effects of the war. The suggestion is that there is much money in England eagerly looking for good investment, and there is considerable interest at present in the mining industry and its opportunities in Canada. Several men of importance in the financial and mining world in Canada have recently visited the Old Country and left a good impression as to the potential mineral wealth and riches in metal of such districts as the Porcupine. Several groups of English eapitalists have already been interested in North Land ventures, and it is likely that considerable Old Country capital will be caming here to develop the riches of this great North Land.

T. & N. O. HAS ANOTHER WRECK NEAR UNO PARK

Another suggestion of the general condition of the T. & N. O. track and equipment was given on Saturday morning when a freight train was wrecked between Uno Park and New Liskeard. The wreck is supposed to have occured through a car in the centre of the freight train leaving the track and being followed by 15 others. The cars were loaded with pulpwood and there was pulpwood scattered as plenteously as travellers scatter curses on the T. & N. O. service. Wrecking crews from Englehart and North Bay worked to clear up the pulpwood-strewn track, but the traffic for the whole week-end was completely disorganized. In addition, there was a wreck on the G. T. R. near Pow assan, so the freight, express and mail service for the North Land was as good as the passenger service. It is esteemed a great privilege to live in the North Land. By the way, what foolish things ordinary people will say. Why, one man last week even suggested that it would pay the T. & N. O. better to improve its equipment and track than stand the loss, cost and inconvenience of so many expensive wrecks. Such an expression shows that this man does not know how to run a railway like the T. & N. O. does. Probably, he is so hopelessly inefficient in this line that he would wish to conduct the road for the convenience and advantage of the people. As it is, the public were very properly annoyed and inconvenienced, and this is good for the people. It keeps them for instance, from brooding over such other plagues as the "Flu" and the O. T. A. The week-end disorganization of the T. & N. O. meant general loss to merchants and others. There were no papers, no mail, no express, at the appointed time. The New Empire Theatre could not get its films through for Monday evening's programme. There were other minor and major inconveniences and losses,-all a natural consequence of running 2 People's Railway on the present plan.

Precautions Recommended To Avoid Influenza

Avoid contact with other people as far as possible. Especially avoid crowds indoors, in street cars, theatres, motion-pature houses and other places of public assemblage.

Avoid persons suffering from "colds" sore throats and coughs. Avoid chilling of the body or living in rooms of temperature below 65 deg. or above 72 deg. F.

Sleep and work in clean, fresh air.

Keep your hands clean, and keep them out of your mouth. Avoid expectorating in public places, and see that others do likewise. Avoid visiting the sick.

Eat plain nourishing food and avoid alcoholic stimulants.

Cover your none with your handkerchief when you sneeze, your mouth when you cough. Change handkerchiefs frequently. Promptly disinfect soiled handkerchiefs by boiling or washing with soap and water. Don't worry. Keep your feet warm. Wet feet demand prompt attention. Wet clothes are dangerous and must be removed as soon as possible.

What to do for Influenza and Colds

Oftentimes it is impossible to tell a cold from mild influenza. Therefore: If you get a cold go to bed in a well ventilated room. Keep warm. Keep away from other people. Do not kiss anyone. . Use individual basins, and knives, forks, spoons, towels, .handkerchiefs, .soap, .wash plates and cups.

Every case of influenza should go to bed at once under the care of a physician. The patient should stay in bed at least three days after fever has disappeared and until convalescence is well established.

The patient must not cough or sneeze except when a mask or handkerchief is held before the face.

He should be in a warm, well-ventilated room.

There is no specific for the disease. Symptoms should be met as they ar-

The great danger is from pneumonia. Avoid it by staying in bed while actually ill and until convalescence is fully established.

The complications of influenza are worse than the disease.

It is improbable that influenza vaccine will prevent the disease, but the Combined Vaccine issued by the Board is believed to be of value in preventing complications such as pneumonia.
