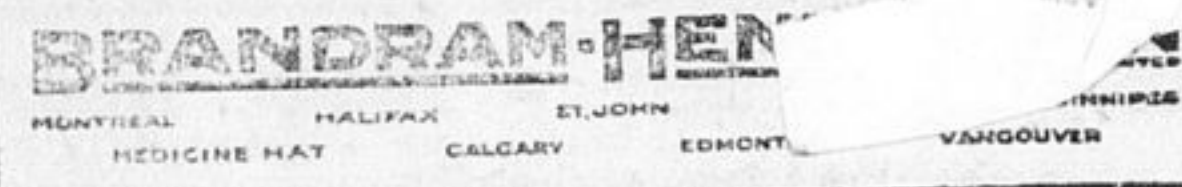

The story, so far as the police know it, is to the effect that a couple of young men who visited the young women lost some sixty or seventy dollars which they thought had been correspondingly found by the two young women. Accordingly one of the men used an axe to "axe" for his money back, and there was a wild and woolly little noise and damage affair that brought the police into action. The man from South Porcupine arrested by Provincial Officer Moore on a charge of vagrancy, the officer discovering him at what he thought to be an unmentionable and unthinkable crime, was discharged, there being no section under the code that touched the particular act that was charged. Indeed, the crime appears to be so unmentionable that the Criminal Code does not mention it. 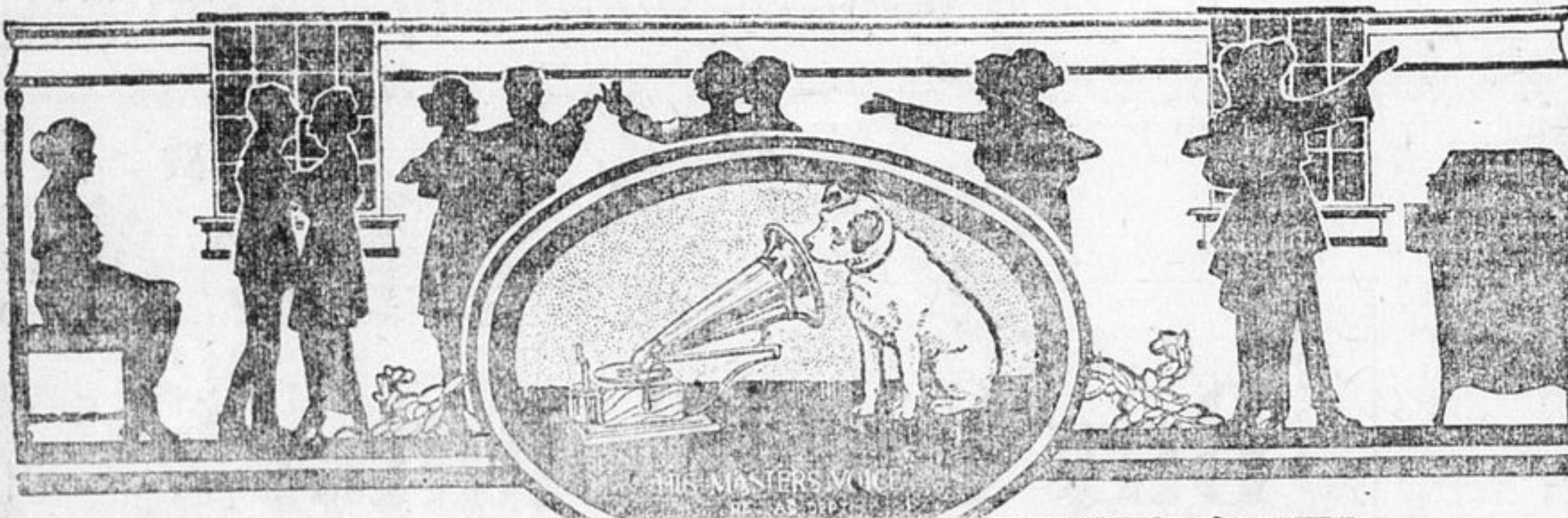
