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NEW LINE OF FAIRY TALE ABOUT THE NORTH LAND

Mr. Angus McDonald's Election Advertising Temiskaming, but —Oh, Read On!

As The Advance suggested last week the election of Mr. Angus McDonald as Member for this riding will mean much publicity for the North Land, and publicity is one of the things this country needs. If the people through out Canada and the world in general only knew of the possibilities and promise of this great undeveloped territory there would soon be such interest and attention that rapid progress and advance here would be assured. Perhaps the first thing necessary to secure attention and interest is to get people talking. They will talk-much first, and then think a little. That is the usual way, is it not? As soon as the outside world gets to the thinking stage regarding the North Land, advance is assured for this country. Mr. Angus McDonald's election starts all sorts of talk in outside newspapers. As usual the talk is twisted. Toronto is suffering sadly from the O. T. A. The Toronto Globe, under the heading:—"Members Curious to See Goliath of Temiskaming. Ottawa Rife With Tales of Angus McDonald's Muscular Prowess."—prints the following, "Staff Correspondence":—

"Ottawa, April 12.—Who will introduce Mr. Angus McDonald, the new Member for Temiskaming, when he arrives this week to take his place in the House of Commons?" This is a question constantly being asked about the Parliament Buildings just now. The man who claims to know about him can always get a group to hear a tale which is descriptive of the the new Member. The story circulated to the effect that he is a Socialist has created a great deal of the curiosity as to who will introduce him. The farmers themselves do not know, but they say it is not because they are going to draw the garment of exclusiveness from one said to be a Socialist, but because they have decided to let Mr. Angus McDonald himself decide who will be his sponsor. He may ask the Farmers to introduce him, as he has also been a farmer in Glengarry, or he may ask to be introduced by Major Andrews who now represents a great Labour constituency in Winnipeg. Probably Major Andrews and one of the Farmer members will be chosen. "What about McDonald? Is he a Socialist?" asked some members of a man from Haileybury to-night. "Well, whatever he is, he will be honest about it, I can tell you that," said the Haileybury man. "What's more, Mackie of Renfrew will have to look to his laurels as the giant of the House of Commons. I really think McDonald is the bigger man. They tell the story of him up home that Ringling's Circus once heard of Angus McDonald and his exploits and determined to secure him. Their strong man, who feared losing his job, decided to go on ahead to Glengarry and beat up Angus to prove to the circus people that they were backing the wrong man. He met Angus in a field and said to him, 'Can you tell me where that fellow Angus McDonald lives?' Picking up a plow beside him, Angus quietly pointed with it to a nearby house, saying, 'Yon's the hoose!' The strong man faded away."

As usual, in dealing with anything directly or indirectly touching the North Land, the Toronto daily sadly mixes truth and error, and following the O. T. A. rule there is not more than 2½ per cent. of truth. Up in this North Land Mr. Angus McDonald is not considered as any "Goliath" or "giant" or anything like that. Indeed, among the big men of this North he might almost be classed as a little fellow, being only 6 foot 2 in his stocking feet, while 6 foot 6, 7 and 8 is the rule here without stockings at all. They call him "Long Angus," indeed, because it took him so long to grow up. And, even if that Circus story were true no one up here would think it remarkable enough to mention. Pointing directions with a plow is a common thing in Ontario these days—even in Old Ontario. Look at last October! There is nothing particularly strong about that plow business. The only thing along that line that was ever thought worthy of mention at Elk Lake was Big Jaek's directions to the stranger. Jaek held up the plough and horses, so that the off horse leaned to the front door side and the high horse to the back door side, thus indicating to the stranger both entrances so that he could take his choice. Now THAT is a little strong, according to North Land ideas.
