**TREASURER OF BOSTON
CREEK MINE PASSES AWAY.**

Despatches from Columbus, Ohio, announced last week the death of Mr. E. Rettich, treasurer of the Miller-Independence Mine at Boston Creek. He was well known in the North Land where he had been a frequent visitor. He was a firm believer in the great future before this North Land and he backed his faith with finances. He had been in poor health for some time past and recently was planning an extended visit to the North Land, partly with the idea of benefitting his health and partly to visit properties he was interested in. The late Mr. Rettich was one of the most successful tobacco growers in the State of Ohio, and in late years had added mining affairs as a close second to his tobacco growing interests.
