The aforesaid indignant citizen the other morning purchased an orange—a single, simple, sunkist orange—on the train, and tendered the news agent ten cents for the sample. Ten cents looked like a big price for a small orange, when the best kind of oranges were selling in the stores at Timmins for no more than 75 cents per dozen, or 6 1/4 cents each,—but the citizen before-mentioned, ere he became indignant, recognized that it is the custom for news agents on trains to charge a little above regular prices for everything. The news agent handed back the ten cents. "A quarter please!" he said. The citizen, now indignant, did not please to pay a quarter for a single orange of no particular quality or beauty. Three hundred per cent. profit over and above and in addition to a reasonable profit upon ordinary retail prices was just a little too much of a good thing. He mentally anathemized news agents in general, and now, after sober second thought he is condemning the Government that permits its cars to be used for such merchandizing methods.

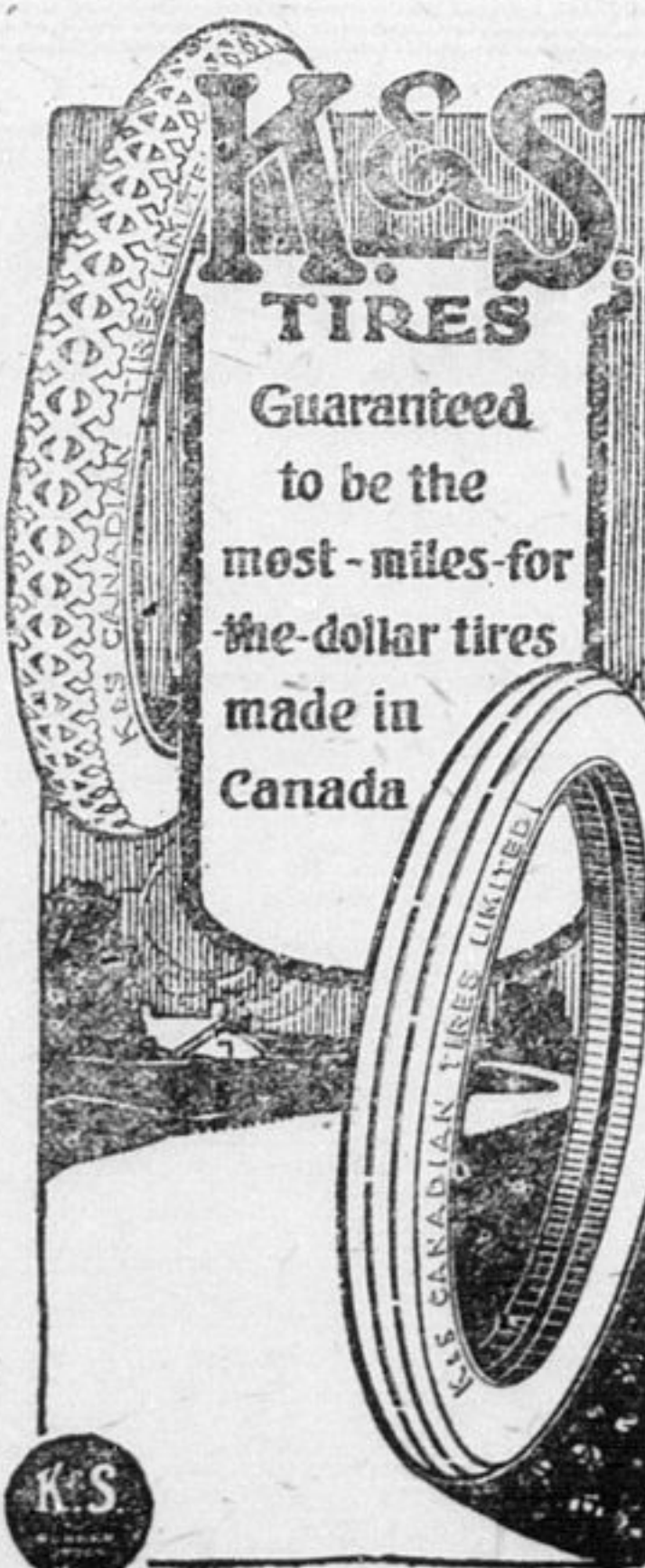

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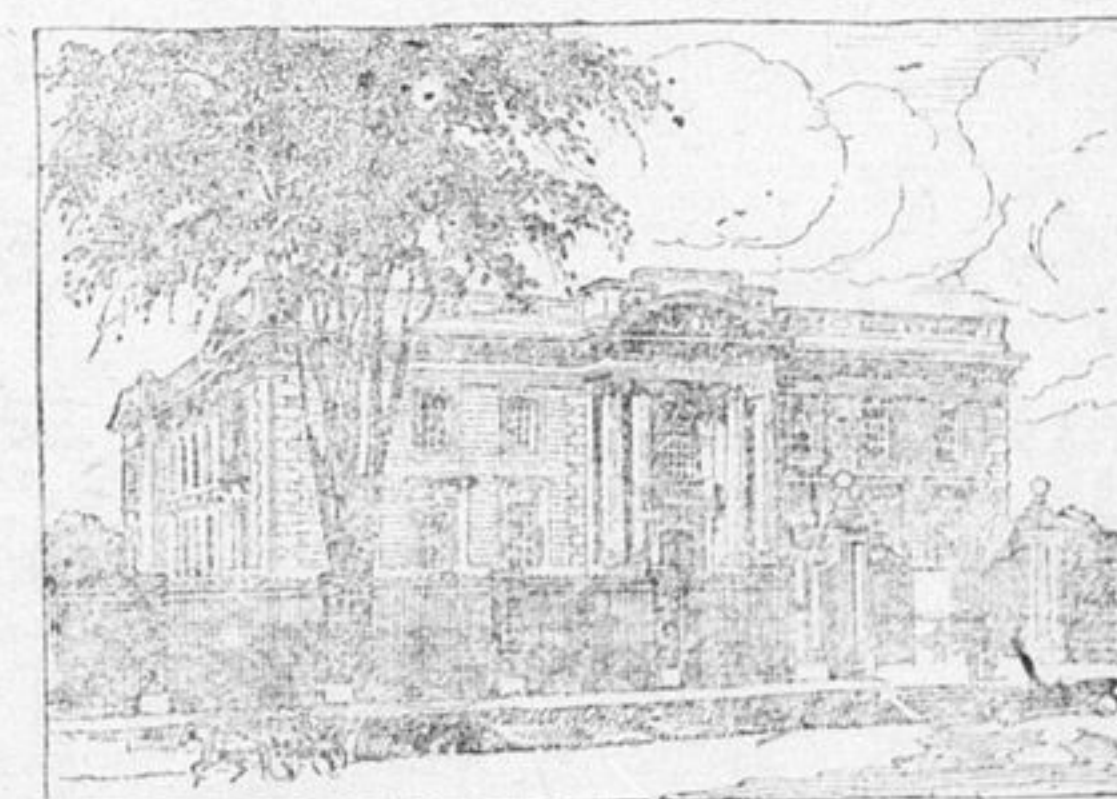
