GOLD FIND REPORTED

NEAR SING SING PRISON

A find of gold is reported in a quarry near Sing Sing prison. Men of the "honour gang" of prisoners made the discovery, and assays are now being made of the samples. During the construction of one of the cell blocks of the prison, gold and iron ore were said to be discovered but the matter was not given attention at that time as it was felt that the completion of the construction work was all-important. The Sing Sing Bulletin, the prison newspaper, suggests the possibility of another Yukon Valley rush to the locality. The Advance, however, is more inclined to the belief that the whole story is only a scheme to attract prospectors towards Sing Sing. This plan is about the only way that they can get prospectors anywhere near jail.
